Ready, steady, census

The decennial census is almost upon us. Households across Stonehouse will soon be asked to take part in the nationwide survey of housing and the population. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941. Information from the digital-first census will help decide how services are planned and funded in your local area. This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, housing or new bus routes Households will receive a letter with a unique access code in the post, allowing them to complete their questionnaire online. Making our town safer for walkers & cyclists

Following Lockdown - when many people discovered the joy of getting out to walk and cycle locally - the Town Council is exploring ways to make social distancing easier and taking exercise around the town safer.

Individual comments on an interactive map in a recent consultation identified danger spots for pedestrians and cyclists, with a wide range of solutions suggested that would help respondents feel safer to walk and cycle in the area.

As well as numerous comments highlighting the danger to cyclists following the Horsetrough Roundabout 'improvements' (the Town Council is continuing to push the County Council to take urgent action to make this safer), the responses identified places where pavements need re-surfacing and clearing of vegetation, footpaths that might be widened and locations where enforcement of traffic speeds or parking is needed for the safety

Respondents also felt more needs doing to make the Shared Space on the High Street effective and to improve safety around the school entrances on Elm Road, the Co-op and the top of

The consultation also generated some ideas for strategic projects including developing the railway footbridge to enable employees on the Industrial Estates to pop into the High Street and a cycleway linking Stonehouse to the Cross Keys Roundabout on the other side of J12 of the M5.

Around 2/3 of respondents supported temporary measures to reduce traffic speed and /or volumes, with over half supporting making these permanent.

Neil Gibbs, the Town Mayor, said: "The Town Council is committed to encouraging more walking and cycling in order to reduce car use in the town. This consultation has given us a useful picture of where we need to prioritise our efforts in order to make residents feel safe to do this; thank you so much to all of you who took time

The Town Council has shared the Consultation results with County Council Highway Officers and will be working with colleagues to progress some of the ideas that have been suggested.

Mayor's Column



As I write, a national lockdown came into force on 5th November and local non-essential shops and services have, once again had to close their doors. Please follow the regulations and do your bit to keep yourselves and your loved ones safe and get our businesses open again. This is a good opportunity to remind residents that the Town Council Helpline is

still running if anyone is struggling with food shopping, collecting prescriptions or would like to be paired up with a 'phone buddy'. The past few months have certainly been challenging but it was great to see the re-opening of schools and businesses that had previously been closed during our first lockdown, and we welcome some new businesses to the town.

Our new Library opened in the Town Hall and is full of brand-new books. The staff and volunteers are working hard to increase the services on offer and to extend the opening times. It is being well supported by local people and we know that it is a real asset to the town. In time it will become a true community hub. The Town Council office is now in the former Post Office and is currently closed due to lockdown. Please telephone, email us or refer to our website if you need help, information or advice.

The fantastic news of the £8.9 million National Lottery Award funding for the Cotswold Canals Connected Project means that five miles of the canal already restored, will be connected to the national inland waterway network at Saul Junction. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity for Stonehouse to once again become the Gateway to the Stroud Valley's and it can bring untold economic opportunities to the town as well as leisure, health and environmental benefits. The Town Council's Canal Rejuvenation Working Group is working hard to improve access from the canal to the town centre and hopefully secure a physical mooring site so that when the works are completed in 2023, canal users can easily find our shops, cafés, restaurants, pubs and other amenities.

We are aware of concerns about the new road layout on the A419 and I am working with our County Councillor Lesley Williams and our partners at GCC to discuss how to improve safety for all road users, but especially pedestrians and cyclists. There are encouraging signs that concerns have been heard and that some important changes may be afoot.

Work is continuing in the Old Chapel Garden with the installation of new fencing, planters and, eventually, benches. The Stonehouse in Bloom team have been working extremely hard to make this area an inviting, accessible and peaceful place.

The Town Council is continuing to pursue the re-opening of the Bristol Road train station and you may have seen a piece on BBC Points West, where Cllr Theresa Watt, Siobhan Baillie MP and a local commuter were interviewed. This project is key to the social, economic and environmental future of the whole district and will benefit everyone for a remarkably small capital outlay. The key priority is to persuade the County Council to include the project in the forthcoming Local Transport Plan for Gloucestershire. An online petition is now at over 1000 names but we still need many more.

Police Update

During the Covid-19 outbreak Stonehouse officers have been working as normal with protective personal equipment. We saw an increase in our calls for concerns for welfare and vulnerable person's visits.

As Stonehouse is growing, so is our policing team for the area, we now have a third member to our PCSO patrolling team. PCSO Mark Lifton 9222 joins PCSO's Liz Ward 9081 and Deb Hudman 9233. Mark is no stranger to Stonehouse having already worked the area previously.

Both Liz and Mark featured on the BBC documentary "Reported Missing". Our Force was chosen to appear on BBC1 to show how the police find people who go missing.

Four in every ten people with dementia will go missing at some point, often unintentionally. Due to their vulnerabilities they will always be graded as high risk, leading to a demand on police resources. That's why it is important to ensure families and carer's have planned ahead by completing a Herbert Protocol Form - and keep it up to date. Details can be found Online.

Deb also took part in a recent traffic operation and accompanied the Force Engagement Vehicle at the M5 services. The mission statement was to explain, encourage, educate and enforce the Fatal Five in order to have safer roads in Gloucestershire.





Citizens Advice Stroud & Cotswold has the following advice:

- · Be suspicious if you are contacted out of the blue, even if it's from a name you recognise
- If it sounds too good to be true it probably is
- Never give out your bank details unless you are certain you can trust the person contacting you, although a scammer can sound trustworthy
- Don't respond to requests to make a bank transfer to a safe account
- Don't be rushed you never need to make a decision straight away and if you feel pressured say "no", hang up the phone, or close the door
- Your bank will never ask for your full PIN number or password over the phone
- · Your bank will only use the last four digits on your card
- You may be asked to log onto your bank account via a link they will send you - do not do this
- HMRC and TV Licensing will not email or text you about refunds or rebates, nor ask you for personal details
- Never click on links included in suspicious emails
- To check whether an email is genuine click on the arrow on the sender's email address, if it shows a personal email address or one which looks unusual be suspicious
- If you receive an email or text which you feel is suspicious open a new tab and do a search
- · Look out for poor grammar or spelling
- · Be suspicious of organisations which do not use your name

You can register your landline with the Telephone Preference Service by calling 0345 070 0707. Talk to your phone provider to see what privacy services and call-blocking services are available. These services aren't always free but are useful in ensuring any call coming through is from a trusted or known source.








All Pulling Together

The Volunteers at All Pulling Together have been working through-out the summer months to give out ambient food supplies to the community. We have been open every Monday morning from 9:30 - 11:30am and hope this will continue for the foreseeable future. The food items are supplied by DEFRA via Fare Share food charity (fareshare.org.uk) and Morrison's in Nailsworth. Our volunteers collect the supplies when they are available and then bring them back to the office in Park Parade to be sanitised.







During the summer months we also made up 50 play bags to give out to local families. The bags contained a mix of craft and play items to help with the summer holiday period. We also circulated 50 more play bags for the October half term. Donations have already been received from the local PCSO's and people in our community. Thank you for your support.

Guideposts has been busy during the lockdown and the recent weeks where we've been pleased to reopen some of our Clubs and Hubs. While they were closed we offered opportunities for social catch ups, discussions, guizzes, guest speakers and more using Zoom. This was an adventure for us and for those who join us as we hadn't really used Zoom before but now we feel we all learned something new together. Our Zoom group continues every other week, and once a month we invite different guest speakers to share experiences, tips and information about living with health conditions, hobbies, and other topics of interest.

We also started a pen pal scheme connecting older people with children by letter. Some of the participants were interviewed on Radio Gloucestershire and enjoyed telling listeners why they are writing to each other and the positive impact it has had for them, especially during the times when it was difficult to see

We opened a helpline to assist people with emergencies and general queries at the start of the lock down and were able to assist many people with a wide range of enquiries and challenges. Now that people are out and about more but many are feeling anxious or low, the helpline and our website gives advice on how to address anxiety and improve wellbeing.

Now that we are able to, we have reopened our CONNECT group at Whitminster Village Hall and our Community Hub for adults with learning disabilities in Stroud. CONNECT is for you if: you would like to make new local friendships, you like art, crafts, music and other hobbies, or you're living with a long term health condition, are a carer for family or a friend, or want to meet people in your local community. A return to school: life after lockdown



Like everywhere else in 2020, Park Junior School is part of the new socially-distanced, Covid-aware world. Who would have thought back in January, that the government would be about to tell children not to go to school, that education for all would carry on remotely, that parents would be playing such a crucial role in those Maths and English lessons and that even the

annual ritual of SATs would be cancelled?

However, as "the great pause" came to an end, it seemed to be on everyone's lips that children must get back into school. The children needed school for their education and their mental wellbeing and certainly their parents needed it for their sanity... To enable schools to open, teachers have all had to have a very close look at how they can keep their pupils safe and Park Juniors is no exception. One-way systems have been

news of the impact of the disease. Each class has spent time talking through what has been happening to help them assimilate the changes and develop resilience. Teachers have also been putting programmes of work in place to help children catch up so that they don't lose confidence in their abilities.

So, what do the pupils think of the changes? Isaac and Dolly, Year 6 Councillors, tell us: "First of all, we have a one-way system throughout school which helps us protect

Autumn term is filled with great excitement and a hive of activity at Hopelands Preparatory School and it has been lovely to welcome all our children back. With the Covid-19 measures firmly in place we were amazed at how quickly the children have adapted. Their resilience and perseverance are shining through every day and deserve huge amounts of praise and recognition. It was a joy to see the happiness and enthusiasm as the children were once again back with their peers and teaching staff in September.

At the start of term we were delighted to be invited by Stonehouse Town Council to take part in creating a chain of rainbows throughout the town to thank the NHS and other frontline workers.

Each Key Stage designed their own banner with a rainbow of handprints. The children had great fun working with their peers and the end results look fantastic!

Throughout the school year we hold several Head's Tea Parties, where every child is invited to this coveted and popular occasion. Invitations are sent to the delighted children who have to RSVP to the Headteacher, Mrs Bradburn. The first one was held this term for children in Key Stage 1 and they were treated to 'tea' and iced buns served by Mrs Bradburn. An afternoon filled with fun and laughter which creates a wonderful, enriching experience for everyone.

Encouraging natural curiosity and instilling a love of learning is key to the teaching at Hopelands. Gaining hands on experience provides not only personal growth but prepares each pupil with skills ready for their transition to secondary school. At the start of term Year 6 had a fascinating experience of dissecting a pig's heart. This went alongside their science lessons where they have been learning about the circulatory system. Any squeamish fears were quickly overcome, and the children enjoyed comparing their diagrams, pictures and models with a real-life specimen.

established, extra cleaning routines are in place, hand sanitising equipment is available and desks have been re-arranged to list just a very few of the many precautions that have been taken. Practical considerations in place, teachers have also had to think about how they can help the pupils to cope with the impact of the pandemic on their education and on their mental health.

Many children will have been nervous about coming back to school after losing familiar routines and after hearing frightening

teachers, visitors and friends. On the field we have four sections with only a year group in each to help minimise the spread of the virus. Each year group is in a bubble which means no mixing with any other ages, older or younger. This is the group we are in at break and lunch. In the classroom we have our own equipment as we are not allowed to share it with others. All of these things are actually quite good as we like having our own equipment and our own space."

However, two comments stand out in explaining why it was so important to bring children back to school. Isaac and Dolly say: "We have really enjoyed coming back to school, seeing all our friends and getting back to learning new things."

Perhaps Ruby-Mae sums it up best when she says: "I like school because I get to see my friends and it is better than being home by myself."





Maidenhill girls master Mathematics



On Wednesday 7th October, Year 11 students Natalie Brint, Maya-Rosa Blackie, Pippa Benn, Zoe Barton and Leona Beech, accepted the challenge and took part in the Mathematical Olympiad for Girls.

The competition is an annual event organised by the UK Mathematics Trust and is aimed at girls and young women across the UK, encouraging them to tackle advanced mathematical problems.

Past papers of the Mathematical Olympiad for girls are a source of high-quality problems that encourage students to think mathematically and are made available in preparation for the competition.

As it was not possible for the papers to be marked this year and to make it easier for schools to participate, the format of the paper was changed. Although the style of questions remained the same, candidates were required to submit answers only, rather than full written solutions. The length of the paper was also reduced to 2 hours and answers had to be submitted online.

The girls found that the questions tested a wide range of mathematical skills. Although challenging, the questions were helpful in identifying their understanding of more complicated mathematical problems, giving a better and deeper understanding of school mathematics in general. The challenge provided invaluable experience in solving non-standard problems, where thinking outside the box is definitely required. This was useful in preparation for GCSE examinations and helping them to decide whether to continue taking maths when they move on to complete their A Levels.

Full results of the competition including student scores will be available on Friday 23rd October and we know our girls will do us proud.

We also added some wildlife friendly plants and put up a sign explaining why the grass was left long.

We hope to create a wildflower border next year by planting seeds and other future projects include planting spring bulbs, installing water butts to save rainwater and plant one or two native, wildlife friendly trees.

With 'Churches Together In Stonehouse' we ran a virtual holiday club on five Fridays, which 24 children 'attended'. They collected their activity bags (worksheets, craft materials, drink and a snack) from Stonehouse Methodist Church and then visited our YouTube channel for the story, song, game and craft instructions. This wasn't something we'd done before, but was appreciated with 100% giving it 10/10 for enjoyment. Discussions took place about a half-term provision, in place of the usual sports holiday club and light party.

Late-August, PSALMS ran a Youth Adventure Day which 63 young people attended, and 'in bubbles' enjoyed activities such as paddle-boarding and archery, as well as rebuilding friendships and confidence. The theme was 'Jesus is the same, yesterday, today and forever' (Hebrews 13:8), and there were times for reflection on this. This event was so well received that it ran again in half-term.

Club Pulse

With the government deeming youth provision as an 'essential service' we are able to meet with 15 young people plus leaders, and 'Club Pulse' has already restarted on Mondays, 6-7:30pm at Stonehouse Methodist Church for school years 7+. We're currently unable to run our schools-work, however Emily has been helping Park Jr. on Friday lunchtimes and by producing 'Collective Worship' videos which has been a great way to maintain contact.

Hard work is bearing fruit in the Old Chapel Garden



After four months of hard work since the lockdown restrictions were lifted in May, volunteers have worked 324 hours socially distanced on the Old Chapel Garden project to finish the garden before winter. They have moved and spread more than 10 tonnes of topsoil to level and prepare the site

for reseeding: a new flower border has been created: and the site has been cleared of weeds and stones. Most recently four trough planters have been put in place, filled with compost and planted with some perennial plants. Six trees and a bench, donated by local residents, will be put in place in late autumn.

Feedback from the community has been overwhelmingly positive. Caroline Wynn from Wynn's Cafe in Stonehouse High Street said "Wynn's are so pleased that the Old Chapel Garden has been given the care and attention it deserves. The garden is one of the most peaceful and underrated beauty spots in Stonehouse and it is a genuine joy to see it come to life. We are excited to be able to share it with the community."



New Old Chapel information board

Stonehouse History Group has created an information board showing the history of the Congregational Church. It can be seen in the newly redesigned garden in its old burial ground. The Church was built in 1827, a large stone building fronting on to High Street. It had a front garden with a Cedar tree which grew to be a huge landmark on the street. Behind the Church was a burial ground, established in the 1850s. The building contained a Chapel with an organ and two schoolrooms. It was well-used until the 1950s when congregations declined and the Church closed in 1965. In 1967 a fire caused serious damage leading to the building being demolished. The land at the front was sold and three shops built. The old burial ground land was given to the Town Council to maintain as a Rest Garden.

The new information board is sited next to the Laburnum Walk entrance and gives a short history of the Old Chapel and the garden. We are very grateful to Vivien Warren and the Midcounties Co-operative Society for sponsoring the board and to the Town Council for putting it in place. The board is the 10th in the series of boards around the town and we have created a leaflet showing their location. The leaflet will be available soon on our website stonehousehistorygroup.org.uk.





Stonehouse Boundary Walk

How will canal visitors visit our town's businesses without a wharf?

Ship Inn Project Stonehouse (ShIPS) is a local group committed to ensuring that the former Ship Inn site is used for the benefit of the whole community. The Stonehouse Design Statement (2005) clearly states that the former Ship Inn site is considered to be "the prime candidate for the new Town Wharf". ShIPS committee members are working in partnership with and supporting the Town Council and key stakeholders at Stroud District Council in order to facilitate a land transfer as it is still in the ownership of SDC Housing. In October ShIPS submitted a business case to SDC to purchase the land, and to ensure its long-term use for the community.

Ground-breaking canal works at the Fromebridge roundabout have surged on throughout the pandemic, and the recent news of the National Heritage Lottery Fund's (NHLF) successful bid of £8.9 million has provided an enormous boost for completing the project. Work is also already underway to create a new railway bridge over the canal at Stonehouse Ocean. Stonehouse will become a canal-side town once again and aims to be welcoming boaters by the end of 2023.

3 year Activity Plan

For the next three years, Creative Sustainability - the communityinterest company working in partnership with Stroud District Council, Cotswold Canals Trust, Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust, Stroud Valleys Canal Company and Stroudwater Navigation Archive Charity - will work with local people, town and parish councils, community groups including ShIPS, and businesses, to make sure that the restoration project is inclusive, community-led and benefits local people and communities, wildlife and heritage.

Central to the NHLF bid was an Activity Plan and Action Points drawn up by CCC following extensive consultation with communities and stakeholders along the canal. The fulfillment of this plan in the next phase of the canal regeneration project will ensure that the key aims are delivered for the communities in the wider canal corridor. The Activity Plan can be read in full here: stroud.gov.uk/info/Activity and Action Plan.pdf

A key strategic aim will be to create a Hub on the canal at

Stonehouse. Social gateways must lead people from the canal to the town, and there is a need to create a sense of place and identify selling points for Stonehouse. CCC are arranging activities in the near future that will bring people together along the canal corridor and to help make this happen. There will be carnivals, boat trips, heritage days, walks, talks and art projects - whatever 'Floats your Boat' for all to enjoy! Hundreds of volunteer opportunities are also on offer - creating "clear pathways for people to gain skills, grow in confidence, become less isolated and for the unemployed or young to navigate their way into meaningful work".

Selling Stonehouse

In a recent interview on BBC Radio Gloucestershire, Jim White, Chairman of Cotswold Canals Trust discusses the canal restoration work: "It will be up to both Stroud and Stonehouse Town Councils to sell themselves as canal destinations once more" he says, and "The Councils have got to put the attractions in and say 'Yes please come'. There should be places (for visitors) to put their boat, have a coffee or an overnight sleep at a hotel." The Trust is actively fundraising for the remaining £1.2 million needed to complete the canal project, and is looking for more volunteers.

A wharf at the Ship Inn site will mean that canal users will be encouraged to stop and visit the businesses in our awardwinning town in bloom, rather than remaining oblivious and passing us by on their way to Stroud or Saul.

Stroudwater Station

A railway station in Stonehouse with a direct link to Bristol - is it a pipe dream or can it be reality?

The station would provide a much-needed direct public transport link to Bristol from the Stonehouse and the Stroud Valleys for work, education and leisure. By providing a convenient alternative to the private car, it would ease traffic congestion and the associated air pollution as well as enabling people who don't have access to a car to reach the regional capital. It really would be a win, win!

The campaign to open Stroudwater Station on the site of the old Bristol Road Station continues, building on work that has been done over many years. Recently, we have had some good publicity, with coverage by local papers, on-line sources, radio and, most recently, television, with BBC's Points West broadcasting from the station site.

We have support from our MP, Siobhan Baillie, Stroud District Council, eight local parishes, local businesses such as Stonehouse Court Hotel and Ecotricity, and over 1000 people who have signed our petition. The Department of Transport's 'Restoring our Railways Fund' identified our bid as having potential and are helping us develop the project. At the time of writing, we are about to have a meeting with Network Rail to get advice on our next steps.

We still have to convince Gloucestershire County Council, so if you haven't already done so, please sign the petition via the link below. With increased awareness of the climate emergency and the need for sustainable transport, now is the time we can make it happen.

The COVID-19 crisis has proven more than ever the importance of well-maintained and accessible public green space, and the Town Council is committed to ensuring all of our community will continue to benefit from these important areas.

Climate, trees and green spaces in **Stonehouse**

The Stonehouse Community Climate Action Forum (SCCAF) has gone from strength to strength and is now a group of more than a dozen residents and Councillors, supported by Town Council staff. We meet regularly to discuss a wide range of climate-related issues and all of our recent and planned activities are recorded on the Climate Action Plan, which can be found on the Town Council website under the 'Our Projects' tab. One of the initiatives developed by the SCCAF was the biodiversity areas at Oldends Lane, Laburnum Walk and Meadow Road. These were well-received by residents and wildlife alike and have just received their final cut of the season, although some sections will be retained as winter habitat. Similar areas will be marked out and signposted next spring and hopefully will be even more successful.

The biodiversity work in Stonehouse was also recently mentioned on BBC Radio Gloucestershire, when SCCAF Chair Councillor John Parker was interviewed about the work which is going on with trees and green spaces in the town. If you would be interested to join the group or learn more about their work then please contact the Town Council.

The Stonehouse Community Arboretum project is progressing well and has received lots of interest. Fifteen trees of a variety of species were planted around the town by the Council in the 2019/20 tree planting season, and around thirty are set to be planted in the next few months, almost all of which will be paid for by external funding grants. Some of these will be planted in the grounds of Park Junior School which won a prize of funding from the Tree Council.

The Stonehouse Tree & Woodland Strategy is also in production and will be going out to consultation in early 2021. One of the key aims of the Stonehouse Community Arboretum is to bring

A419 'Improvements' update

As the traffic returns to more normal numbers, many of you will have noticed the changes that have recently been made to the A419 from Horsetrough roundabout to the M5. These changes were made by GCC Highways with the aim of reducing the journey time to and from the M5 by less than 1 minute, twice a day, in the rush hours. The cost of this change was justified over a 60 year period!

Stonehouse Town Council and residents raised concerns during the consultations carried out in 2017 that the alterations to the Horsetrough roundabout, the siting of pedestrian crossings at Bonds Mill and Great Oldbury, the removal of the cycle crossing at Downton lights and the merging of traffic post roundabout and traffic lights would cause accidents, increase of speed and noise and would overall be detrimental to Stonehouse.

Some of you will have noted that the arrows onto the Horsetrough roundabout now show two lanes going straight on. GCC Highways says that this is now recommended, as continental drivers may see a right arrow and navigate the roundabout the wrong way! As it stands, there have been many cases of near misses as traffic tries to negotiate the narrowing of egress off the roundabout.

In August, a cycle and pedestrian protest and fact finding was held on the stretch of road between Horsetrough and Bonds Mill. The attendees used the road and the cycle path to negotiate this small stretch of road. Please see some of the comments received.

"Horsetrough Roundabout feeder road is so dangerous for cyclists coming from Ebley/Stonehouse. Near misses even in a visible group. Not practical to use all the pedestrian road crossings - No space on islands and would take ages!" "The cycle path from Horsetrough Roundabout to Bonds Mill has 7 road crossings over 1/2 Mile. Provision for a cycle lane on the road could possibly be safer"

"Feeder lane on the Horsetrough Roundabout is madness. Hostile for any cyclists cycling towards Upper Mills Estate. At the very least the lane should be 20 mph. No provision for cyclists or pedestrians at all. Madness.

"Ridiculous scheme- really dangerous for bikes- traffic is far in excess of 40 mph which is far too fast in a home area. We live here."





A complaint has been made about the validity of the Safety Report commissioned by GCC, and has been supported by Stonehouse Town Council, Stroud Valleys Cycle Campaign and the local Stroud Active group.

A meeting was organised In October by Lesley Williams between Gloucestershire Highways, Stonehouse Town Council and local protesters. This meeting was held to discuss the new proposal for the Horsetrough Roundabout and the issues at Downton Lights junction. Gloucestershire Highways have agreed to consider further design improvements.
