

# Pupil Premium Grant

## Impact Report 2015-2016

### What is Pupil Premium?

The Government introduced the Pupil Premium Grant in April 2011. This grant, which is additional to main school funding, is seen by the government as the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals and their wealthier peers, by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

In 2012/2013 a category of "Ever 6 FSM" was introduced in addition to FSM and LAC. This new category allows children who have been in receipt of FSM in the past 6 years but who now no longer qualify to be included in the pupil premium count.

In addition the Pupil Premium count includes supporting children and young people with parents in the regular armed forces( Ever 4 Service Child) and those children who have been adopted from care or have left care under a Special Guardianship or Residence Order.

The Pupil Premium is allocated to schools and is clearly identifiable. Schools can decide how the Pupil Premium is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility.

### Principles

- We ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all pupils
- We ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed
- In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged
- We also recognise that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals. We reserve the right to allocate the Pupil Premium funding to support any pupils or groups of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged.
- Pupil premium funding will be allocated following a needs analysis which will identify priority classes, groups or individuals. Limited funding and resources means that not all children receiving free school meals will be in receipt of pupil premium interventions at one time. (See appendix attached )

## Appendix 1:

*DFE : PPG provides funding for two policies:*

- *Raising the attainment of disadvantaged pupils of all abilities to reach their full potential;*
- *Supporting children and young people with parents in the regular armed forces*

At St Joseph's, decisions re allocation of funding will be made to achieve the following outcomes:

1. To close the "in school" gap between Disadvantaged and Non Disadvantaged cohorts re attainment in reading , writing and maths at both KS1 / 2
2. To ensure that all Disadvantaged children achieve ARE at both KS1/2 in reading , writing and maths
3. To close the "in school" gap between EAL and Non EAL cohorts re attainment in reading , writing and maths at both KS1 / 2
4. To ensure Disadvantaged children have access to a full range of extra curricular activities in line with their peers including sport , music , After School Club and Breakfast Club where appropriate
5. To ensure Disadvantaged children have access to a full range of additional curricular activities such a school trips
6. To ensure all Disadvantaged have access to specialist services to support emotional well being where appropriate e.g. Change for Life , play therapy, Educational Psychology

### **School Priorities for 2016-2017 (£1320 per pupil)**

- Ensure that all disadvantaged pupils attain ARE across the core subjects at both KS1 and KS2
- Closing the "in school gap" between Disadvantaged and Non Disadvantaged by 10% re attainment for ARE in Reading at KS2 and across all core subjects at KS1

***The PPG per pupil for 2016-2017 is as follows:***

*Disadvantaged Pupils in Year Groups R to 6 recorded as Ever 6 Disadvantaged £1,320*

*Looked After Children (LAC) £1,900*

*Children adopted from care under the Adoption and Children Act 2002 and children who have left care under a Special Guardianship or Residence Order £1,900*

*Service children*

*Pupils in Year Groups R to 11 recorded as Ever 4 Service Child or in receipt of a child pension from the Ministry of Defence £300*
