# PHONICS SCREENING CHECK

The Year 1 phonics screening check is a short assessment to confirm whether individual children have learnt how to read words using their knowledge of phonics to decode them.


Through the check children will read a range of 20 real and 20 'nonsense words' with a range of sounds. Nonsense words are also referred to as *alien* words and are made up words to check that your child can use their phonics knowledge correctly to read unfamiliar words.

The check will identify the children who need extra help so they are given support by their school to improve their reading skills. These children will then be able to retake the check in Year 2 so that the school can track them as they move through the school.


Please bring in your bookbag, reading book and reading diary each day.

### WRITING

Learning to be independent writers - children should be writing phonetically

- Focus on independently sounding out words
- Won't always be accurate but should be phonetically plausible please do not over correct spelling or ask children to copy words
- As they learn spellings, they will begin to use them
- Emphasis on talk for writing, orally rehearsing sentence before writing it
  - Introduction to spelling, grammar and punctuation
- Importance of children enjoying writing without fear of making mistakes



### HANDWRITING

#### Correct posture and pencil grip for handwriting

Pupils should be taught to sit correctly at a table, holding a pencil comfortably and correctly.



Our new handwriting will focus on forming the letters correctly like this in year 1. Cursive handwriting will start in year 2 but from research it has been proven that the lead ins and lead outs complicate handwriting and lead to cognitive overload. This will be a gradual change as some children have already a preferred handwriting style.

# HOMEWORK

Homework will begin to be set later in this half term and will start with basic spellings and reading. I will post more information about this on Dojo in a couple of weeks. We will build up to a Maths or English/Topic task each week, along with phonics practice and spellings. Please do ask if you need help in supporting your child with their homework. It is important children continue to consolidate the work they have done here at school at home too. Homework will be set on Dojo every Friday and will be due in the following Thursday through your child's online portfolio.

### ONLINE SAFETY

## SCHOOL LUNCHES

Year one pupils receive Universal School Meals, however, if you are eligible please apply for benefits-related free school meals (FSM). We get more benefits and funding and for the school.

Families who receive the following are eligible for free school meals:

Income Support Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance

Income-related Employment and Support Allowance

Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

The guaranteed element of Pension Credit

Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)

Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

- If your child is eligible for Free School Meals, they are also entitled to a range of support in school funded by the Pupil Premium Grant.
- This includes access to additional learning and extra-curricular opportunities, financial support for school trips and a fully funded music lesson or sports club.
- Even if children are only eligible for Free School Meals for a short time, they continue to receive Pupil Premium funding for 6 years.
