

Pupil Premium Notice 2017 – 2018

The pupil premium is a government grant to schools based principally on the number of children who have been eligible to receive free school meals within the school. The proportion of pupils eligible for pupil premium at Seven Mills in January 2017 was **62%**. Seven Mills therefore has an unusually high proportion of pupils eligible for the pupil premium. The actual allocation was £186,778 in the 16/17 budget and £180,859 in the 17/18 budget.

The Pupil Premium allocation has been spent in the following way. (Initiatives detailed below have all been introduced at Seven Mills Primary School since the first allocation of pupil premium in 2011, or were existing programmes that have been extended.)

Individualised teaching and learning support for pupils at risk of underachievement.

- Reading tuition, Reading Recovery and Personalised Learning for Reading are all daily 1:1 reading interventions delivered by trained teaching assistants, a dyslexia-specialist teacher and a specialist

Reading Recovery Teacher. Progress of pupils receiving these interventions, including those who are eligible for pupil premium, is monitored in detail, using Book Bands.

- The Spoken Language and Communication Specialist teacher focuses on achievement of bilingual pupils, including those who are eligible for pupil premium, by:
 - devising, delivering and managing 1:1 and small group intervention programmes;
 - training and supporting class teachers in making provision for bilingual learners;
 - ensuring that bilingual learners are identified and provided for, whatever their stage of learning English – from meeting the learning needs of children new to English all the way through to ensuring that bilingualism does not become an ‘invisible barrier’ to achievement for advanced bilingual learners.
- Booster and additional support teaching provided small group support for literacy and mathematics.

Allocation and review of these additional resources is carried out following termly pupil progress meetings, which identify pupils at risk of underachievement and those eligible for pupil premium.

The school also has a number of enrichment and enhancement activities which have an impact on pupil achievement by extending children’s experiences and giving them pupils access to a broad and balanced curriculum (e.g. on trips, instrumental tuition, etc). The school has a policy of requesting a lower parental contribution for trips (including residential trips) for pupils in receipt of pupil premium.

Forward Planning

The school plans to spend the 17/18 pupil premium allocation in the following way:

Pupil Premium Data: Impact

The impact of our pupil premium spending can be seen in the pupil attainment and progress data from 2017 (provisional data) below.

At Key Stage 1 disadvantaged pupils (i.e. those eligible for the pupil premium) performed almost exactly in line with disadvantaged pupils nationally. In Year 1 phonics and at Key Stage 2 disadvantaged pupils at Seven Mills performed broadly in line with or somewhat better than **all** pupils nationally.

Please note: National Data figures for attainment of disadvantaged pupils not yet available for 2017 at time of writing (Sep 2017), so 2016 figures used provisionally as indicated.
