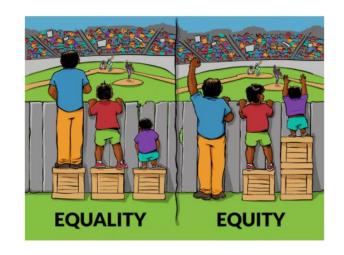
Vision for Inclusion

- Work with staff, parents, carers and other agencies to ensure pupils get appropriate support and high quality teaching
- Advise on the deployment of the school's delegated budget and other resources
- Be the point of contact for external agencies and the local authority in regards to SEND
- Liaise with prior and next providers of education at transition points
- Ensure the school meets its statutory obligations under the Equality Act 2010
- Ensure SEND records are kept up to date

- Work with the headteacher and SENCO to determine the strategic development of the SEN policy and provision in the school



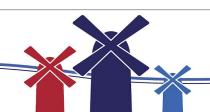

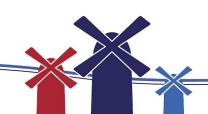


Broad Areas of SEND

The SEND code of practice identifies four broad areas of SEND. Most children have a primary need (e.g. autism spectrum disorder) but they may have secondary needs in other areas too.



Communication and Interaction	Cognition and Learning	Social, Emotional and Mental Health	Physical and/or Sensory needs
E.g. speech and language difficulties, autism spectrum disorder	E.g. difficulties processing information, specific learning difficulties, dyslexia, dyspraxia	E.g. attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), behavioural needs, anxiety	E.g. visual impairments, long term health needs, hearing impairments



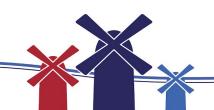
Identifying and Assessing Pupils with SEN

At Seven Mills, we assess children's learning through termly assessments and in class observations where appropriate. Where teachers have concerns about a child's progress, they will discuss this with Matthew or Sarah at termly pupil progress meetings.

Children with special educational needs are identified as those whose progress is:

- Significantly slower than that of their peers starting from the same baseline
- Does not match or better the child's previous rate of progress
- Does not sufficiently close the attainment gap between the child and their peers
- Widens the attainment gap
- Slower than expected due to a suspected or diagnosed learning or medical need

If a parent or carer is worried about their child's progress, they should contact the class teacher in the first instance who will discuss with Matthew or Sarah as appropriate.



Consulting and Involving Parents and

Children

When identifying new needs, we will meet with parents/carers to discuss the pupil's strengths, needs and next steps

Parents/carers of children can request that Matthew or Sarah attend parents' evening to discuss new or ongoing concerns

> Where appropriate, children evaluate their progress towards their targets and set new ones with their class teacher



We use 'Provision Map' software to plan how we will meet children's needs.

We will share logins for provision map with parents so they can view, comment on and evaluate children's plans.

<u>Progress against the National Curriculum</u>

Children are assessed against
Development Matters (EYFS) or the
National curriculum (Y1 - Y6) each term.
These assessments tell us how much
progress a child has made, and whether
they need further support.

<u>Children working below the National</u> <u>Curriculum</u>

Children who are not yet working towards the national curriculum will be assessed against the <u>engagement model</u>. Children with ASD may also be assessed using the Autism Education Trust framework

Progress against Provision Map Targets

Each term, children are assessed against the targets on their provision maps. They are given a score between -2 and +2.

-2	Has made significantly less than expected progress
-1	Has made less than expected progress
0	Has made expected progress
1	Has made more than expected progress
2	Has made significantly more than expected progress

Supporting Pupils Moving Between Settings

When a child transitions to Seven Mills, Matthew or Sarah will:

- Contact the SENCO to discuss the child's strengths and needs
- Request professional reports and provision maps

If the child has an EHCP, Matthew or Sarah will contact Tower Hamlets to ensure appropriate funding is in place to meet the child's needs..

When a child transitions from Seven Mills, Matthew or Sarah will:

- Offer an appointment to the new SENCO to discuss the child's strengths and needs
- Send all relevant documentation, such as provision maps and professional reports

If your child has an EHCP, where possible, we will organise for a key adult to transition the child to their new setting



<u>Supporting Pupils Moving to Secondary</u> <u>School</u>



Secondary school can be daunting for children, especially those with additional needs. We will support children with SEND by:

Meeting with their new SENCO to pass over all relevant information Promoting additional transition events to support children with SEND, such as those run by AFASIAC

Supporting parents to decide on the most appropriate placement for their child's needs

Teaching explicit skills for secondary school, such as reading timetables.

A vital part of children's education is preparing them for their adult lives. We have four strands in our preparation for adulthood:

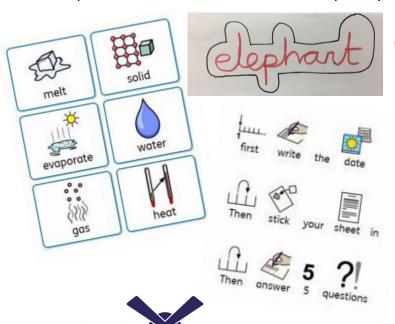




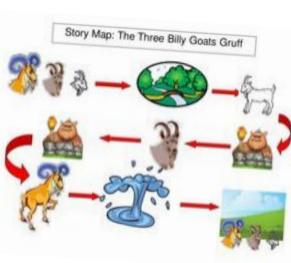

Adaptations to the Curriculum and Learning Environment



All children, regardless of SEND, should access an ambitious, broad and balanced curriculum.

Safeguarding curriculum adaptations

Children with SEND are at an increased risk of harm and exploitation.
Children with disabilities are up to 3.7 times more likely to experience harm or neglect. As such, our curriculum must be adapted to empower our children to understand and speak out against harm.



Relationships and Sex Education

We use the JIGSAW PSHE scheme to teach RSE to all our children.

Where children with additional needs are accessing RSE, the class teacher will meet with the SENCO to discuss how best to deliver this content and check for understanding. Each child is different, but strategies we may use include: social stories, repetition, key phrases, visuals, 'circle of intimacy'. We will also meet parents before teaching content to ensure we meet the needs of their children.



Additional support for learning

We have a skilled in-house team and external professionals who may support your child throughout their time at Seven Mills.

Teaching assistants will work 1:1 with a child when:

- Their EHCP states this is necessary and adequate funding is provided by the local authority
- Your child is receiving a bespoke intervention
- Your child needs support to be safe in the school environment

As children move through the school, we aim to reduce the amount of 1:1 support they receive in order to encourage independence, self-regulation and social integration.

Class teachers will:

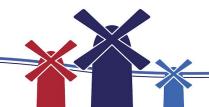
- Differentiate learning so that all children can access at a developmentally appropriate level
- Work with all children to ensure everyone makes progress within a lesson
- Direct support staff

Teaching assistants will work with groups of children in class who:

- Require additional support with their learning as directed by the class teacher
- Have 'targeted adult support' specified on their provision maps
- Are receiving a specific intervention

The school is also supported by:

- Our educational psychologist, Ruki

- Our private speech and language therapist,
 Carolina Rojas
- Our Phoenix Outreach teacher, Sean Flynn



SEND Classroom

At Seven Mills, we offer a specialist setting for children with ASD in Year 1 and Year 2, run by our Assistant Inclusion Lead, Sarah Riddleston.



Purpose of the SEND classroom

The purpose of our SEND classroom is to provide specialist and personalised learning to children on the autism spectrum, with the aim of bridging the gap between play-based learning approaches in the Early Years Foundation Stage, and more formal learning approaches in Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2. When children are ready, we will work to reintegrate them into their mainstream classroom lessons.

Who is the SEND classroom for?

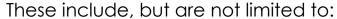
The SEND classroom at Seven Mills has been set up to cater for children with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) in Year 1 and Year 2 who have, or are awaiting, an Education, Health Care Plan (EHCP). Children who attend the SEND classroom will:

- Require a highly personalised curriculum which cannot be catered for through quality first teaching within the mainstream classroom.
- And/ Or require significant levels of support, such as a sensory timetable, 5-10 minute learning sessions or TA support to manage emotional regulation, in order to work towards national curriculum expectations.



<u>Support from External Providers</u>

Most children's needs can be met through the assess, plan, do, review cycle in the school. Where a child is not making progress through in-school support, or where they have specific needs that require additional expertise, parents will meet with the SENCO to discuss a referral to external providers.



- Occupational therapy, who can support with physical or self-care needs.
- Educational psychology, who can assess children's needs and advise school on how best to support the child to make progress.
- Speech and language therapy, who can assess children's communication needs and provide support at home and in school.
- Short breaks team, who provide holiday care for children with SEND.
- Visual and hearing impairment teams.
- Disability advisory and assistive technology team at Tower Hamlets.
- CAMHs, who support with children's mental health and wellbeing.
- Bereavement charities, who support children who have lost a loved one.

<u>Arrangements for the Admission of Disabled Pupils</u>



Where pupils with disabilities join Seven Mills in our Nursery, the Matthew or Sarah will liaise with the parents of the pupil and any professionals working with the child to ensure a smooth start to school, and to ensure that any specialist equipment is readily available for the child when they start.

Where pupils with disabilities transfer from another setting, Matthew or Sarah will liaise with the parents of the pupil, any professionals working with the child and the previous SENCO to prepare the child and the school, ensuring that they equipment and staff are ready for when the child starts.



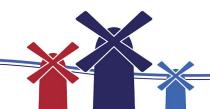
How Equipment and Facilities to Support Children and Young People with SEND will be Secured

Equipment which forms part of our quality first teaching offer, or which is specified and funded through a child's EHCP will be purchased through the school's delegated SEND budget. This may include equipment such as:

- Timers
- Fidget toys
- IPADS or laptops

Specialist equipment which is additional to our quality first teaching offer, or which is not specified in a child's EHCP, will be purchased through the Local Authority. This may include equipment or facilities such as:

- Adaptations to our environment such as building ramps or expanding door frames to allow wheelchair access
- Additional hoisting or changing facilities
- Laptops or IPADS with specific software to support learning



Enabling pupils with SEND to engage in activities in school



Extra-curricular activities and school visits, including our residential trips, are always available to pupils with SEND, so long as all children are safe.

The SENCO will meet with parents to discuss how to ensure specific activities are accessible to their child, and arrange for additional support if needed and available.

Children with specific needs may be offered priority places for extra-curricular activities to promote their social integration, health and preparation for adulthood.

We actively encourage children with SEND to take on responsibilities within the school, such as school council.

Seven Mills is part of the Isle of Dogs inclusive sports group, which offers children with SEND opportunities to partake in sports that are adapted to their needs.

Our <u>accessibility plan</u> details how we ensure that children with disabilities are never excluded from participating in activities, and details the facilities we provide to help disabled pupils access our school.



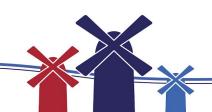

Complaints about SEND Provision

Complaints about SEND provision in our school should be made to the SENCO in the first instance. They will then be referred to the <u>school's complaints policy</u>.

The parents of pupils with disabilities have the right to make disability discrimination claims to the first-tier SEND tribunal if they believe that our school has discriminated against their children. They can make a claim about alleged discrimination regarding:

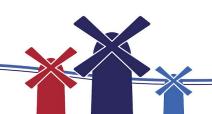
- Exclusions
