Legal Background

We are committed to meeting the public sector statutory duties as detailed below. We understand that the duties apply to service delivery and employment and staff management as well as policy development and implementation.

General Duty under the Equality Act 2010

The purpose of this policy is to set out how our practice and policies have due regard to the need to:

- eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under this Act.
- advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it
- foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it.

The Specific Duties of the Act enable schools to meet their obligations under the Public Sector Equality Duty (PSED)

The specific duties require schools to:

- Publish annually information quantitative and qualitative, showing compliance with the public sector equality duty (PSED) set out in clause 149 of the Equality Act 2010.
- To set every four years one or more specific measurable equality objectives that further the aims of the equality duty.

Protected Characteristics

The Equality Act 2010 protects pupils from discrimination and harassment based on protected characteristics. The protected characteristics for the schools' provisions are:

- Pregnancy, maternity and breastfeeding

- Religion and belief
- Sexual orientation
- Marriage and civil partnership (staff only)

Disability

Our school implements an accessibility plan which is aimed at:

- enabling disabled pupils to participate fully in the curriculum through adaptations and reasonable adjustments
- improving the physical environment of the school to enable disabled pupils to take better advantage of education, benefits, facilities and services provided
- improving the availability of accessible information to disabled pupils.

Community Cohesion

Community cohesion supports good practice in educating pupils about equality and diversity. It contributes to the schools' efforts to provide a broad, balanced curriculum.

Roles and Responsibilities

We operate equality of opportunity in our day-to-day practice.

The Governing Board, supported by the Headteacher and staff, is responsible for ensuring the implementation of this scheme.

The Headteacher has overall responsibility for ensuring that the action plan is delivered effectively. All staff are responsible for delivering the scheme both as employees and as it relates to their area of work.

The Governing Board will:

- provide leadership and drive for the development and regular review of our equality scheme

- Comply fully with legislation which protects staff from discrimination on the grounds of gender, transsexual status, race, disability, sexual orientation, religion or belief, or age. With regard to disability, reasonable adjustments will be made to prevent a disabled person being at a substantial disadvantage in comparison with a person who is not disabled.

We collect a range of information relating to incidents of harassment and bullying including those relating to racism, disability and gender. We conduct pupil voice activities and monitor playtime and lunchtime incidents.

Our equality objectives are taken from areas which the school has identified as a priority. They are specific, measurable, achievable, relevant and time-limited and will be set at least every four years.

The areas identified as priorities are:

- 2. To monitor & improve levels of parental and pupil engagement in learning and school life, across all activities to ensure equity and fairness in access and engagement.
- 3. To continue to ensure the school environment is as accessible as feasibly possible to pupils, staff and visitors.
- 4. To ensure that all pupils make good progress based on their individual starting points by providing support measures identified through effective tracking and monitoring of groups of pupils and challenging expectations of limited/poor performance for particular groups or individuals.
- 6. To improve pupils' understanding of the individuals' characteristics listed in the Equality Act (making use of the Equality and Diversity Training staff undertook in autumn 2023)
- 7. To ensure all pupils engage and achieve, receiving the education to enable them to develop into active and responsible citizens who will contribute effectively to society.
