TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

The trustees present their annual report together with the accounts and auditor's report of the charitable company for the year 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023. The annual report serves the purposes of both a trustees' report, and a directors' report and strategic report under company law.

The Academy Trust operates an Academy for pupils aged 4 to 11 serving a catchment area in Darfield. It has a pupil capacity of 261 and had a roll of 306 in the school census on 19 January 2023.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

The academy trust is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the academy trust.

The Governors act as the Trustees for the activities of the Academy Trust and are also the Directors of the Academy Trust for the purposes of company law. The charitable company is known as Upperwood Academy.

Details of the Governors who served throughout the year are included in the Reference and Administrative Details on page 1.

Members' liability

Each member of the Charitable Company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Academy Trust in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as maybe required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

Trustees' indemnities

Governors' liability insurance cover was in place during the year ended 31 August 2023.

Method of recruitment and appointment or election of trustees

Under the terms of its articles, the Academy Trust shall have the following Governors.

- · Up to 11 Governors appointed by the Members;
- Any staff Governors, appointed through such process as the Members may determine, provided the total number does not exceed one third of the total number of Governors;
- · A minimum of two Parent Governors elected by parents of registered pupils at Upperwood Academy;
- Up to three Co-opted Governors may be appointed by the Governors who have not themselves been co-opted; and
- · The Principal.

A Governor's term of office is four years (excluding the Principal) but a Governor is eligible for re-election or reappointment at the end of their term.

Appropriate training is provided to all new Governors, as required.

Governors are recruited via canvassing of school community.

The Governors who were in office at 1 September 2022 and served throughout the year are listed on page 1.

Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of trustees

Following their appointment all new Governors receive an introduction to their role from the Chair and the Principal, an induction pack and are allocated a mentor from the Governing Body. All new Governors are actively encouraged to take advantage of the Governor Forum sessions held at various venues and run by the Local Authority's Governor Support Service. In addition, Governors have access to the National Governor Association via their website. Induction on to the governing body will require the prerequisite of level 2 safeguarding training for all new members in addition to the annual KCSIE training.

Organisational structure

The organisational structure consists of three levels: The Full Board of Governors, Governors' sub committees and the Senior Leadership Team. The aim of the management structure is to devolve responsibility and encourage involvement in the decision making at all levels.

The Governors are responsible for the strategic management of the Academy Trust, making decisions about key aspects including strategic direction, annual budgets and targets, capital expenditure, senior staff appointments and policy changes. The full Governing Body retains overall responsibility.

The sub committees comprise of Chair or Vice Chair, Principal and at least three other Governors. These committees make decisions relating to staffing appointments and budget spending. All decisions are referred back to the full board for ratification. The full board monitors budget spending.

The Senior Leadership Team comprises the Principal, Deputy Principal, KS1 Manager, SEN Coordinator, EYFS Manager and KS2 Manager. These managers control the Academy Trust at an executive level implementing the policies laid down by the Governors and reporting back to them. As a group the Senior Leadership Team are responsible for the authorisation of spending within agreed budgets.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

The governing body has the power to effect pay across the academy. Any person employed to work at the school, other than the principal, must withdraw from a meeting at which the pay or appraisal of any other employee of the school, is under consideration. The principal must withdraw from that part of the meeting where the subject of consideration is his or her own pay. A relevant person must withdraw where there is a conflict of interest or any doubt about his/her ability to act impartially.

Where possible, no member of the governing body who is employed to work in the school shall be eligible for membership of this committee.

The pay committee will be attended by the principal in an advisory capacity. Where the pay committee has invited an external adviser to attend and offer advice on the determination of the Principal's pay, that person will withdraw at the same time as the Principal while the committee reaches its decision. Any member of the committee required to withdraw will do so.

The terms of reference for the pay committee will be determined from time to time by the governing body. The current terms of reference are:

- Undertake the annual salary review and determine the individual salary of all staff by considering and ratifying the Headteacher's recommendations for the pay of all staff, ensuring the performance management policy and pay policy has been consistently and robustly applied.
- · Decide the school's approach towards the exercising of pay discretions.
- · Comply with all statutory and contractual obligations.
- · Keep the school's pay policy up-to-date and under review.
- Recommend to the Governing Body and keep under review a policy and procedures for performance management in school.
- · Approve the appraisals and pay recommendations for the Leadership Team.
- Report to the Governing Body all decisions taken within the powers delegated to the Committee.
- · Review and recommend appropriate training and development activities in respect of the above.

The report of the pay committee will be placed in the confidential section of the governing body's agenda and will either be received or referred back. Reference back may occur only if the pay committee has exceeded its powers under the policy.

Related parties and other connected charities and organisations

There is a Parent Group called F.O.C.U.S. which organises various fundraising events to provide additional resources for the pupils. Details of any other related party transactions can be found in note 24.

Objectives and activities

Objects and aims

The principal object of the Academy Trust is the operation of Upperwood Academy to provide education for pupils between the ages of 4 and 11.

Objectives, strategies and activities

The Academy Trust's main strategy is encompassed in its school vision which is: 'Aiming for excellence within a happy, caring community for all' with the following values:

- · Inspiring creative minds and enthusiasm for discovery;
- · Encourage persistence, independence and high expectations;
- · Instilling respect and understanding of social and moral responsibility;
- · Promoting a strong sense of community where everyone is valued as an individual;
- · Ensuring all can learn within a safe, stimulating and supportive environment;
- · Building the courage to embrace risk and continually question;
- · Equipping all with the skills to adapt to the future;
- · Valuing, encouraging and celebrating achievement in all its forms;
- · Providing opportunity and challenge within and beyond the curriculum;
- · Appreciating the environment and committing to sustainability.
- · Fostering spiritual and cultural awareness; and
- · Making learning fun.

The main objectives of the Academy Trust during the year ended 31 August 2023 are summarised below:

- · To raise the standard of literacy and numeracy across the school;
- · To implement monitoring of the Pupil Premium;
- · To ensure a well-balanced and engaging curriculum
- . To ensure a smooth transition for all 11-year olds as they embark on the next phase of their education;
- · To continue to improve attendance:
- · To continue to improve the learning environment to facilitate teaching and learning.
- To support pupils who have missed education through the COVID-19 pandemic.

Public benefit

Upperwood Academy is a state funded primary school which provides and strives to promote and support the advancement of education to primary school aged children within the wider Barnsley area. The Governors have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers.

In setting our objectives and planning our activities the Governors have given careful consideration to the wider community. Over the year the contributions that benefitted the local community included the following:

- Engaging in many charitable fund-raising events, including the NSPCC;
- · Community links with Darfield Museum and Barnsley Museum;
- · Active sporting links with local football, athletics, tennis and gymnastic clubs;
- Providing work experience for students from local secondary schools;
- · Providing educational work placements for Barnsley College, Sheffield Hallam, Dearne Valley College.

Strategic report

Achievements and performance

- · Attainment at KS2 in mathematics was in the highest 20% nationally in all schools.
- KS2 attainment of the expected standard (100+) in reading, writing and mathematics (77%) was significantly above national and in the highest 20% in 2023.
- · Absent rates in the lowest 20% of all schools.
- · An expansion of our nurture team to support all learners.
- · Ensuring our Safeguarding team have been available and vigilant in their support of pupils and families;
- Ensuring the S.L.T. have maintained high quality in this provision through keen monitoring procedures.

Key performance indicators

The Governors consider that the following are key performance indicators for the Academy Trust;

- · Deliver a strong carry forward allowing the long-term going concern;
- · Distribute expenditure evenly throughout the year;
- · Actual expenditure to closely correlate with budgeted expenditure;
- · Minimise expenditure through smarter procurement and Best Value;
- · Generate additional income; and through our work with Teaching Schools;
- · Reduce energy usage where possible.

The Governors have been pleased that expectations for all key performance indicators listed have been successfully met during the year.

Going concern

After due consideration, the Governing Body has a reasonable expectation that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Statement of Accounting Policies.

Financial review

Most of the Academy Trust's recurrent income is obtained from the ESFA in the form of grants, the use of which is restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the ESFA during the year ended 31 August 2023 and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

During the year ended 31 August 2023, recurrent grant funding from the ESFA together with other incoming resources amounted to £1,732,761 (2022: £1,693,334) (excluding capital grants).

Total expenditure during the year amounted to £1,745,490 (2022: £1,567,595) (excluding capital expenditure and pension scheme deficit adjustments). Therefore, resulting in a current year deficit of £24,614 (2022 Surplus: £79,641). All figures exclude the restricted fixed asset and pension deficit reserves movements, except transfers of capital expenditure from GAG of £11,885 (2022: £46,098).

The cumulative balance carried forward at 31 August 2023 was £485,661 (2022: £510,275) (excluding restricted fixed asset and pension deficit reserves).

At 31 August 2023 the net book value of fixed assets was £2,431,697 (2022: £2,449,353) and movements in tangible fixed assets are shown in note 12 to the financial statements. During the year the assets were used exclusively for providing education and the associated support services to the pupils of the Academy Trust.

Reserves policy

The Governors review the reserve levels of the Academy Trust annually. This review encompasses the nature of income and expenditure streams, the need to match income with commitments and the nature of the reserves.

The Governors have determined that the permitted level of free reserves for recurrent costs should be maintained in order to provide sufficient working capital to cover delays between spending and receipt of grants, and to provide a cushion to deal with unexpected emergencies such as urgent maintenance.

Financial position

The Academy Trust held fund balances at 31 August 2023 of £2,891,300 (2022: £2,701,330).

These funds are made up of restricted fixed asset funds of £2,423,639 (2022: £2,440,055), other restricted funds of £190,827 (2022: £242,711) and unrestricted funds of £294,834 (2022: £267,564).

Additionally, there is a pension fund reserve with a deficit of £18,000 (2022: £249,000) which is being funded by contributions through payroll.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

Investment policy

The Academy Trust currently has no financial investments; however, should it decide to pursue these in the future the policy is to delegate the management of investments to a financial expert.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The main risks that the Academy Trust is exposed to are summarised below. For each of these risks the probability, impact and seriousness have been considered together with appropriate action and avoidance plans.

Strategic and Reputational – This covers unfavourable Ofsted reports, risk of uncontrollable events and insufficient demand for Academy services. Competition from other schools with similar objects and little scope for differentiation can have an effect. Also includes the capacity of existing buildings to deliver teaching and learning to pupils.

Finance Risk – The risk of the Academy Trust not operating within its budget and running a deficit. Risks linked to income not increasing at the same rate of inflation over the coming years. There are risks also in connection with the deficit on the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) although the Governors are comfortable with the current level of employer contributions the Academy Trust is required to pay.

Fundraising

The Academy raises funds in line with these basic principles:

- · School fundraising is purely to support funding for school resources.
- · Fundraising supports pupil welfare and enjoyment.
- · We only support commercial fundraising for good causes / charitable organisations.
- · Fundraising complaints will be dealt with directly by the Accounting Officer.

Plans for future periods

The Governors' main plans for future periods are:

- To support the welfare of pupils and staff to ensure a healthy and prosperous work place.
- To continue to develop a rich and varied curriculum across the whole school which outlines the key knowledge children should acquire in each subject in each year group.
- · To continue to improve attendance.
- To improve Performance Management systems to increase employee performance and deliver a whole school teaching profile that is outstanding.
- · To support pupil welfare through nurture support to ensure pupil engagement continues to be high.

Auditor

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- · There is no relevant audit information of which the Academy Trust's auditor is unaware; and
- The trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit
 information and to establish that the auditor is aware of that information.

The financial statement auditors, Hart Shaw LLP, are willing to continue in office and a resolution to reappoint them will be proposed in the annual general meeting.

Scope of responsibility

As trustees, we acknowledge we have overall responsibility for ensuring that Upperwood Academy has an effective and appropriate system of control, financial and otherwise. However, such a system is designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives, and can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

As trustees we have reviewed and taken account of the guidance in DfE's Governance Handbook and competency framework for governance.

The board of trustees has delegated the day-to-day responsibility to the principal, as accounting officer, for ensuring financial controls conform with the requirements of both propriety and good financial management and in accordance with the requirements and responsibilities assigned to it in the funding agreement between Upperwood Academy and the Secretary of State for Education. The accounting officer is also responsible for reporting to the board of trustees any material weaknesses or breakdowns in internal control.

Governance

The information on governance included here supplements that described in the Trustees' Report and in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities. The board of trustees has formally met 6 times during the year. Attendance during the year at meetings of the board of trustees was as follows:

The coverage of the board's work is to ensure a curriculum is delivered for all pupils that engages and results in the standards of attainment across the whole school that are above national averages in all arears. Furthermore ensuring that the welfare and safety of both pupils and staff is paramount.

The board continues to perform well and this is reflected by the high standards achieved by our pupils and by the prudent financial decisions made that have allowed a continued good education to be delivered to all pupils in a climate of evermore financial challenge.

The board reflects on national standards data, internal progress data, internal financial returns and also benchmark these areas with similar schools both locally and nationally. The board are content in the knowledge that an open approach to sharing data is clear and transparent.

The continued evaluation of role of governance takes place termly, the key area of development for 2023 is to further develop governor knowledge of the day to day education received by our pupils. This has resulted in scheduled governor weeks so that clear mandates for decision making are based on a good knowledge of the school and the needs of our pupils.

Our main areas of development in 2023 are ensuring

- Our Early Years Provision knits well with the rest of the school's curriculum. Ensuring the quality experience
 experienced are not only valid in their own right but they also support future learning in school.
- Assessment structures in foundation subjects are purposeful and embedded.

Conflicts of interest

The trust board ensures that the requirements for managing connected party transactions are known to all relevant individuals and are applied in practice.

The chair of the trust and the accounting officer ensure that their capacity to control and influence does not conflict with these requirements. They manage personal relationships with connected parties to avoid both real and perceived conflicts of interest, promoting integrity and openness in accordance with the 'seven principles of public life'.

The trust recognises that some relationships with connected parties may attract greater public scrutiny, such as:

- Transactions with individuals in a position of control and influence, including the chair of the trust and accounting officer.
- Payments to commercial organisations which have a profit motive, as opposed to those in the voluntary sector.
- · Relationships with external auditors that go beyond their duty to deliver a statutory audit.

The trust maintains sufficient records, and makes sufficient disclosures in their annual accounts, to evidence that transactions with these parties, and all other connected parties, have been conducted in accordance with the high standards of accountability and transparency required within the public sector.

The trust's register of interests captures relevant business and pecuniary interests of members, trustees and senior employees, including:

- Directorships, partnerships and employments with businesses that provide goods or services to the trust.
- Trusteeships and governorships, including at other educational institutions and charities, irrespective of whether there is a trading relationship with the trust.

For each interest: the name of the business, the nature of the business, the nature of the interest, and the date the interest began.

The trust considers whether to include the interests of other individuals in the register, with a presumption in favour of disclosure to support transparency and accountability. This may include other employees of the trust and close family members of individuals already on the register. Close family relationships are defined as a close member of the family, or member of the same household, who may be expected to influence, or be influenced by, the person. This includes, but is not limited to, a child, parent, spouse or civil partner.

Interests are not limited to the items above and the trust considers whether other interests should be registered. If in doubt the presumption is towards including an interest in the register.

The trust board keeps their register of interests up-to-date through regular review.

The trust publishes on its website relevant business and pecuniary interests of trustees and members. The academy has discretion over the publication of interests of other individuals including parents, spouses, civil partners, cohabitees and children.

This year, 2023/24 we shall be exploring the succession planning for Senior Leadership within school structures. This may include recruitment of Senior Leaders and the Academy clearly identifying the support it requires to be successful.

Review of value for money

As accounting officer, the principal has responsibility for ensuring that the academy trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The accounting officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes, as well as estates safety and management, achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

GOVERNANCE STATEMENT (CONTINUED)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

The accounting officer considers how the academy trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the board of trustees where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where available. The accounting officer for the academy trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

- Receiving quotes from existing and potential new coach providers for school visits resulting in proving the current provider presents the best value for money.
- Receiving quotes from existing and potential new staff insurance companies proving the current provider presents the best value for money.
- Receiving quotes from existing and potential new photocopying companies to present the best value for money.
- Going through a procurement process to deliver our new library.
- · Procuring our own supply staff, using existing or previous staff to save on costs.

It is worth noting that in September 2023 we had a full RAAC survey procured by the DFE. This survey (although no written confirmation has been received) found no evidence of RAAC in school.

The purpose of the system of internal control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of academy trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in Upperwood Academy for the period 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and accounts.

Capacity to handle risk

The board of trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the academy trust is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The board of trustees is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy trust's significant risks that has been in place for the period 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and accounts. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of trustees.

The risk and control framework

The academy trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- Comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of trustees;
- Regular reviews by the finance and general purposes committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes:
- · Setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- · Clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- Identification and management of risks.

The board of trustees has considered the need for a specific internal audit function and has decided to buy-in an internal audit service from MGRW.

MGRW's role includes giving advice on financial and other matters and performing a range of checks on the academy trusts financial and other systems. In particular, the checks carried out in the current period included:

- · Management reporting
- Accounting control account reconciliations (including fixed assets)
- Income recognition
- Procurement & purchase order process
- Payroll
- Risk management
- · Budget planning & monitoring
- Benchmarking
- Trust governance
- . Data & IT issues (cyber security)

On a termly basis, MGRW reports to the board of trustees, through the audit and risk committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the board of trustees' financial responsibilities.

On an annual basis MGRW prepare a summary report to the committee outlining the areas reviewed, key findings, recommendations, and conclusions to help the committee consider actions and assess year on year progress.

Review of effectiveness

As accounting officer the principal has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- · The work of the internal reviewer;
- The work of the external auditor;
- The work of the executive managers within the academy trust who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

The accounting officer has been advised of the implications of the result of their review of the system of internal control by the finance and general purposes committee and plan to ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

Opinion

In preparing the accounts, the trustees are responsible for assessing the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the trustees either intend to liquidate the charitable company, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the accounts

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the accounts as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these accounts.

We have assessed the overall susceptibility of the financial statements to material misstatement due to irregularities as moderate risk due to the inherent regulatory environment and financial reporting requirements within the sector. Furthermore, increased public scrutiny due to use of public funds increases the risk around certain financial reporting disclosures. However, as a result, there are stronger financial controls around sensitive financial reporting disclosures imposed by the ESFA therefore this reduces the risk of material misstatements as a result of irregularities being undetected. The procedures performed by the audit team included:

- Communicating identified laws and regulations at planning throughout the audit team to remain alert to any
 indications of non-compliance throughout the audit.
- Enquiry of management and those charged with governance around actual and potential litigation and claims as well as non-compliance with laws and regulations.

Review of the Internal Scrutiny Reports delivered in the year.

- Ensuring that any findings noted as part of our work on regularity (as detailed in our Independent Reporting Accountant's Assurance Report) which indicate the possibility of irregularities and fraud, including any breaches of the Academies Financial Handbook, are also considered as part of our conclusions here.
- Review of the Accounting Officer's Statement of Regularity, Propriety and Compliance and the academy trust's Governance Statement disclosures.

We have assessed the overall susceptibility of the financial statements to material misstatement due to fraud. Management override is the most common way in which fraud might present itself and is therefore inherently high risk on any audit. Management override, which may cause there to be a material misstatement within the financial statements, may present itself in a number of ways, for example:

Override of internal controls (e.g. segregation of duties)

· Entering into transactions outside the normal course of operations, especially with related parties

Fraudulent revenue recognition and income being recorded in the wrong period

 Presenting bias in accounting judgements and estimates, particularly the ones disclosed in note 2 to the financial statements.

In order to reduce the risk of material misstatement to an acceptable level, numerous audit procedures were performed including:

· Enquiries of management as to whether they had any knowledge of any actual or suspected fraud

- Review of all material journal entries made throughout the year as well as those made to prepare the financial statements.
- Review of financial data for evidence of previously unidentified related party transactions that may not have been conducted in accordance with the Academy Trust Handbook 2022.

Reviewing minutes of meetings of those charged with governance.

 Reviewing the underlying rationale behind transactions in order to assess whether they were outside the normal course of business

· Increased substantive testing across all material income streams

 Assessing whether management's judgements and estimates indicated potential bias, particularly those disclosed in note 2 to the financial statements

Owing to the inherent limitations of an audit, there is an unavoidable risk that we may not have detected material misstatements in the financial statements, even though we have performed our audit in accordance with auditing standards. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

1 Accounting policies

Upperwood Academy is a charitable company. The address of its principal place of business is given on page 1 and the nature of its operations are set out in the trustees' report.

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts of the academy trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2022 to 2023 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Going concern

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate, ie whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the charitable company to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the accounts and have concluded that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern. Thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the academy trust has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the statement of financial activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the period for which it is receivable, and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Other income

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the academy trust has provided the goods or services.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

1.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Expenditure on raising funds

This includes all expenditure incurred by the academy trust to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

Charitable activities

These are costs incurred on the academy trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the academy trust apportioned to charitable activities.

1.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the balance sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding that require the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities and carried forward in the balance sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the statement of financial activities. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful life, as follows:

Long term leasehold land & buildings

Computer equipment

Fixtures, fittings & equipment

Leasehold improvements

Straight line over 125 years

Straight line over 3 years

Straight line between 4 - 20 years

Straight line over 50 years

Assets in the course of construction are included at cost. Depreciation on these assets is not charged until they are brought into use and reclassified to freehold or leasehold land and buildings.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

1.6 Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods of services it must provide.

1.7 Leased assets

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

1.8 Financial instruments

The academy trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy trust and their measurement basis are as follows.

Financial assets

Trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities

Trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition.

Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

1.9 Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

1.10 Taxation

The academy trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the academy trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by chapter 3 part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

1.11 Pensions benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary based on quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. The TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions are recognised in the period to which they relate.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2023

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high-quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to net income or expenditure are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the statement of financial activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses. Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

1.12 Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the academy trust at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Education and Skills Funding Agency.

2 Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Accounting estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost or income for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 23, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2013 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2023. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

The specific purposes for which the funds are to be applied are as follows:

General Annual Grant

The General Annual Grant (GAG) funds have been spent in line with the terms of the Master Funding Agreement.

Under the funding agreement with the Secretary of State, the academy trust was not subject to a limit on the amount of GAG that it could carry forward at 31 August 2023.

The academy has made a transfer of £11,885 (2022 - £46,098) from the restricted GAG fund to the restricted fixed asset fund to cover the costs of additional fixtures and fittings and IT equipment.

Universal infant free school meals

Universal Infant Free School Meals provides funding to offer free-school meals to pupils in reception, year 1 and year 2.

Pupil Premium

Pupil Premium is additional funding given to academies so that they can support their disadvantaged pupils and close the attainment gap between them and their peers.

Other DfE/ESFA Covid-19 funding

This includes recovery premium grant. The recovery premium funding is to support children whose education has been impacted by coronavirus and is focused on pupil premium eligible pupils.

Other DfE/ESFA grants

This includes rates relief, PE and sports grant, school led tutoring, supplementary grant and mainstream schools additional grant.

The rates relief grant was received to support the rates payable by the academy.

The PE and sports grant was funding received to support the sporting facilities of the academy.

School led tutoring grant is to support children to catch up on missed learning caused by coronavirus.

Supplementary Grant provides support for the costs of the Health and Social Care Levy and wider costs.

Mainstream Schools Additional Grant is as a result of a budget increase from the ESFA.

Other government grants

This includes special educational needs funding to provide support and facilities for pupils with special educational needs.

General funds

The general funds relates to income received to support the costs of providing school meals, uniform, music tuition, breakfast club and school trips.

The balance on restricted funds (excluding pension reserve) plus the balance on unrestricted funds at 31 August 2023 is £485,661 (2022; £510,275).

The restricted pension fund is in deficit to the value of £18,000 as at 31 August 2023 (2022: £249,000).

23 Pension and similar obligations

The academy trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by South Yorkshire Pension Authority. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016, and that of the LGPS related to the period ended 31 March 2019.

There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at either the beginning or the end of the financial year.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

Introduction

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academy trusts. All teachers have the option to opt out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary. These contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019.

The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

 employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% employer administration charge)

 total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £218,100 million, and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million giving a notional past service deficit of £22,000 million

 the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 2.4% above the rate of CPI. The assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return including earnings growth is 4.45%.

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2024.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the period amounted to £141,089 (2022: £121,652)

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local Government Pension Scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined-benefit scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contributions are as noted below. The agreed contribution rates for future years are 21.4% for employers and 5.5 to 12.5% for employees.

The academy has entered into an agreement with the governors to make additional contributions in addition to normal funding levels. Theses amounted to £nil (2022: £17,660) during the period of account to cover the period to 31 August 2023.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013 and on 21 July 2022, the Department for Education reaffirmed its commitment to the guarantee, with a parliamentary minute published on GOV.UK.
