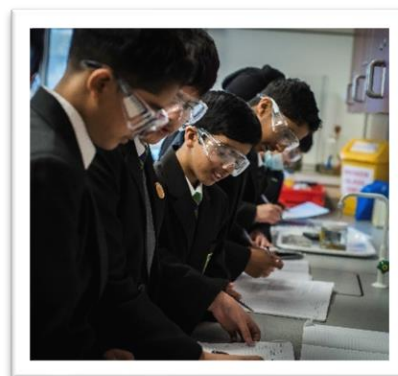
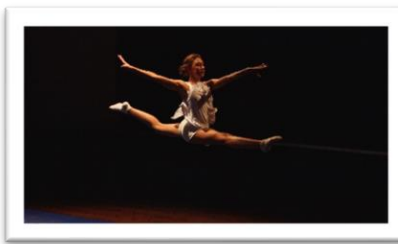
Another value, success, is evident in our pupils' love of being in school and the academic rigour which results in great outcomes.



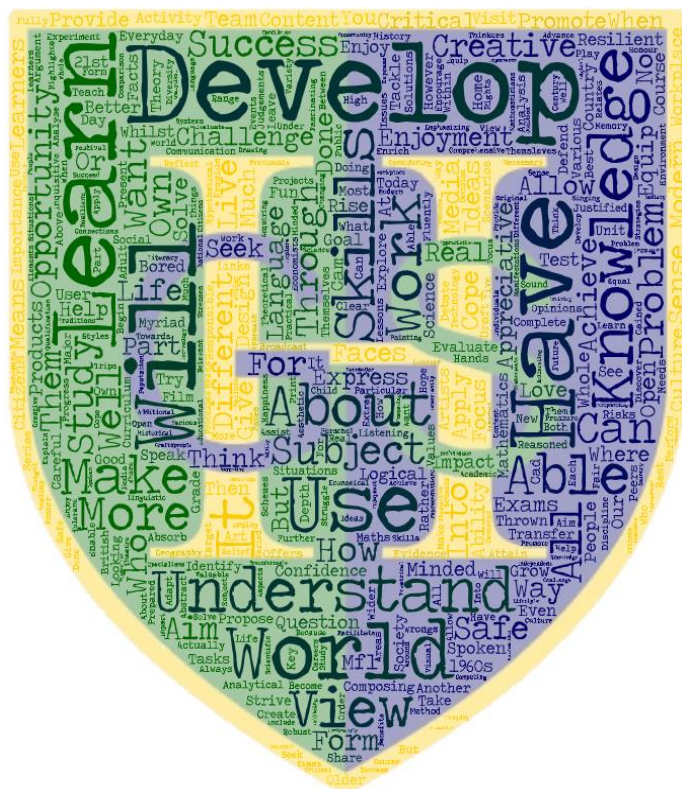
The Curriculum

The word cloud below is a collection of each departmental vision compressed into one. At Herschel, we run a faculty system (7 faculties) that supports small or single-person departments in sharing excellent practice and fostering positive working relationships.

Strong foundations are crucial to success; as such, we operate a **three**-year key stage 3. In fact, many core subjects are developing a seamless five-year or seven-year curriculum.



As a selective intake school (Years 7 -11), a sharp academic focus is vital in meeting the needs of our learners.



Our curriculum is ambitious and academic; lessons have a pace, and learners are challenged.

We expect most of our learners to study A levels and go on to university (many to high tariff universities) or to higher level apprenticeships.

Whilst we recognise the crucial role of GCSE and A-level grades, our focus is on so much more than just examinations.

Our extensive extra-curricular and broader curricular programme demonstrates our commitment to developing a range of skills and experiencing a range of activities

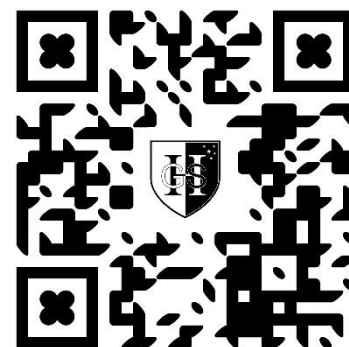
Key Stage 3 – Years 7-9

When your child arrives at Herschel, we build on their previous experience of the National Curriculum.

The subjects studied are: English, Mathematics, Science, Computing, History, Geography, Art, Music, Drama, Design Technology, Physical Education, Religious Studies, French or Spanish and PSHCE (Personal, Social, Health & Citizenship Education)

Progress is monitored throughout the Key Stage in the form of teacher assessments and examinations.

Currently, 'setting' is introduced from Year 8 in English, Mathematics and Science.



Key Stage 4 – Years 10-11

All Year 10 and Year 11 pupils study a core curriculum of English Language, English Literature, Mathematics, and Science (the majority of pupils take three Science GCSEs in Biology, Chemistry and Physics, and a small minority take Combined Science, which leads to two Science GCSEs), a Modern Foreign Language and either Geography or History.



Key Stage 5 – Years 12-13

We currently have a Sixth Form of around 300 students. We offer a wide range of A Level subjects and enrichment activities.

Respect for others

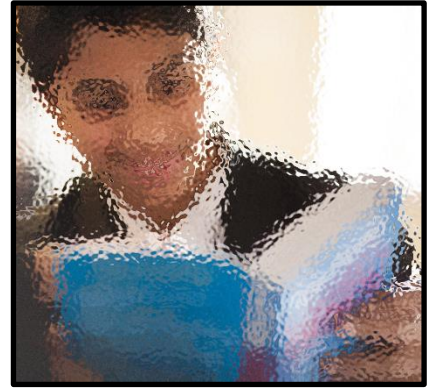
To show understanding, tolerance and courtesy towards other people.

Teaching and Learning

Herschel Grammar School is a dynamic learning community where students are challenged, inspired, and prepared for a changing world. They explore diverse topics—from science and history to art and literature.

They encounter a fascinating variety in their learning, with topics ranging from the workings of photosynthesis to strategies for attacking a medieval castle, and from the brushstrokes of Vincent Van Gogh to the mindset of Macbeth.

We prioritise excellent teaching, creativity, and independent thinking, helping students grow into curious, resilient learners who take responsibility for their progress in a supportive environment.



The House System

Herschel Grammar School is named after Sir William Herschel and his sister Caroline Herschel.

They were both German-born British astronomers and composers who are widely credited as the founders of sidereal astronomy for observing the heavenly bodies.

William found the planet Uranus and its two moons and formulated a theory of stellar evolution. Knighted in 1816, William was also the first astronomer to suggest that nebulae are composed of stars.

Whilst his sister Caroline is credited with the discovery of several comets. She was also the first woman to be paid for her contribution to science.

There are 5 houses across the school, all are linked to stars and constellations

Throughout the school year, there are a range of student and staff competitions held so that everyone can get involved in trying to achieve house points. The house that has the most points at the end of each term has its colour ribbons attached to the house trophy. This is displayed in the school foyer along with our many other trophies and awards.



Home Learning

At Herschel, there is no homework; however, we do expect learning to be completed at home - but we call this 'Home Learning'.

Completing work outside of lessons is essential to pupils' achievement.

Home Learning allows for opportunities to consolidate and enhance what has been covered in lessons. There will be many occasions where home learning prepares pupils for their next lesson, so completion is vital.

Home learning will challenge and provide opportunities to broaden learning and provide enrichment.

It will encourage independence and develop study habits that will be beneficial for future working or study patterns.

The time expected will range from approximately 7 hours a week in Year 7 to 15 hours in Year 11.

Extra-Curricular and Enrichment

Herschel believes that education is not confined to the classroom and that young people learn a great deal from taking part in other activities within and beyond the school. This fosters teamwork, leadership and the development of individual responsibility.

The fantastic outside sporting facilities include a brand-new floodlit AstroTurf, tennis/netball courts and school field, whilst inside the sports centre we have six badminton courts, indoor cricket nets and a dance studio. These allow for an impressive range of extracurricular clubs and sports teams, and pupils of all ages and sporting abilities are encouraged to become involved in regular inter-form competitions and in the school's sports day, often held at the Thames Valley Athletics track.

Pupils can also participate in drama productions, choir, orchestra and instrumental tuition. There are opportunities for public speaking, participation in STEM challenges, mock trial and a wide range of other national competitions and lunchtime and after-school clubs.

There are a range of leadership opportunities, including an extensive Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme.

There are a range of residential visits both in the UK and abroad, including the annual Year 7 Bushcraft residential, Ski Trip to Andorra, Creative Arts Trip to Cornwall and the prestigious World Challenge. In addition, there are reward trips, theatre visits, field trips, art exhibitions, competitions and much, much more.

Additional Educational Needs

Herschel Grammar School believes:

- All pupils, irrespective of ability, are of equal worth and are valued for the contribution that they can make. We encourage all pupils to develop their abilities to the fullest extent and recognise the achievements of others.

- Parents play an integral part; their co-operation is essential, and they have the right to know when their child is experiencing difficulty and be informed at all stages of support.

Pupils with specific learning difficulties are supported by the Trust SENCO and School ANCO (additional needs coordinator) together with appropriate staff from within and outside the school.

Pupils who are identified as high-performing have appropriate curriculum extension activities and are tracked and challenged by our High-Performing Pupil coordinator.

General Information

Uniform

Uniform is intended to help pupils present a smart "office" image and we believe it is one of the aspects which helps promote positive attitudes, high standards, corporate pride and a positive self-image in the community.

Uniform must be worn correctly at all times.

Pupils wear a black blazer and a school tie, with grey trousers, grey shorts or a grey skirt.

Timing of the School Day

The school has **five** teaching periods a day. Pupils are expected to be on-site by at least 8:20 am, with registration at 8.30 am. Lessons finish at 2.55 pm.

Private study facilities are available after school. The library is open until 4:15 pm daily, and the computer rooms are open for printing.

School Transport

NCP run several school transport routes servicing pupils in and around the following areas: Reading, Southall, Hayes, Langley and Norwood. For information on current routes please see our school transport information on our website. Places are popular and sometimes limited so these must be booked well in advance of starting Herschel

School Results 2025

Another Year of Exceptional Achievement

Once again, our students have delivered an outstanding set of examination results, continuing a tradition of excellence at Herschel Grammar School. Each year, they rise to new challenges, exceeding expectations in both attainment and progress.

While year-on-year comparisons remain complex due to the unique grading approaches due to the pandemic, the most reliable benchmark for comparisons are the 2019 results. Even so, it's important to recognise that the pandemic and subsequent cost-of-living crisis have created additional pressures for young people and their families. Against this backdrop, this year's results are even more impressive.

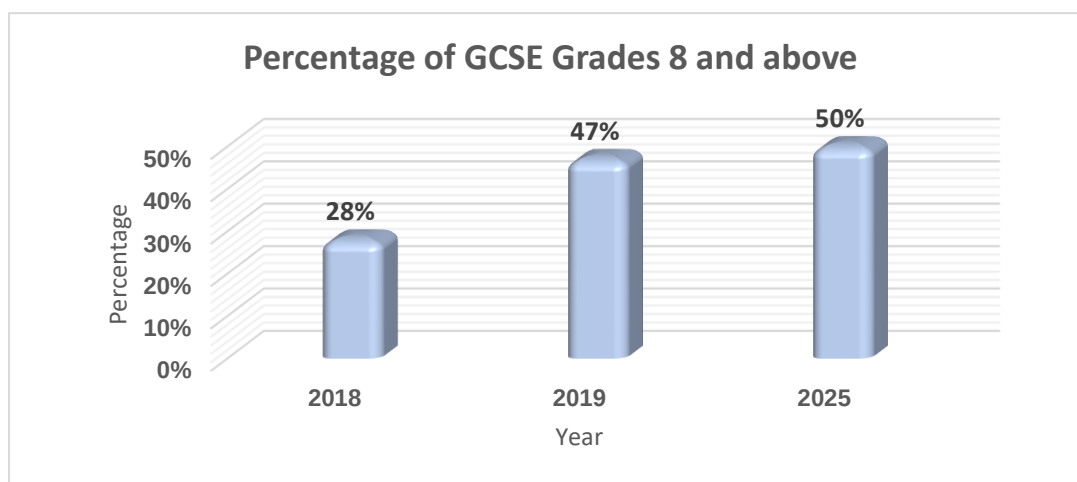
GCSE results

At GCSE the proportion of top grades has remained very strong, with 73% of entries awarded grade 7 or above and half of all results at the very top grade 8 or 9.

Mathematics and the sciences continue to lead the way, with exceptional outcomes across the board.

A Level Result 2025

This year's A Level results are among the best in the school's history and are truly remarkable. Year 13 students have risen to the challenge and achieved some of our best-ever results. Below is a summary of our grades and the point scores. These figures tell you the average grade and average points that students achieved in their academic qualifications. A points value is given to all qualifications so you can compare qualifications of different levels, size and grading systems.

The average grade at the A level and EPQ is a Grade B+, which is very credible and represents excellent attainment.

So wherever next, our students do so with confidence, a record of outstanding achievement and the skills to thrive in the future. We wish every one of them the very best as they take their exciting next steps.



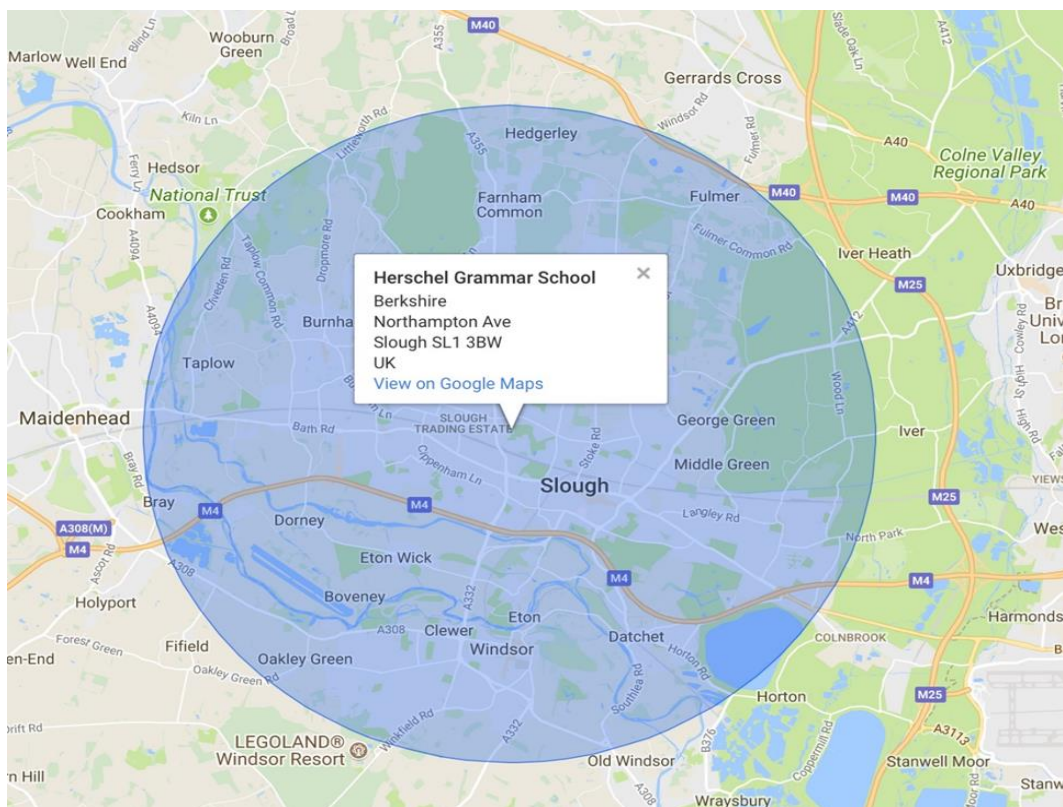
Admissions Information.

Priority will be given to pupils living within the school catchment area, which is defined as a home address within 4 miles of the school.

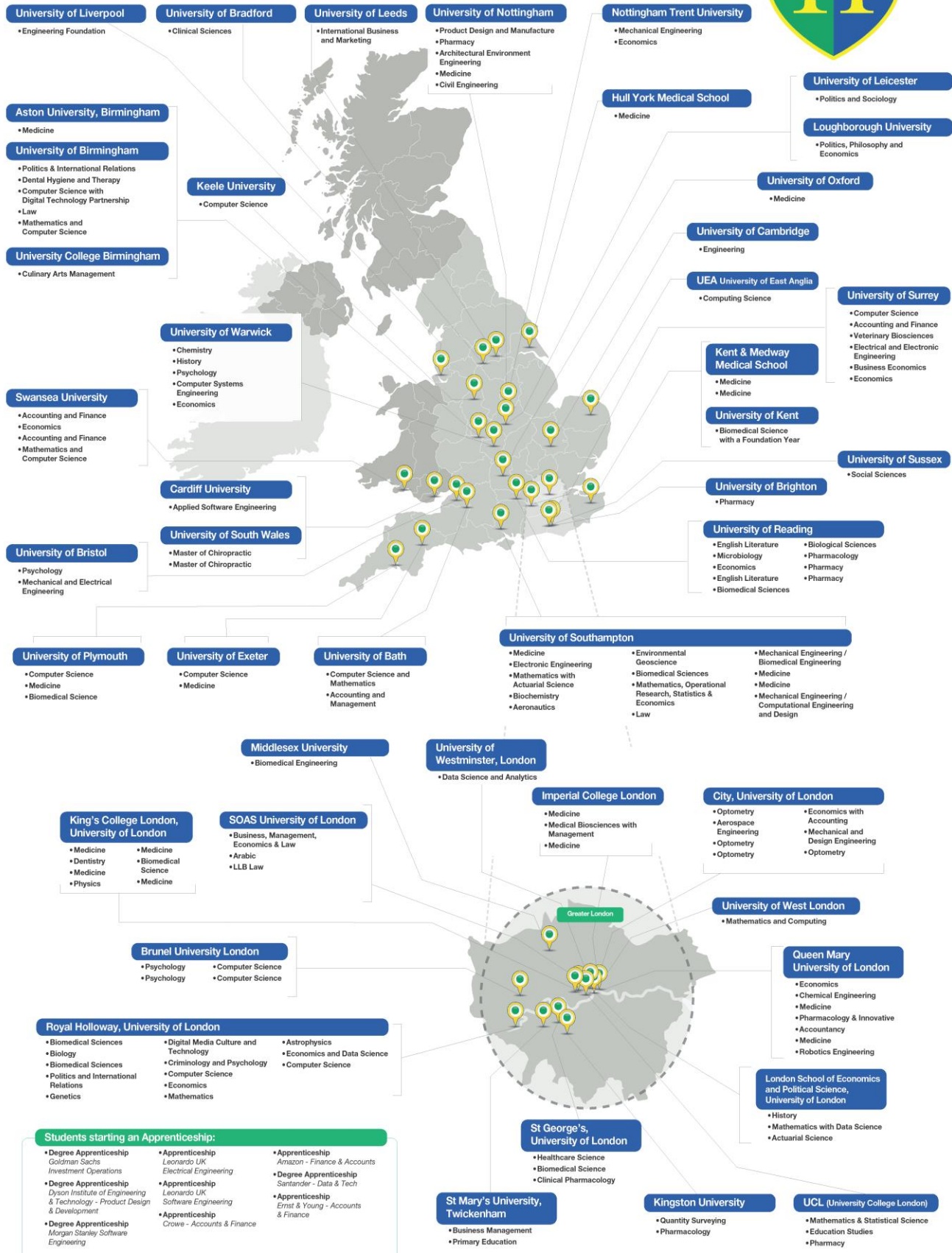

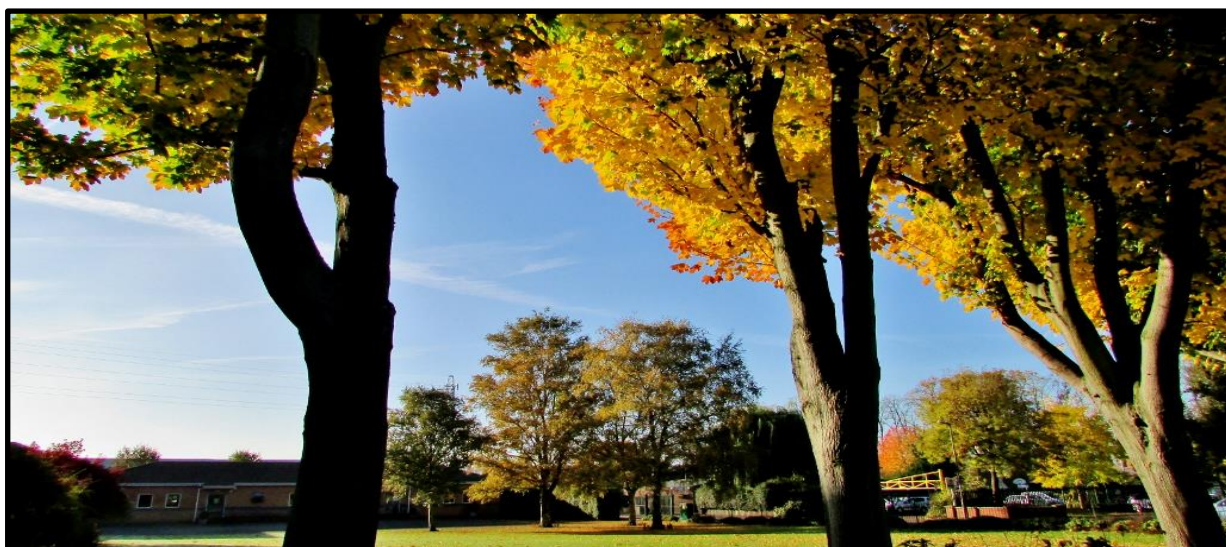
The map below gives an indication of a 4-mile radius of Herschel Grammar School.
