

Natalie Haynes Biography

Natalie Haynes is a writer and broadcaster and – according to the Washington Post – a rock star mythologist. Her first novel, The Amber Fury, was published to great acclaim on both sides of the Atlantic, as was The Ancient Guide to Modern Life, her previous book. Her second novel, The Children of Jocasta, was published in 2017. Her retelling of the Trojan War, A Thousand Ships, was published in 2019. It was shortlisted for the Women's Prize for Fiction in 2020. It has been translated into multiple languages. Her most recent non-fiction book, Pandora's Jar: Women in the Greek Myth was published in Oct 2020, and Margaret Atwood liked it.

She has spoken on the modern relevance of the classical world on three continents, from Cambridge to Chicago to Auckland.

She writes for the Guardian. She is a regular contributor to BBC Radio 4: reviewing for Front Row and Saturday Review, appearing as a team captain on three seasons of Wordaholics, and banging on about Juvenal whenever she gets the chance. Six series of her show, Natalie Haynes Stands Up for the Classics, have been broadcast on Radio 4: all series are available now on BBC Sounds.

FRENCH AND SPANISH FLASH FICTION COMPETITION





Oxford University's Flash Fiction Competitions in French and Spanish are now open!

Students are asked to submit a complete story of **no more than 100 words,** in French or Spanish, for the chance to win up to £100.

Entries are judged by a panel of academics who are primarily looking for creativity, imagination and narrative flair, as well as linguistic accuracy. Pupils' language skills will be considered in the context of their age and year group: in other words, we will not expect younger pupils to compete against older pupils linguistically.

This year, in response to the amazing number of entries we received last year, we have expanded the competition to include a third age category, as outlined below:

- Years 7-9 (ages 11-14)
- Years 10-11 (ages 14-16)
- Years 12-13 (ages 16-18)

The judges will award a top prize of £100, as well as prizes of £25 to a maximum of two runners up, in each category. Certificates will also be awarded to pupils who have been highly commended by our judges. Results as well as the winning, runner up, and highly commended stories will be published on our blog, Adventures on the Bookshelf, if entrants give us permission to do so.

Pupils may only submit one story per language but are welcome to submit one story in French AND one story in Spanish if they would like to. For some inspiration, they can have a look at last year's winning entries in French and Spanish.

The submission deadline is 12 noon on 31 March 2023.

Holiday Tips for Parents of a Child with SEND Advice from Bright Heart Education

Christmas crowds, lights, smells and lack of routine can make the holidays a challenging time for children with special educational needs. Help keep the whole family happy during the festivities with these practical tips on how to survive it with your sense of humour and festive cheer intact.

Visit the local library

While it may not sound like the most exciting place for a holiday outing, for children with special educational needs, the quiet and less crowded library makes for a great option where you can spend a few hours together. At some libraries you may even find games which are appropriate for your child.

Stay home and get crafty

Stay home and bake, make paper garlands, cut snowflakes, or otherwise have crafty fun with your child. If you need to do most of the work, that's ok. This is also an important way to not only connect with your child at this special time of year, but also to keep them occupied in a stimulating way that inspires confidence and feelings of success and accomplishment. These exercises are a tool for helping your child stay mentally engaged during the time off from school.

Use the festive season as a teaching opportunity

Help and encourage your child to give gifts. This provides an excellent opportunity to work on social skills, like thinking of other people's needs and interests, and being kind and helpful.

Worry less about age-appropriate experiences

Many children with special educational needs are "younger than their years." A 12-year-old with special educational needs may for example, still get a big kick out of holiday-themed *Thomas the Tank Engine* toys or a visit with Santa. Consider choosing a few toys and experiences that will resonate with your child even if they're really intended for younger children.

Communicate expectations

Communication is a big factor in successful holiday fun with a child with special educational needs. Communicate with your child what will be happening during their holiday so that they feel secure and prepared. Share with the family and friends you may be visiting what your needs are. For example, let them know if your child needs downtime and may not be able to participate in some of the usual family activities. Communicate with them ahead of time if your child can only tolerate a certain amount of time at a gathering. Let them know you may need to retreat and may miss part of the celebration.

Be gentle with yourself and your child


It's normal to feel frustrated when a child with special educational needs doesn't seem to "get" the holidays or appreciate what you do to make the season special. It can be equally difficult to endure the stares and comments of well-meaning family and friends who simply might not understand why your child isn't appropriately happy and engaged.

Whilst you cannot change the behaviour or feelings of other people, you can change your own. To make the holidays easier for everyone (including you):

- Remember that the holidays aren't for garnering praise or appreciation; they're for building relationships and memories (and, for some people, for remembering the religious significance of Christmas). If you're able to remember even a few special moments when the holidays are done, you've succeeded.
- Give yourself permission to walk away from difficult situations. While some extended families and friends can be wonderful with children with special educational needs, others aren't. If your family falls into the latter category, it's ok to cut a visit short. You're under no obligation to stick with an unpleasant situation.
- Get support when you need it. Maybe you really need to attend a carols evening, a church service, or a special party even if your child can't or won't. There's nothing wrong with asking for a little respite care from those in your support network so that you can have the experience that you need in order to recharge and remember why the holidays are special.






Speechless





Unifrog for Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) The school have subscribed to Unifrog; an awardwinning, online careers platform. All students in Years 7-13 again have access to this excellent website this academic year.

The Unifrog platform is designed to support learners in making the most informed decisions about their futures and contains a range of tools that are suitable for all year groups.

Each student has their own personal account that provides a wide range of information related to their interests and aspirations. Key features of the platform include:

- Exploring Pathways personality quizzes, career and subject profiles and webinars.
- Recording self-reflection about extracurricular activities and key employability skills.
- Opportunities search tools showing live vacancies/courses/placements for apprenticeships, universities (in the UK and abroad), FE, virtual work experience and more.
- Applications tools to help students build applications for a range of pathways (e.g., CVs, Personal Statements, Common App Essays).

Students are advised to access the portal www.unifrog.org and sign in using the school email as username. If the password is not available or the student has forgotten it, they should click on 'reset password' and they will then be able to create a new password and access the portal.

School Attendance Focus

It is important to remember that it is essential for pupils to attend school to get the most out of their school experience, including their attainment, well-being, and wider life chances. The pupils with the highest attainment at the end of Key Stage 4 have higher rates of attendance over the key stage compared to those with the lowest attainment. Generally, any student attending more than 95% is far more likely to achieve or exceed targets set based on prior achievements and potential. At Kingsdale, we are proud of our student attendance which is normally well above the national average and we need to all work together to sustain this.

Whilst we understand the impact Covid has been having, we need to ensure that this impact is not extended by allowing any potential small symptoms, such as colds or tiredness to prevent students from attending school. We are grateful to the many parents who understand this, and who do their best to arrange any medical appointment to have the least possible impact on time spent in school. We also extend our thanks to all those parents who use the dedicated year group absence emails to let us know of any absence by 8.30am of the morning of absence, and to help clear up any queries that may affect attendance. Capture your Christmas meal. Send us a picture and a short description of what your meal contains. The best-looking meals will win valuable points for your house.


Don't forget permission from your parents or carers and to have appropriate supervision in the kitchen.

KEEPING YOU AND YOUR PHONE SAFE

Getting a phone is really exciting. You can stay in touch with friends and find out more about the world.

- Don't fight back, it's not worth the risk when a phone can be replaced.
- Tell us if someone robs you or tries to. It's important you get help straight away by dialling 999 using a friend or trusted adult's phone rather than contacting police when you get home. This gives us the best chance to catch the suspects, recover stolen items and make sure you're safe.
- If you don't want to talk to police – contact Fearless online, without giving your name, at www.fearless.org
- Memorise or keep a note of a parent/carer's phone number in a separate place in case of emergency.

As police officers, our job is to keep you safe and stop people who want to steal property like phones, cash, earphones and even expensive coats or trainers.

You can help us do that by being careful where you use your phone and taking care of cash and other valuable items.

YOU CAN HELP US PROTECT AND TRACK YOUR PHONE IF IT'S STOLEN.

HERE'S 3 THINGS YOU CAN DO:

 Your phone will have security features such as a passcode or fingerprint/ face ID. Make sure you use it to protect access to your phone.

5 TIPS TO KEEP SAFE

- Keep your phone and valuables out of sight and in a safe place. Take care when you take them out especially near bus stops and train stations.
- Stay alert and remember earphones/headphones can distract you from being aware of someone approaching from behind you. Thieves can approach on mopeds, e-scooters and pedal cycles.
- Tracker apps can help locate your phone if it's lost or stolen. Ask a parent to show you how to set one up.
- Record the phone's IMEI number in a separate place at home. Find this by typing in *#06#. You'll need to give this number to police if it's stolen.
