

# SSLP Art Talk Event David Hepher






Mr Lewis in Religious Education recommends 1984

by George Orwell.

"The Party told you to reject the evidence of your eyes and ears. It was their final, most essential command." Winston Smith toes the Party line,

With each lie he writes, Winston grows to hate the Party that seeks power for its own sake and persecutes those who dare to commit 'thoughtcrimes'. But as he starts to think for himself, Winston can't escape the fact that Big Brother is always watching... A startling and haunting novel, 1984 creates an imaginary world that is completely convincing from start to finish. No one can deny the novel's hold on the imaginations of whole generations, or the power of its admonitions - a power that seems to grow, not lessen, with the passage of time. Mr Lewis thinks this book is perennially relevant to society and politics; essential reading for anyone interested in how politics and power works. Suitable for all interested students in Key Stage 3 and over!

James Bansback in Year 8 recommends What if? by Randall Munroe

From the creator of the wildly popular xkcd.com, comes hilarious and informative answers to important questions you probably never thought to ask.

Millions visit xkcd.com each week to read Randall Munroe's iconic webcomic. Fans ask him a lot of strange questions: How fast can you hit a speed bump, driving and live? When (if ever) did the sun go down on the British Empire? When will Facebook contain more profiles of dead people than living? How many humans would a T Rex rampaging through New York need to eat a day?

In pursuit of answers, Munroe runs computer simulations, pores over stacks of declassified military research memos, solves differential equations and consults nuclear reactor operators. His responses are masterpieces of clarity and hilarity, complemented by comics. They often predict the complete annihilation of humankind, or at least a really big explosion. James enjoyed the 'weird randomness' of this fun yet fascinating book! Suitable for students in Key Stage 3 as well as older!


### Student Meditation & Mindfulness Sessions

### **BRONZE AWARD**

- 1a. All 275 newly enrolled participants for the Bronze Award should have now:
  - Been added to the Bronze DofE MS Teams site where all information about how to start/current events etc. is posted both in the 'chat section' and the 'files section'. Please look here for help and advice.
  - All parents have access to the above information (deadlines and requirements to be sent out separately re the expedition in 2024) on the school intranet site under the Duke of Edinburgh's Award section.
  - Please remember the KEY cut off dates of 30<sup>th</sup> April and 14<sup>th</sup> July 2024. See details on the above sites.
  - Please check ALL parental emails for your child's DofE Welcome Pack. All 275 Bronze awards were purchased on Thursday/Friday 9th/10th November 2023. A link was sent from the award to the email address of the person who received the link to pay for the award.

### SILVER AWARD

- 2. Students who have completed their Bronze Award and who are considering joining the Silver Award programme will have received a direct email from Mr Dennington before 30<sup>th</sup> November 2023 offering them the chance to pay for the new award by 4<sup>th</sup> Jan 2024. This date was for potential new students to join and not for those who have already paid and joined the Silver Award.

# Supporting Your Child with Reading-The Teenage Years

As your child moves into secondary school, reading can be seen by them more as work than fun, and teenagers may stop reading for pleasure or stop reading at all. Here is some advice to support your teenager through these years:

• Young Adult (YA) novels tackle the edgy issues teenagers struggle with, from romantic longing to peer pressure to grief and trouble at home or school. Teenagers will gravitate toward relatable subject matter whether they are personally grappling with these issues or are seeking vicarious thrills.

Merge movies with books. Hollywood is turning to teen literature for ideas more than ever.
 Offer your teenager the print version to read before or after a big film comes out and discuss with them the similarities and the differences between the two. Which was better?
 The book or movie? Why?

• Graphic novels, once dismissed as comic books, are now recognised as literature. These books may be the key to getting some teenagers hooked on books and are available in a wide range of genres, from adventure and fantasy to historical fiction, memoir, and biography, so certainly, there is a graphic novel out there to suit your teenager's taste.

• Encourage your teenager with appropriate adult-level books. Find non-fiction titles on subjects your teen's curious about, such as climate change, race, political corruption, or true crime. Check adult non-fiction bestseller lists to see what is going viral.

• Try some poetry. Novels in verse and performance poetry are an increasingly popular trend. Poems are easy to read as they have all that white space on the page. The spare and lyrical approach to poetry can pack a punch.

Let your teenager get an audiobook to listen to on the way to school or on long drives.
 They can download audiobooks to their smartphones to not risk looking uncool because they will be under headphones or have their earbuds in.

Model reading at home, where your teenager can see you. Express your interest and
enjoyment and talk about what you are reading. Always take a book with you when
you go to the beach or waiting in a long queue. Demonstrate to your teenager that
reading is a pleasure and not a chore.

• Keep reading material around. Children who grow up with heaps of books around them tend to read more. Fill the bathroom, car, dining table (wherever there is a captive audience) with comic books, graphic novels, and magazines geared to their interests. There is nothing wrong with "micro-reading."

# How to Help Your Child with Exam Stress

Brighton and Hove Schools Mental Health Service are hosting a workshop online. This workshop is aimed at parents/carers who would like to learn more about supporting their child with anxiety and stress around exams. This workshop is aimed at parents and carers of children who are completing exams.

We will look at what anxiety is exactly, where it comes from, and what keeps children feeling anxious. We aim to help you get a better understanding of your child's anxiety by looking at how your children feel, think, and respond to triggers or situations that make them feel anxious. We will then introduce strategies that can help, both in the short term, such as breathing and distraction techniques, as well as longer-term strategies including helping your child face their fears and build up their confidence through supportive conversations.





At school, we have shared the key messages about keeping safe with the students. Some of the key messages are outlined below:


## "LOOK UP LOOK OUT"

- BE AWARE of your surroundings.
- BE AWARE when using your mobile phone.
- Know your route home.
- · Keep to busy roads.
- Try to be with other people.
- · If someone tries to stop you keep walking.
- SHOUT for help and make NOISE.
- If anything happens speak to a trusted adult as soon as you can.
- RUN HIDE TELL.
- There is no right or wrong response as each situation is different but remember that YOUR SAFETY IS PARAMOUNT. Only YOU can assess the risk.
- Possessions are replaceable, but you are not.

Your child must contact the Police immediately on 999 if they are concerned about their safety or if they are the victim of a mugging/attempted mugging.

Students and Parents should also inform the school so that we can offer pastoral support and liaise with our Safer Schools Officer – PC Crampton.


# HOUSE COMPETITIONS

# 10 Top Tips on Supporting Children with SELF-REGULATION

Children need to learn to understand and recognise their emotions, while finding healthy ways to process them.

Emotional self-regulation, however, depends heavily on age and development. While very young ones or children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) may find it particularly challenging to self-regulate, nurturing these important skills can be hugely beneficial. Here are ten top tips for supporting children with their self-regulation.

# 1. DESIGNATE A TRUSTED ADULT



It's vital that children feel safe and know that there's someone they can always go to for help if they need it. Schedule consistent times for the child to develop a relationship with this person – ideally through play and games – allowing trust to grow and ensuring that the child is more likely to come forward if anything is wrong, rather than hiding their emotions.

# 2. MEET CHILDREN HALFWAY

Unless you know where a child is developmentally and tailor your approach to their needs, you're less likely to have an impact in particular, younger ones and children with SEND can struggle to self-regulate and instead rely on others to help them. We call this 'co- regulation'. Rather than offering strategies for self-regulation, it could be better to start co-regulating with a trusted adult first.

# 3. FACTOR IN THEIR THEIR BASIC NEEDS

Remember that for a child to develop emotional regulation skills, their basic needs must be met first. Children who are hungry, tired, cold and so on – as well as those who have experienced adverse childhood experiences – may struggle to self-regulate. Before you develop strategies with any child, make sure they feel safe, secure and comfortable in themselves.

# 4. REMAIN PATIENT

If a child is struggling with their emotions, it can often become difficult to stay calm. Remember that dysregulation is beyond their control, so a display of frustration or anger could negatively impact the situation. Instead, children need to be met with comfort and understanding to help them manage these problematic feelings.

# 5. BE 'A DYSREGULATION DETECTIVE'

While some children can tell you why they become dysregulated, many others can't. You could investigate potential triggers by observing the child and talking to their family. When the child becomes dysregulated, note down details like the time, what they're doing and who they're with – the trigger may be someone they sit near, an unmet sensory need or something else entirely. Once we identify some triggers, we can help to avoid or overcome them.

# Meet Our Expert

Georgina Durrank is an author, former teacher, Special Educational Needs Coordinator and the founder of the award-winning SEN Resources Blog, where she shares activities, advice and recommendations for parents and teachers of children with SEND.



There are some wonderful books that can help you teach self-regulation to children. Reading these with a child can be especially powerful. Take time to discuss the content: ask questions about what feelings the characters had, why they felt that way and what strategies helped them. It can also be useful to refer back to snippets of these books at appropriate moments.

# 7. TRY SENSORY RESOURCES



# 8. NURTURE INDEPENDENCE



If you feel it's appropriate, let children try out these strategies alone. Always offer them a choice: they could listen to music when they're feeling stressed, for example, or they could write down their worries or draw something to represent how they feel. This may take time for the child to get used to, so be patient. Encourage them to share any helpful strategies with a trusted adult.

# 9. MODEL GENUINE FEELINGS



Children learn a lot just from watching grown-ups. Don't be afraid to show your own emotions and self-regulation strategies. While you'll obviously want to avoid sharing anything too personal with children, they should still see us experiencing and handling our own feelings. Tell them how you are feeling, then show them how to respond in a healthy manner.

# 10. FORMULATE A PLAN



As much as we try to prevent children from experiencing dysregulation, it's always wise to have an appropriate plan for when it does happen. Discuss this strategy with the child (If appropriate) and their family. The best approach for an individual child is often a bespoke one; it's hugely important to know in advance what might help and what could worsen the situation.


