Outdoor and Adventurous Activities	£7,314	<p>Thurston (£2,584 Top-Up + £600 Cover for School Staff) Participation in Thurston OEC residential to be extended for all children, providing additional access to O&AA for children with otherwise limited access. Funding to supplement an additional two days for each pupil attending.</p> <p>KS2 Outdoor Adventure Days (£4,730) Year 3 main school classes will pair up with two KS2 classes from the Base to take part in integrated Adventure Days led by a fully qualified Outdoor Education instructor. Children will experience a range of O&AA which positively impact on their social and physical development, increase integration opportunities and broaden their life experiences.</p>	<p><i>Thirty six pupils (23 female, 13 male) attended Thurston for a full week. Evaluation by Thurston instructors, school staff and pupil self-evaluation demonstrates all pupils made significant progress in their ability and confidence in new and outdoor environments. The increased time spent at Thurston proved beneficial in raising attainment during the week, and in higher self-reported confidence scores than previous years.</i></p> <p><i>Integrated outdoor activities (between join main school and Base classes) were highly successful in the Autumn and early Spring terms. All children were able to identify an area or aspect of outdoor or adventurous activity that they had gained confidence and skill in, and progress and engagement was high across all sessions for all pupils. School closures and lockdown measures in the latter Spring and full Summer terms meant that some O&AA sessions were unable to go ahead. This money will be re-allocated for use in the 2020-21 school year.</i></p>
South Tyneside School Sport Network	£2,500	Children will have increased opportunities to take part in festivals and competitions with pupils from other schools. Staff will access a range of training and development opportunities, leading to an improvement in the quality of PE provision in school.	<i>Pupils from Fellgate took part in some festivals and competitions during the early part of the 2019-20 school year, however the majority of participation was planned for the latter half of the school year. Due to school closures and lockdown measures, these events were unable to go ahead. Funding will be re-allocated for use in the 2020-21 school year.</i>

Teachers report engagement for all pupils is high, and notable progress has been made in complementary skills such as working with others, sharing, taking turns, etc – which also benefit children’s work in the wider curriculum.</i></p> <p><i>Behaviour at playtime in the main school has continued to improve significantly since the introduction of JJ Sports coaching at lunch times. An increasing number of children are eager to join in the sessions, and a rota ensures that all are given equal access. Girls have shown a particularly high rate of increased participation and confidence, a result of the ‘girls only’ session run once a week.</i></p>
Swimming (KS2 pupils)	£4,500	<p>By the end of KS2, the majority of children will be able to swim at least 25 metres.</p>	<p><i>Year 6 were unable to attend their allotted swimming lessons this year due to school closures. Data for end of KS2 outcomes is based on that cohort’s outcomes at the end of Year 5.</i></p> <p><i>88% of the Y6 cohort swims competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25m (+3% on last year).</i></p> <p><i>80% of the Y6 cohort uses a range of strokes effectively (+5% on last year).</i></p> <p><i>74% of the cohort perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations (+4% on last year).</i></p>
