

Shirebrook Academy Remote Education Plan

This document should be used alongside the ACET Remote Learning Policy.

Key terms:

- **Remote Education:** A broad term encompassing any learning that happens outside of the classroom, with the teacher not present in the same location as students.
- **Online Learning:** This is remote learning delivered through digital technologies.
- **Synchronous Education:** This is education with the teacher present online.
- **Asynchronous Education:** Material is prepared by the teacher and accessed by the students at any time.
- **Digital literacy:** The skills for using technology competently.

Statement of Intent:

The remote education curriculum at Shirebrook Academy will be aligned to the 'in-school' curriculum as much as possible, carefully sequenced to ensure students access the learning they need to move on to their next steps. We aim for students to have access to the same curriculum remotely as they do in school wherever possible and appropriate.

In some circumstances, we may need to adapt the subject curriculum. We may need to make adaptations because some topics are difficult to teach remotely e.g. practical elements of the Technology and Physical Education curriculum or where content may be sensitive e.g. some elements of the RSHE curriculum. Where we have done this we have considered alternatives to traditional practice and focused on teaching the most important knowledge and concepts that students need to learn. A Remote Education Curriculum Adaptations summary document can be found on the 'Remote Education' drop down section of the Shirebrook Academy website.

We recognize that some students, for example some students with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), may not be able to access remote education without support from adults at home. We acknowledge the difficulties this may place on families, and we will work with parents and carers to support students by providing adapted or additional learning materials, adaptive technology where required and additional regular contact.

We expect that the remote curriculum will provide at least 5 hours of learning per day.

Scenario A

An individual student or group of students whose absence has been agreed by the Academy, for example a student or group of students self-isolating due to contact with a person who has tested positive for Covid-19. In this scenario, teaching staff will be teaching other students who are still in school during their timetabled lesson with student(s) who are not in school. Pupils will usually self-isolate for between 10 days from the point of contact.

In the event of whole school closure, parents who are key workers, have an Educational Health Care Plan, a Social Worker, or whom are classed as vulnerable by the school may still attend the Academy under a special arrangement. Students in the Academy will follow the remote education plan in scenario B and will be supervised by support staff and SLT.

Students with positive engagement:

Team leader to use data on monitoring sheets and reward weekly

Students requiring support with engagement:

Team leader to make telephone contact home

Students with positive engagement:

Form tutors to use data on monitoring sheets when making weekly/fortnightly contact and reward on SIMS

Students requiring support with engagement:

- Day 1 - Text message will go to all students that have not accessed online learning at all that day
- Day 2 - Text message to go out to students that have not accessed online learning (2nd day)
- Day 3 – Text message contact with students not accessing and follow-up phone calls to parents/carers by Year Teams. Text message to parents/carers of students that have had some access but have not attended all lessons.
- Day 5 – Students that have had partial engagement – Telephone contact with parents/carers – students to access all online lessons.
- Continued monitoring of students not engaging. Still no engagement by Day 8 – paper materials provided with weekly calls to check engagement.

Note: Tutors will take account of students who access materials at a later time due to home environment or shared devices.
