1. Key Objectives

For every Christian to:

- know, understand and be able to clearly explain the gospel
- recognise why people's *greatest need* is the gospel
- see that God alone gives life and understanding
- see that God brings life through *hearing his word*
- be excited and equipped to speak the gospel

2. Key Ideas

Above everything, try to:

- keep coming back to the gospel and, in particular, the cross
- avoid debates, apologetics, arguments and speak about Jesus
- enthuse people with God's Word
- excite people about the great opportunity that the *workplace* is to speak about Jesus and the gospel

2 Corinthians 4:1-6 ESV

¹ Therefore, having this ministry by the mercy of God, we do not lose heart. ² But we have renounced disgraceful, underhanded ways. What Is a Gospel Outline?

Put simply, a Gospel Outline is:

the message at the heart of the Christian faith

The Gospel could be summarised in many ways. In fact, we believe that wherever you open the Bible you should be able to see a glimpse of the Gospel—even in Leviticus!

Some Bible writers have even written very succinct Gospel summaries:

³⁶ "As for the word that he [God] sent to Israel, preaching good news of peace through Jesus Christ (**he is Lord of all**)..."

Acts 10:36

What we have tried to do here is to summarise the good news that lies at the heart of the Christian faith—the core message!

In the excellent book 'What Is the Gospel?' by Greg Gilbert (do read it if you haven't!) it speaks of the way the Bible often outlines the Gospel:

Problem — Solution

What does this mean?

We all have a problem...

...but God has provided a free solution to that problem.

Gilbert argues that this pattern continually recurs in the Bible as a means to explain the Gospel. And we must be clear on what the problem is to see the solution for what it is. If we get the wrong problem, we'll find the wrong solution.

Why Use a Gospel Outline?

A Gospel Outline allows us to keep the main thing the main thing (and helps us to remember what that main thing is!)

What we mean is that we hope each of us will use this outline to:

- remember the core truths of the Gospel
- stick to those core truths
- make sure to explain each of those core truths
- not forget any key truth

However, we very much expect each one of us to make the Gospel outline 'our own' so to speak—to use our own words and phrases.

How to Use a Gospel Outline

Put simply: tell the Gospel to as many people as you can!

The best way to use the Gospel Outline is to read, understand, digest, learn and then use it! Try reading it through a few times yourself. Then turn it over and try speaking it out loud. Repeat this until you feel confident that you can both remember all that it says and the order that it says it.

The next best step is to try telling others your gospel outline – using your own words and phrases. Note: try to keep it concise and jargon-free. People do not usually have the patience nor the interest to listen to us rambling on!

This is an excellent way to put what the apostle Peter says into practice:

¹⁵ "...but in your hearts honour Christ the Lord as holy, **always being prepared** to make a defence to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect..."

1 Peter 3:15

Pray for the Lord to make you bold and fearless—then start speaking:

⁹ "...that you may **proclaim the excellencies of him** who called you out of darkness into his marvellous light."

1 Peter 2:9b

Reasons For This Gospel Outline

Essential biblical truths and why we use them

All summaries will be inadequate to a certain degree. However, we have tried to capture the essential biblical truths in our gospel outline (page 4). Here is a summary of those essential biblical truths. We are not suggesting you include the following in your Gospel presentation but you may find understanding the points helpful.

1. Accountability

We have to recognise that we are accountable to God, before we see that he is right to punish us for rejecting him and his rule. This accountability stems from the fact that he created us and so owns us:

"Worthy are you, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honour and power, for you created all things, and by your will they existed and were created."

Revelation 4:11

¹ "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein, ² for he has founded it upon the seas and established it upon the rivers."

Psalm 24:1-2

2. Rejection

It is essential that we correctly define the paradigm for sin as rejection of our creator God's good rule. The Bible gives different paradigms for sin. But this one is key, because it takes us straight to the heart of the human problem: we have rejected God's good rule, wanting to rule ourselves. And because God is the loving ruler who owns us it is of utmost importance that our sin incurs his just punishment:

⁶ "All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned-every one-to his own way..."

Isaiah 53:6a

¹⁰ "...as it is written:

"None is righteous, no, not one; ¹¹ No one understands; No one seeks for God.

¹² **All have turned aside**; together they have become worthless; no one does good, not even one." "

Romans 3:10-12

3. Punishment

Because God is God and man is man, God is right—just—to punish our rejection of him. Unless we understand this, we will not see that we are all deserving of his just punishment:

¹⁸ "For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who by their unrighteousness suppress the truth."

Romans 1:18

4. Judgement

It is a popular misunderstanding that if there is life after death it comes in two forms: heaven (for those who believe in God) or death (for those who don't). By death they mean an unconscious non-existence. However favourable that might sound, it is not true, and therefore unkind. The Bible presents us with such two options: eternal life (with

God in the new creation), or eternal judgement (a conscious existence forever in a place where nothing good resides, only God's anger). This is a truth we must face, no matter how uncomfortable it is:

²⁷ "And just as it is appointed for man to die once, **and after that** comes judgement..."

Hebrews 9:27

⁴⁷ "…It is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than with two eyes to be thrown into **hell**, ⁴⁸ 'where their worm does not die and the fire is not quenched.""

Mark 10:47-48

5. Substitution

Jesus Christ, God in human form, perfectly obeyed God and so was without sin. He died in our place, taking on our sins in his body and dying to face the punishment we deserved:

¹⁸ "For Christ also suffered **once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous,** that he might bring us to God..."

1 Peter 3:18

6. Forgiveness

We believe that Jesus' death and resurrection did everything necessary to bring us into a right relationship with God. This means we have been forgiven. Our sins have gone. God sees us as innocent. No need for guilt!

"And you, who were dead in your trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made alive together with him, having forgiven us all our trespasses..."

Colossians 2:13

19

Return

The resurrection proves that Jesus is alive today. And God promises that one day soon, Jesus will return. On that day Christians will be saved but everyone else faces judgement. It is therefore of utmost importance that all people have a chance to recognise Jesus as their Lord and Saviour and to respond rightly in repentance:

²⁷ "And just as it is appointed for man to die once, and after that comes judgement, ²⁸ so **Christ**, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, **will appear a second time, not to deal with sin but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him**."

Who We Are

St Nicholas Cole Abbey Centre for Workplace Ministry

We exist to know Jesus and to make him known in the City of London, through Sunday and midweek Bible teaching ministries. At present, St Nicholas Cole Abbey Centre for Workplace Ministry (SNCA) includes a Sunday ministry (St Nick's Church), three midweek lunchtime ministries (London Bridge Talks, Fleet Street Talks and St Nick's Talks) and a Workers' Ministry Training (WMT) course.

St Nick's Church

St Nick's is a grass-roots initiative in partnership with the lunchtime talks (see below). We launched in November 2016. Today, we are a growing diverse group of people united by the good news of Jesus. We aim to keep the Bible at the heart of everything we do. It is our hope and prayer that many people, particularly those who work in the City, will come to know the Lord Jesus Christ through the ministry of St Nick's Church.

Lunchtime Talks:

London Bridge Talks, Fleet Street Talks, St Nick's Talks

The lunchtime talks are part of a wider organisation of workplace ministries in central London called Gospel at Work. Our aim is to preach the gospel publicly so that people across the City and beyond might hear it. Christians are encouraged to join us each week: to *stand* with the gospel, to *bring* colleagues to hear the gospel, to *grow* as the bible is taught and to be equipped and encouraged to *speak* the gospel in their offices and beyond.

Workers' Ministry Training

Workers' Ministry Training (WMT) is a one year scheme designed to provide training in Bible handling and teaching for Christians who work in the City. Our aim is to develop gospel priorities, ministry mindsets, convictions about word ministry and the ability to understand and teach the Bible clearly.
