SOMETHING FOR THE WEEKEND?

Louise Turner and her family out the SunnCamp Breton 500 Plus to the test



Breton is heavy when packed, but pretty robust when pitched due to its combination of metal and fibreglass poles. Joining them together is an "elbow" - a handy little system which allows you to poke the steel pole in the bottom and the bendy fibreglass one into the top. This combination gives the tent good rigidity and the inclusion of metal poles inside the tent which run front to back means it stood up well in the wind.

et's start with the basics. The

The bedrooms come hung within the tent, so we had the whole thing pitched first time within 40 minutes. This also made for a pretty fast getaway as you don't have to separate out the constituent parts and pack them separately.

I'd describe this as an entry-level tent as it has all of the basics, but not a huge amount of bells and whistles. Storage in particular was a bit of a problem as there's a lot of room in the living area of the

tent and limited pockets in the bedrooms. But it does have a choice of two doors. both with fly mesh, an electric hookup point and good light through large windows. You can buy a porch as an extra and we'd certainly need this if camping in it for longer than a couple of nights.

What it does have in abundance is guy ropes - 19 of them to be exact. They are a bright vellow colour so easy enough to see, but when you peer out of the front door it looks like a scene from CSI. Your only option is to walk straight out for about two metres, regardless of which direction you'd like to go in. The doors don't have the folding down bits at the bottom so there was always a trip-hazard for our two children. And no, it doesn't matter how many times you point it out. someone always goes flying

The four of us in the 3+2 bedroom combination were a little snug on our self-inflating mats once we put our rucksacks in. Maybe that's because we're used to an eight man tent and the kids having a room each to spread their stuff around into. We also felt a bit squashed in the living area, which was filled by our camping table and chairs, leaving little room for anything else.

However we were impressed with the Breton 500 Plus. It's a decent, good value tent which would be fine for short getaways, but would probably be a little squashed for a family of four on longer breaks used to an eight-man tent.

Overall though this is a good tent and would certainly be fine for the odd longweekend. The only faults were a couple of loops for rolling up blinds which weren't properly attached. Annoying, but they didn't affect the integrity of the tent.

DESCRIPTION

A decent 5-berth tent with adaptable sleeping areas separated by a curtain and a small-ish living area with some storage pockets.

There is one bedroom at the back, arranged in 3+2 and separated by a curtain which can be tied back if you wish. The combination of metal and fibreelass

poles means this is both a rigid and a flexible tent. The metal poles inside running front to back along the roof made it nice and firm in the wind, although they are easy to forget when taking the tent down!

OUT AND ABOUT

We took the tent to Aberford Caravan Site near Leeds just after Easter. We had a fabulous few days at this small Club site, which is also home to lots of animals – donkeys, goats, pigs, chickens of all shapes and sizes and the odd lamb in need of bottle feeding. We pitched on grass in the well-kept field

which had a slight incline that made the trip hazard at the bottom of the doors even more acute. The site's friendly owners made sure we had EHU and invited the children to feed the land had been good to be evening.
