







	Maths	Reading	Writing and Phonics Don't forget to spot or talk about capital letters , finger spaces , phonics and full stops !	Wider Curriculum
Monday	<p>Watch Number Blocks</p> <p>Which is your favourite number or character? Mrs Llewellyn's is 18 the Speed machine! Can you write a fact file all about your favourite number? (You might want to stick to numbers up to 10 or 20 unless you're feeling very confident!) You could record pictures or facts all about your number. How many different ways can you find to make your number? (It might help to get the right number of objects eg 18 pieces of pasta, to help with this) Please see Mrs Llewellyn's example. (Parents, feel free to scribe your child's ideas and number facts for them.)</p>	<p>Read one of your books on Bug Club or one of your favourite books or magazines to an adult.</p> <p>AND</p> <p>Listen to a story read by one of your adults OR a story online, e.g. Oxford Owls, CBeebies Bedtime stories.</p> <p>OR</p> <p>Practise some of your high frequency or tricky words (Practical ideas on the class blog)</p>	<p>Pirate Boy</p> <p>Listen to Mrs Llewellyn read the story of Pirate Boy.</p> <p>Can you write a sentence to tell us something you know about Pirate Boy?</p> <p>Example: Pirate Boy is brave because he escapes the evil pirate's ship.</p>	<p>Can you create 2 pirate treasure boxes? Use the template on the blog or decorate some boxes you have around the house (egg boxes work really well). You will need these for your number work tomorrow (and some treasure to go inside).</p> 
Tuesday	<p>Pirate sharing.</p> <p>You will need some treasure (this could be coins, gems, small figures- use your imagination!)</p> <p>Grown ups choose how many objects to give your child (choose even numbers to begin with) can you share the treasure into your 2 treasure boxes so they are equal. How many will you each have?</p> <p>Talk the sentence: Eg. We started with 10 and shared them equally between the 2 boxes so now we have 5 each. Half 10 is 5.</p>	<p>Become an illustrator by completing the 'Captains log' activity sheet.</p> <p>You could look at the 'Seaside stories- illustrating a book' activity on Education City</p> 	<p>Pirate Boy tries lots of plans to escape and trap the evil pirates Boss and Sidekick.</p> <p>Can you help him plan a way to trap the pirates once and for all?</p> <p>Draw and label your plan. Can you write some instructions to explain how your trap works? (You could write these down or record them using a video).</p>	<p>Design yourself as a pirate! You could use a paper plate, toilet roll tube or photo to create your own pirate character</p> <p>You will need your pirate character for tomorrow's writing job</p> 
Wednesday	<p>Number Blocks series Odds and evens</p> <p>Then play Education City 'Pattern Play 5' to sort odd and even numbers. You can use your treasure boxes from yesterday to help you decide if they will share equally so are even numbers.</p>		<p>Using the Pirate mini me you made yesterday, can you tell me all about yourself? You could create a Wanted Poster- what do you look like? What is your name? Why are you 'Wanted?'</p>	<p>Can you create your own pirate boat. You could paint a picture or make a model of your own pirate ship. Don't forget to design a pirate flag for your pirate ship.</p> 
Thursday	<p>Pirate treasure box</p> <p>Using a tray or sand tray, hide some treasure (this could be coins, toys, card discs) how many can you find? Do you think this is an odd or even number? Do you think they will share equally? Share your treasure between the boxes- were you right?</p>		<p>Work with your grown up to make a map of your garden, house or local park. Look carefully at all the shape of your garden and try to add as much detail as possible. If you were a pirate, where could you hide some treasure? Can you write a clue and hide some treasure for somebody in your house to find? Example: Look under the bush next to the shed to find the treasure.</p>	
Friday	<p>Play with your toys – do you have any pirate or sea creatures? You could set up your own pirate treasure island. Why not listen to some sea shanties? You could try and write your own. Can you make your own pirate outfit?</p> <p>Lucky Dip</p> <p>If children are struggling to decide what to play, set up a lucky dip bag full of play activities and pick one out.</p>
