1) What motivates you to be physically active?

I know that if I am not, I will physically suffer. I don't have a choice.

2) What stops you from being physically active?

Generally, it's depression. A feeling of pain and tension, lack of sleep, worthlessness. Then I don't want to do anything.

3) What benefits do you experience from being physically active?

I feel better, I sleep better, and I'm less likely to eat junk. I feel more body positive when I exercise. I concentrate better. I'm more patient.

4) What are some methods that you are aware of to help improve mood and reduce feelings of sadness or irritability and how well do you think they work?

Daily exercise is one of the main things I've been trying. Keeping busy on something practical is one method. That's pretty good, and kind of covers exercise, which is one way to keep busy.

Being aware of and accept feelings without being caught up in them. Mindfulness I guess. I know a lot of my problems come from anxiety. I get anxious when I feel unsafe, confused, and frustrated. If I feel unsafe, I need to figure why, and get myself somewhere safer, or at least manage my risk. Confused is trickier. Simply, I need to get some space and quiet to work through what is confusing me. Frustration, I need to stop focussing on what I can't do, and ask myself what CAN I do now.

5) What do you think of being physically active as a way to feel better emotionally? Does it work?

Physical activity does work. It's burning off steam. It's doing something simple so my brain can process things in the background. There's the endorphin effect. It helps with sleep. All those things work. The only challenge I find is, to actually get going when I feel depressed. Also, when I'm busy and stressed, it can be tricky to find time in the day.

6) How active do you think you need to be to improve your mood and reduce negative feelings?

I think every little bit helps. For me, I like to aim for a solid 45 minutes of moderate exercise, about 5 days a week. Some days I do a lot more.

7) Have you had any experiences with using various treatments to improve your mood?

I was on antidepressants in my late 20's. That was a bit of a disaster.

I've seen a few counsellors over the years. I think some have helped in some ways, but many have simply been traumatic.

8) What are limitations of the treatments that you may have tried?

The anti-depressants had horrendous side effects, and don't really cure anything. The counsellors, have never really worked at all.

9) Has anything stopped you from trying other treatments to feel better emotionally?

I've been seeking help on and off all my life, and if there's treatment out there, I have never found it.

10) We are interested in developing a website to promote physical activity for people who want to improve their mood and reduce feelings like sadness, irritability and fatigue.

Would you use a site like this? Why or why not?

I would, and in some ways have done in the past. Calorie King was very helpful for weight loss and exercise in the past. I use a few different kinds of exercise. Cycling, walking, swimming and sometimes weights. Keeping a comprehensive exercise record is tricky at times. There's different metrics for different activities.

What features would you like such a website to have?

Not many features, really. I think it needs a nice clear, simple focus. If the solid research is 30 minutes, moderate exercise, every second day to improve mood. Then that's all there is to it. The simpler it is, the easier to use. The clearer the message, the easier compliance. Did I do 45 mins exercise today? How was my sleep? How busy was my day? How positive is my mood? I'm personally curious to look at some of the smartphone apps & accessories.

Do you think a website like this could help you get motivated to be physically active? Why or why not?

I'm not at all sure it could help me. There's potential for it being a simple tool that I use for record keeping. Social media does NOT work for me, when there's no personal connection with the people. Telling my close friends what I am trying to do, and getting positive feedback from them helps. But I don't think any of my friends would need or use such a site.

1) What motivates you to be physically active?

Depending on where I'm at in life, different things motivate me to be active. I've had several encounters with eating disorders in the past, so the concept of the ideal body was my motivation to be physically active. More recently, I've put weight back on again since my last experience with anorexia and am determined to get into shape. It's hard to be motivated when eating properly and exercising, as weight is lost much more slowly. I have a friend that I confided in when I felt like I was bored with my life and needed a hobby, and he suggested working out. That's my main source of motivation... to prove to him that I can stick to a workout routine and see it through. I've been working out daily and eating healthily for almost 3 weeks now and although the scales haven't changed dramatically, my body is looking so much better and I can notice my muscles toning up and my waistline slimming down. So at the present moment, just liking what I see in the mirror motivates me to keep active every day.

2) What stops you from being physically active?

I haven't let anything stop me from working out these last few weeks, however some things have prevented me doing as much physical activity as I would have liked to. I've had to travel 6 hours from home and back at one stage, but even on those days I ran before and after I left. The only day since my routine began that I haven't been able to sweat it out properly was when I had a massive hangover last weekend, but I still managed to fit in some yoga. The concept of "no excuses" is easier said than done, but I'm learning to stick to my goals.

3) What benefits do you experience from being physically active?

The biggest thing I have noticed was the huge improvement in my confidence. I think that when you start actively working towards looking better, you start to feel better about how other people see you, too. It's really helped with my social anxiety. I've noticed my skin looking a lot healthier, and my body more streamlined. Physical activity is also a fantastic way to kill time if you're feeling bored or need something to get your mind off things. As well as these benefits, I'm also now able to do a lot more without working up a sweat, which is a great feeling. My asthma has also improved as a result of cardio.

4) What are some methods that you are aware of to help improve mood and reduce feelings of sadness or irritability and how well do you think they work?

I've done group therapy and counselling sessions on this in the past, and a lot of methods I found do not work for me. For example, talking about my problems often make me feel worse. Deep breathing makes me feel like an idiot, but can help in situations where I feel my anxiety building. Mindfulness is another technique that I have tried, but I often find it very hard to concentrate and put full effort into it when I'm not feeling my best. Physical activity can help in the short term to relieve feelings of sadness, but I find it doesn't so much help me with angry or irritable feelings. It tires me out physically, and I'm often left feeling sad afterwards.

One thing that does help is taking care of myself. Having a bubble bath with music and champagne, and pampering myself afterwards. Going out to a club and drinking I've found works wonders, even

though it's terrible for you. I find I get a confidence boost from a little flirting and it does lift my mood. I always make sure I do twice as much exercise the day after though, to work off all the calories from alcohol and detox my liver.

5) What do you think of being physically active as a way to feel better emotionally? Does it work?

It really depends on the emotion and the situation. If I've had a fight with a family member or received a bad test result, I find running it off really helps. But if the emotions are more complex, for example I'm fixated on somebody and I can't get rid of those feelings, I find that I build up a lot of angry and negative energy that exercise just can't seem to get rid of. However these energies make me work that little bit harder when I work out, so I like to think that I'm using the bad energy in a positive way in the long run.

6) How active do you think you need to be to improve your mood and reduce negative feelings?

I don't think it actually matter how physically active you are, as long as you are doing enough exercise to feel satisfied. Exercise every day is good, but as a sufferer of clinical depression I can understand why that's not always possible. For some people, no matter how much they exercise each day they'll still be unhappy. From past experience, when I was feeling low and was very unfit, going for a walk once a week lifted my mood for the rest of the day. But now I'm doing a couple of exercise sessions a day, the relief isn't the same and I still don't feel quite as positive as I used to after exercise.

7) Have you had any experiences with using various treatments to improve your mood?

I've used several different methods of mood improvement. It started off with natural supplements recommended by my psychologist, but I found these didn't really help. I believe she also suggested physical activity daily, but I couldn't find the motivation to do it. Antidepressants were another method I tried, and I found these relieved a lot of the irritability and anxiety I was feeling. However, I would still feel sad at times and found it hard to move forward with my life, so I've recently come off them. I went through an intensive program of group CBT sessions and one-on-one counselling as well as family counselling when I first started taking antidepressants, and this combination helped my mood dramatically.

8) What are limitations of the treatments that you may have tried?

The limitations of counselling, for example, were that I lived so far away from the clinic that it was difficult for me to attend sometimes. And now that I'm over 18 ears old, I'm not longer eligible for the same program. The limitations to antidepressants are the side effects, mostly. They lower sex drive, and can make it hard to concentrate. The numb feeling is another thing I noticed they caused when I came off them.

9) Has anything stopped you from trying other treatments to feel better emotionally?

My relationship with my family doctor is one of the main reasons I haven't consulted a GP about other mood altering medications. I have to make arrangements to see another doctor in another town to discuss this, and I feel it's too much time and effort for all the trouble new medications may cause. A lot of the time I dismiss my bouts of depression and hope they go away, which they eventually do as I have fantastic support from my boyfriend and don't feel like I need to try any other methods other than those I already use.

I do enjoy using websites to track my physical activity and to give me tips on how to improve, so as long as this was an interactive website I would use it. I currently use <u>walk.org</u> which is great for tracking progress, and comparing against others that are trying to be more physically active.

• What features would you like such a website to have?

Perhaps, along with mood tracking, the ability to track physical exercise and diet for the day. It helps see any correlation between the 3. Maybe even sleep tracking. Forums are also a great tool to use, so that would be essential.

Do you think a website like this could help you get motivated to be physically active? Why
or why not?

I think it would help. Being able to see how much exercise I've been doing over the last month or so really motivates me not to skip a day, and seeing other people and hearing their experiences with weight loss and exercise for mood improvement also gives me ideas and aspirations.

I think rewards are a great way to do it- perhaps have a system with levels based on how much exercise they are able to do with certain privileges. The ability to join support groups online is also a good tool to keep motivated and seek help from those in similar situations when you need it.

1) What motivates you to be physically active?

Being challenged (competitiveness). If competing I am really motivated to work hard, and have set goals to achieve or beat (such as 100 Pushups challenge) which has small weekly goals. I am motivated by wanting to be physically stronger, able to run father without visibly being overworked, and I'd like to be leaner as appropriate for my body shape.

2) What stops you from being physically active?

Overall laziness, lack of motivation to get up or get off the computer. I find it incredibly intimidating to work out near other people (for fear of actually trying and not being good enough, finding small things too hard and being noticed). I had a free week pass to a gym one time, and was just too intimidated by people that knew what they were doing - felt like they knew I wasn't supposed to be there - and left. On another occasion I got changed to try out a treadmill (in the toilet cubicle, not the changing room), took a look at everyone using the treadmills, then changed back and promptly left. It's hard to try and utilise competitiveness as a motivational drive when you don't feel good enough to compete, and won't start out of shame. When I do attempt to work out, the "after burn" of a workout generally lasts for several days, which makes it hard to want to pick up a 3 times a week routine.

3) What benefits do you experience from being physically active?

After I start, it gradually gets easier to work more and for longer, and my self esteem feels better after a workout. I don't work out enough/frequently enough to see any physical changes in my body, mostly maintaining the same weight and fitness level. Being physically active can also be a self-inflicted punishment - if I feel like I have been eating badly or need to vent out stress/anger, walking rather than catching a bus or tram serves as a lesson for myself.

4) What are some methods that you are aware of to help improve mood and reduce feelings of sadness or irritability and how well do you think they work?

Meditation, regular exercise and coping strategies are methods that I am aware of - having seen a counsellor for stress, depression and anxiety on several occasions; but they also require frequent repetition to be a useful coping mechanism, and with the low self-discipline that I have, are ineffective. I think that they would work well if used frequently, but sporadically they only serve as a distraction. Talking to other people, or explaining situations in a way that others can understand help work through problems. Working out puts me in a position where the only thing I can think about is trying to push for a little bit longer, and focusing on breathing.

5) What do you think of being physically active as a way to feel better emotionally? Does it work?

See above.

6) How active do you think you need to be to improve your mood and reduce negative feelings?

I think you need to be active regularly, and pushing yourself to be unable to be focusing on anything else. Working hard apparently produces endorphines or whatever, but I never really seem to feel happy, I just feel like I have more energy to do more - which ultimately leads to me pushing myself too far and being unable to workout again for a few days. By extension, if you're working out regularly you have a sense of routine and stability in your life that otherwise unfit people most likely don't have, which would be a huge boost to low self-esteem, depression and anxiety.

7) Have you had any experiences with using various treatments to improve your mood?

I have had few experiences with coping mechanisms - both for depression and anxiety. Working out normally is not a pleasant experience for me and I never seem to get any rewards from it, whereas meditation and relaxation techniques for anxiety and panic attacks need to be practised regularly, which I fail to do. I find using a distraction such as a book or happy music will help to improve my mood if I need to.

8) What are limitations of the treatments that you may have tried?

They require regular upkeep and practise, which is hard when trying to establish around a busy lifestyle.

9) Has anything stopped you from trying other treatments to feel better emotionally?

Laziness, I'm only motivated to exercise for the physical benefits (or if I feel that improving my fitness is doable), emotional benefits do not feel like enough of a benefit for the work.

I would not, as a bigger motivator for me is to improve physical fitness. I occasionally use freetrainers.com for the community of other users in a similar situation and support to keep me accountable whilst still remaining moderately anonymous. I feel that a site like this would promote easily achieved, moderate exercise to people who feel that exercise is not easily achieved.

What features would you like such a website to have?

I would like such a site to have nutritional information - such as recipes and tips for healthy eating whilst dining out.

As well as workouts and links to challenges that push members at their rate - such as the 100 pushup challenge or exercise challenges set for short periods of time, as they feel more easily achieved and flexible. A website with community features and options for people to share their stories with each other from similar circumstances can work to push each other. If it had other features such as note taking, goal setting and a calendar feature it would work well as a homepage, and less easily forgotten. If the site has to be actively sought out for the one purpose, it does not encourage the establishment of routines, or keep member's goals in the back

Do you think a website like this could help you get motivated to be physically active? Why
or why not?

If the website was useful for several purposes, and was viable to keep as a homepage, it would be useful to keep fitness goals and emotional health an ongoing goal to work on. If the material encouraging emotional health was actually inspiring and made me feel better about myself (and being active) it could be a huge boost for staying positive and working at goals no matter how small.

As above, being easily accessible, and easily used for more circumstances can work to remind users of the importance of exercise, as well as being an organisational and inspirational tool that they won't easily forget about and fail to use.

1) What motivates you to be physically active?

Hardly anything, but usually my husband. Becoming more active at work was a health choice I made 12 months ago because of minor symptoms of ageing (I'm 42, and 106kg but mostly healthy) such as aching hips and knees. This choice was helped by the fact that I was moved to a position at work where I'm mostly standing and walking around rather than sitting. I have struggled with exercise all my adult life. I hate it. I liked dance as a kid, and joined a few classes over the years but I don't have the confidence to join a dance class these days. Apart from that I got an iPhone last year and started using a step counting app and a food recording app. I have found this keeps me a bit accountable, and a 15 minute walk doesn't feel 'pointless' as it would have in the past as it all adds up over the day. About 5 out of 7 days a week I do about 30-40 minutes of walking over a day, accumulative. I have lost about 10kg over the year. I find it hard to exercise on my days off but live in a beautiful sea-side and wildlife reserve area so I'm spoilt for walking locations.

2) What stops you from being physically active?

Physical discomfort, fear of exercising in front of others, the fact that my body very stubbornly holds on to weight and exercise doesn't help weight loss unless I work really hard which is unsustainable for me because I don't enjoy it.

3) What benefits do you experience from being physically active?

Better sleep, better posture, better digestion, but I don't have issues with any of those things really. Sometimes it lifts my mood but not always. When I spend a moody day on the couch I always feel worse about myself for not moving. I have a slightly arthritic finger knuckle which has improved over the past year which may not be from being more active but I wouldn't be surprised if it was.

4) What are some methods that you are aware of to help improve mood and reduce feelings of sadness or irritability and how well do you think they work?

Medication and counselling together, not just one. CBT helped me become less negative (over 8 years) but ingrained feelings of worthlessness are very hard to shake. Walking definitely helps, as does spending time with friends, sleep, chocolate.....but sometimes if you suggest any of those things to me I will throw them all back at you in a crying tantrum and go hide under the doona. Medication is the only thing that helps, and it only helps by shortening the amount of time I feel that way. Going to work cheers me up I think because it takes my mind off myself and I feel productive and useful again. Having too many days off for me is disastrous.

5) What do you think of being physically active as a way to feel better emotionally? Does it work?

If I'm in a good mood to start with it definitely helps me sustain my good mood, but if I'm really low, you can't make me exercise. I've tried and I just end up feeling worse because I just don't have the energy to force myself to do it and then I see myself as useless and pathetic and lazy. I have an enormous and very strong force inside me that I have to fight before I can make myself exercise, or do anything really. It's a constant battle of 'what's the point'??

6) How active do you think you need to be to improve your mood and reduce negative feelings?

At least 5 days a week, at least 40minutes. I think walking is best but I'm not sure what fit people do. I guess fit people experience endorphins, but I've never been fit. Another thing I've noticed is that it's better if you can be a bit active over several different times in the day. I know people who sit all day at work and then exercise in a 40 minute burst in the evening, and don't get the same mood benefit.

7) Have you had any experiences with using various treatments to improve your mood?

Proper psychotherapy with **the right therapist** is fantastic, but very expensive and I would love to continue but I can't afford it. They made it much better for patients initially with the 10 free sessions, but after that you have to pay \$140+ per session. My therapist left town a year ago and I haven't seen anybody since. A few years ago I tried St John's Wort, but didn't notice any effect. I tried Fish oil tablets, but then I found out you have to take 8 or 10 a day to notice any change and that just seemed impossible. I notice PMT has a terrible effect on my mood, even though I'm medicated for depression (20mg Lexapro) I become irritable, sad, and even a bit paranoid. This has had a terrible impact on my work. Therapy is a very lonely thing, I can't really explain it to my husband so I just come home and try to act normal!

8) What are limitations of the treatments that you may have tried?

With medication it's too hard to get properly monitored by a physician because unless you're hospitalised all they have to go on is my perception of how I'm feeling. It's not a tangible thing like a broken leg or a rash. There are very few psychiatrists in rural areas so I have never seen one, and psychologists don't really know enough about meds to advise properly. My psychologist was always recommending that I go off the meds. Just seemed stupid to me. I would love to try a different medication but it's too risky with work, it takes so long to notice the effect and what if I end up worse?

Most other methods are too haphazard; not tested properly, different results for different people. For example, I hate that the side effects of depression meds are 'weight loss' for some people and 'weight gain' for others. This tells me that the science isn't really complete.

9) Has anything stopped you from trying other treatments to feel better emotionally?

If I had \$50,000 I would check in to a mental health facility for 3 months and make them try every medication that exists for anxiety and depression until they find the one that is best for me. Every five years or so! That is like the holy grail. I know without a doubt that exercise helps but depression gets in my way. If I could afford it I would find an excellent Psychiatrist to see once a month. Getting good treatment for my mental health is kind of like a luxury I guess. I don't know of any other treatments.

10) We are interested in developing a website to promote physical activity for people who want to improve their mood and reduce feelings like sadness, irritability and fatigue.

Would you use a site like this? Why or why not?

Yes, although I tend to give up on things after a while. I love the internet and if you could link it to an app I would love that even more. I'm assuming you could log in each day, record your activity, set goals, produce graphs, see your progress, get advice and encouragement, link up with friends from

Facebook, book exercise sessions together, log how you're feeling emotionally, discover new types of exercise to try etc.... If that's what you're thinking I would love that!

What features would you like such a website to have?

1. You have to include a way for people to forgive themselves for not exercising or it could backfire and make it worse. Ie: 'Doesn't matter that you didn't complete your walk today Sarah, you walked for 14 out of the last 22 days, that is fantastic'..... I don't know but that seems friendly! I know this because of the Wii Fit program. It makes terrible comments if you're not doing well and I always have to mute it when I weigh myself. 2. It should ask how you're feeling at the start of each day, using key words or descriptors, so if you're happy it could maybe increase the goal for the day, or feeling bad, be gentler. I would like to see some sort of reward too for exercise goals completed but not sure how that would work, can you send me chocolate? haha 3. It would be really helpful if it could promote the benefits of even just a little bit of exercise, like 15 minutes of stretching or walking to the shop instead of driving. It all helps. Most other exercise forums I've seen have this allor-nothing attitude and it's very discouraging if you're over-weight, depressed and stuck. Or if you have have very little time 4. Some people like me would like to log in each day, but others not so often so there needs to be an option for that. 5. Great colours, not too wordy or clinical. Making it like a game could help keep people interested, you could accumulate points or tokens.....maybe use them for prizes? 6. Customisable personal page where I could store ideas for exercise, variety helps motivation. You could include 20 ways I could reward myself that can be entered at the start, and sent to me as an email when I achieve a goal....ie; "Congrats Sarah you have achieved your goal of ... now go get yourself that \$100 massage!!" You know what I mean?

By making me feel proud of small achievements. By reminding me daily how much better I feel when I exercise.

1) What motivates you to be physically active?

I'm motivated to be physically active by the idea of being fit and healthy. The thought of being able to run, or dance, or do other physical things, and actually be able to do it and enjoy it, makes me want to get fit. The other thing that motivates me is if it has a purpose. For example, if I have a place to be and it's within walking distance, I will really enjoy the walk.

2) What stops you from being physically active?

The biggest thing that stops me from being physically active is that I really, really don't feel like it. The thought of deliberately going and doing something for no purpose other than the sake of doing it, that is no fun, horrifies me enough that I don't bother. It's seems a huge effort to force myself to do something I find unpleasant, in the little time I have to myself, where I could be doing something else that I would enjoy instead.

3) What benefits do you experience from being physically active?

If I'm doing some sort of physical activity that I enjoy, then I get pleasure out of it - it's fun. Also, I've found that if my head's buzzing after a day at work, I'll walk the 15 minutes to the next bus stop (rather than waiting for the one that stops just outside my office), and after the walk I feel much better about everything, like walking off the stress.

4) What are some methods that you are aware of to help improve mood and reduce feelings of sadness or irritability and how well do you think they work?

Just above I mentioned walking to the next bus stop from work - I find that incredibly effective, because I feel like I'm leaving (physically and mentally) my stress behind as I walk away from it. Other than that, I think talking and connecting and even just being around people that you like and trust works well to improve mood. Getting enough sleep definitely helps, too.

5) What do you think of being physically active as a way to feel better emotionally? Does it work?

I've heard that it does, but I don't think I've ever been physically active consistently enough to experience that for myself. As far as one off or occasional physical activity, if I've deliberately done some exercise for the sake of my health, I usually end up feeling worse, because I don't enjoy it at all and it's unpleasant and makes me feel exhausted, which makes it clear that it's not something that I'll be able to keep up, which makes me feel like a failure.

I think my example above about walking from work doesn't work because of the physical activity itself, so much as that I'm creating psychological distance between myself and the work I've been doing all day, as well as the mild physical exertion providing a sort of distraction, allowing me to think but forcing me to remain present, so not allowing me to think too hard.

I would say not a whole load - probably the recommended amount of 30 minutes per day would be enough to have some effect.

I have trouble believing that it could - based on past experience, I've not yet managed to find anything that motivates me to actually keep it up, because so far I haven't really found a physical activity that I enjoy doing.

Certainly nothing that is overwhelming at all (I once tried to start an 'absolute beginners' plan for running - ha! - I almost threw up in the first two minutes and decided never to do that again). I want to say suggest things that are fun to do, things that create pleasure, but there could still be an issue with motivation to do them in the first place. I think having support and encouragement from others really helps some people, but I hesitate to say that because that doesn't work for me at all.

Perhaps a program that also helps people improve their low mood in a non-physical way, and at the same time makes them aware of how low mood may be affecting their motivation to be physically active, and then with that in mind, gentle encouragement to be physically active.

What motivates you to be physically active?

I suffer from Rheumatoid, Osteoarthritis, Osteoporosis and other serious health problems. I will be eighty years old in May this year.

Use or lose it, is a concept I attempt to apply to minimise my joints becoming stiff and painful. I also use it broadly to help cope with my other health problems. We try to enjoy life as best as we can despite our limitations.

2) What stops you from being physically active?

The following can make it difficult for me to want to be physically active:

- fatigue caused by some of my health problems,
- pain from arthritis,
- anxiety personality plus bouts of depression

3) What benefits do you experience from being physically active?

- some pain reduction,
- more energised,
- more relaxed and positive attitude,
- less likely to fall and slip important for people of my age (especially if you have osteoporosis),
 - greater social interaction when other people are involved.

4) What are some methods that you are aware of to help improve mood and reduce feelings of sadness or irritability and how well do you think they work?

The following activities help improve my mood and to feel calmer and less negative-

- My wife and I workout at a Gym three time a week at a level we feel is suitable for our age and conditions.
 - We go dancing once or twice a week.
- We visit a very large local Shopping Centre about four times week and walk about a kilometre each visit.

5) What do you think of being physically active as a way to feel better emotionally? Does it work?

The short answer is yes but with the qualification that I have to be able to motivate myself to be active which is not easy if you are depressed etc.

Also refer (4) above.

6) How active do you think you need to be to improve your mood and reduce negative feelings?

I find that if I can do some activity daily, my mood and negative feelings are not as intense. About one to two hours of activity is manageable for me. A longer period can result in tiredness and pain which does not improve anxiety, mood etc. The type and intensity of the activity are significant factors. My problem is motivating myself to be active every day.

7) Have you had any experiences with using various treatments to improve your mood?

In my early twenties and two years ago I had professional counselling. At the end of this month I will be seeing a counsellor again. Both my wife and I do not hesitate to get assistance as necessary to help cope with whatever is worrying us. Can be expensive but it does help.

Years ago I was prescribed Amytal but only took it for a short period. It had a minor impact upon my anxiety and I sought other means such as dancing. The combination of physical activity and music had a positive effect for my mood problems etc.

8) What are limitations of the treatments that you may have tried?

I prefer to avoid using medications as I don't like the side effects or a possibility of dependency upon them.

Over the years we have joined gyms and had trainers to help us. For many reasons eg cost, time, illness, boredom have resulted in us dropping out after about eighteen months. Hopefully we will persist with our current gym. Gyms are costly in time and money.

Counselling is costly and can be time consuming. Also finding a suitable counsellor can be daunting.

I cannot recall any other treatments which I could have or wanted to try.

Motivation and consistency are my problem areas as they are for nearly every person I have met at gyms. If you can find a way to resolve this it would be great and also make you wealthy.

If a person is feeling low, depressed etc, the problem is will that person at that moment of need actually check out a website. From my experience it is only a maybe but more likely he/she wont. Some might look at it when they feel more positive but often you don't want to revisit that dark place.

Some years ago there was a program called "Life Be In It" promoted by the government. This was successful because of it was catchy and humorous whilst delivering its message. It would help your website if it had a similar Hook to get people to visit your site.

Further to my previous email, the following might be of some interest to you.

My wife is a Type 2 Diabetic on insulin and other medications. Her team of health professionals are doing good work in helping her manage her diabetes. She is one of the "lucky" ones in that she is aware of her illness. Hundreds of thousands of others are unaware that they have this illness. A young person we know was diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes and was put on medication.

A healthy diet and physical activity has reduced her weight such that her glucose levels are now in the normal range and off medication.

Your website may be another way to target those people who are unaware or are in denial about their diabetes and help them avoid the insidious consequences of diabetes ie blindness, heart disease, kidney problems and amputations.
