Important points

In your first year you will study modules from Media Cultures, and three additional subjects from a choice of either Journalism, Creative Writing New Media Publishing, Film or English Language & Communications.

Mandatory Attendance Requirement

You are expected to attend all of your learning and teaching sessions, unless there is a good reason for you not to do so (for example because of a disability). Please note that if you do not attend at least 75% of your sessions, there are potentially serious consequences for you, which may include you being deemed to have failed your module. To find out more about your attendance requirements, including the consequences of not meeting them, please refer to the Assessment Regulations section of your Programme Specification.

Any attendance modification will only be made in liaison with Student Wellbeing with appropriate supporting medical evidence.

Core Modules

If you are a full-time student, you must take one extra module in each year of your studies.

In your first year, "Introduction to Media Practices" is an induction module designed to equip you with practical learning tools for the programme, together with attendance at our Guest lecture series.

In each of your second and third years, core "Graduate Skills" modules are designed to enhance your employability and graduate attributes.

Placement Year/Year Abroad

You can choose to take a Year Abroad or Placement Year before you start your final year, subject to meeting academic requirements and confirmation of a suitable institution or employer. Please see the Programme Specifications for more details.

The University will not charge you tuition fees during your Placement Year, but you may incur additional costs, including your travel and accommodation, depending on where your placement is located.

There may be a tuition fee charge for a Year Abroad. Further details are available in the attached '**Fees and Finance**' policy.

Terms and Conditions

The Humanities programme is designed to offer maximum flexibility, but timetabling constraints may mean that some combinations of modules may be unavailable. Where a clash of modules occurs a student will be asked to choose a different module. Where a module, i.e. a self-contained taught unit, is under-subscribed, the University reserves the right not to run that particular module and to place students on their “reserve” choice.

Some modules may have minimum entry requirements, such as achieving a particular grade or taking enough modules in the subject to qualify for a final year dissertation.

Academic Year

Academic Year 2018 - 2019

The academic year is split into two Semesters (A & B). Each of these is made up of teaching weeks followed by exams (the re-sit period falls within Semester C)

- Semester A runs from Monday 17 September 2018 to Friday 11 January 2019
- Semester B runs from Monday 14 January 2019 to Friday 17 May 2019
- Semester C runs from Monday 20 May 2019 to Friday 13 September 2019
