A. Programme Rationale

This programme consist of a number of “specialist” Masters awards with an expectation that students will have studied a related engineering discipline to a Bachelor’s level or equivalent, as opposed to a “conversion” masters philosophy aimed at students from a non-engineering background. The MSc awards are normally studied over three semesters with the final semester being a 60 credit point individual project. The MSc has two starting points.

This has been adopted to meet the demand from international students whose previous studies were conducted with a different academic year to the normal September to September year operated in the UK. The consequence of this is that the modules that make up the MSc curriculum need to be independent of each other as the two intake groups of students will not necessarily take modules in the same order. Students entering in Semester B will therefore complete their studies over an 18 month period rather than 12 months. It is also possible for a student to study these awards on a part-time basis over a three year period.

The successful postgraduates of the programme will acquire the knowledge and understanding, intellectual, practical and transferable skills necessary for the analysis and synthesis of problems in engineering and manufacturing through a combination of experimental, simulation, research methods and case studies. They

can expect to gain work in a range of disciplines within a variety of industries from specialist technical roles to positions of management responsibility.

On the MSc in Communications and Information Engineering, the development of skills and advancement of knowledge focus on:

- Enabling students to understand the fundamentals of information theory and apply appropriate performance and quality measures to engineer enhanced data communication systems;
- Enabling students to design state-of-the-art networks using legacy as well as emerging optical and wireless technologies;
- Developing the students' ability to define and apply appropriate analytic, algorithmic and a mix of simulation and hardware tools for reliable data transfer.

On the MSc in Microelectronics and Computer Engineering, the development of skills and advancement of knowledge focus on:

- Developing in students strong design skills for the seamless integration of software and hardware subsystems through the adoption of software-hardware co-design methodologies;
- Enabling students to gain experience of designing digital systems for sustainable and smart applications, using DSP/FPGA/ASIC technology;
- Giving students an awareness of alternatives to the mainstream superscalar approach to computer design and instil in them design skills for a variety of acceleration intelligence techniques.

On the MSc in Power Electronics and Control, the development of skills and advancement of knowledge focus on:

- Enabling students to solve multidisciplinary problems related to energy conversion, renewable energy systems integration and energy efficiency;
- Developing in students practical skills for the analysis, design and application of power conversion systems in key areas of industry;
- Developing in students' skills to critically evaluate new developments in technology, carry out independent research and coordinate project activities.

On the MSc in Mechatronics, the development of skills and advancement of knowledge focus on:

- Enabling students to understand high level knowledge on Mechanical and Electronic Engineering and to gain a broad range expertise in these areas;
- Develop student's ability to control mechanical systems using analogue and digital electronics;
- Giving students an awareness of modern digital embedded platforms for mechatronic systems.

On the MSc in Embedded Intelligent Systems, the development of skills and advancement of knowledge focus on:

- developing in students the ability to integrate software and hardware in order to develop systems that demonstrate intelligence by increasing the system's effectiveness through learning;
- introducing students to some of the latest applications of embedded intelligent systems in fields such as neurofuzzy systems, cybernetics and biometrics;
- introducing students to the latest processor designs and enable them to evaluate alternative processor designs as platforms for embedded intelligent systems.

On the MSc in Radio and Mobile Communication Systems, the development of skills and advancement of knowledge focus on:

- introducing students to recent advances in mobile communication systems, with full coverage of both radio-frequency (RF) and data communication networks;
- enabling students to understand the latest protocols used in the implementation of robust and secure mobile communication systems.

D. Programme Structures, Features, Levels, Modules, and Credits

The programme is offered in full-time and part-time modes.

Full-time students may enter the programme for a Semester A start in September when it runs over one calendar year or in January for a Semester B start when it runs over 18 months. Identical modules will be studied on both September and January intakes. Students on the September and January intakes complete their projects in Semester C or B respectively.

In a part-time mode, the programme is normally offered in 3 years with identical modules studied with the full-time students.

Entry is normally at Masters Level 7 with related degree qualifications.

Accreditation of prior learning (APEL/APCL) is available for this programme. Students wishing to claim APL must document their relevant prior learning in detail and must provide full evidence for their prior achievement of the learning outcomes of this programme.

The Programme Learning Outcomes detailed in section C are developed and assessed through the constituent modules. Table 2 (at the end of this document) identifies where each learning outcome is developed and assessed.

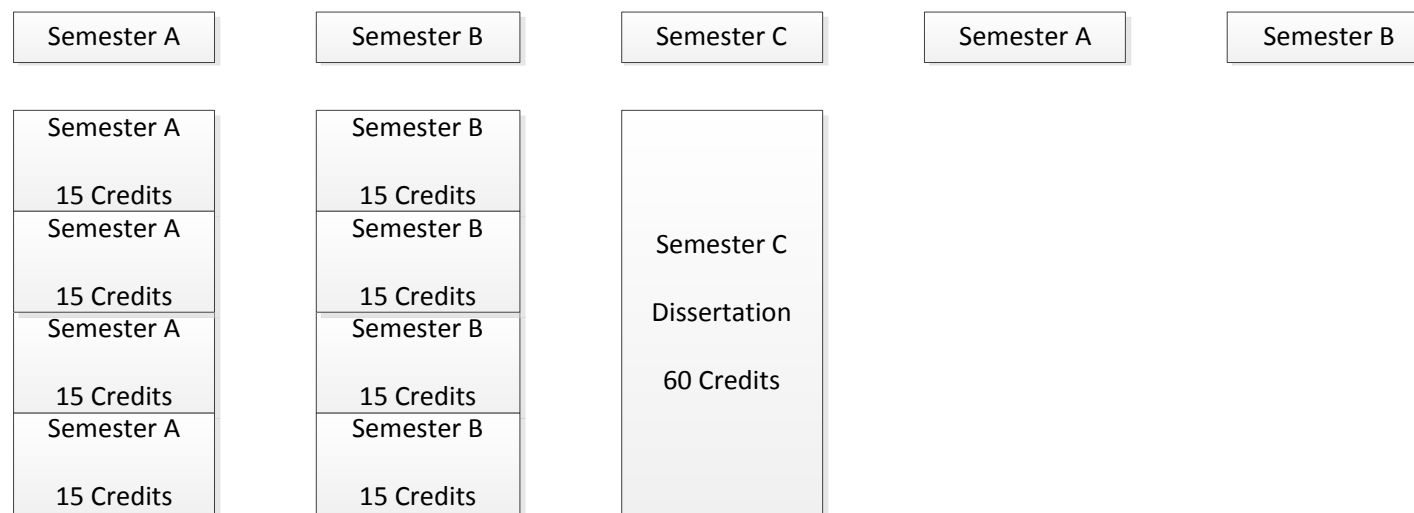

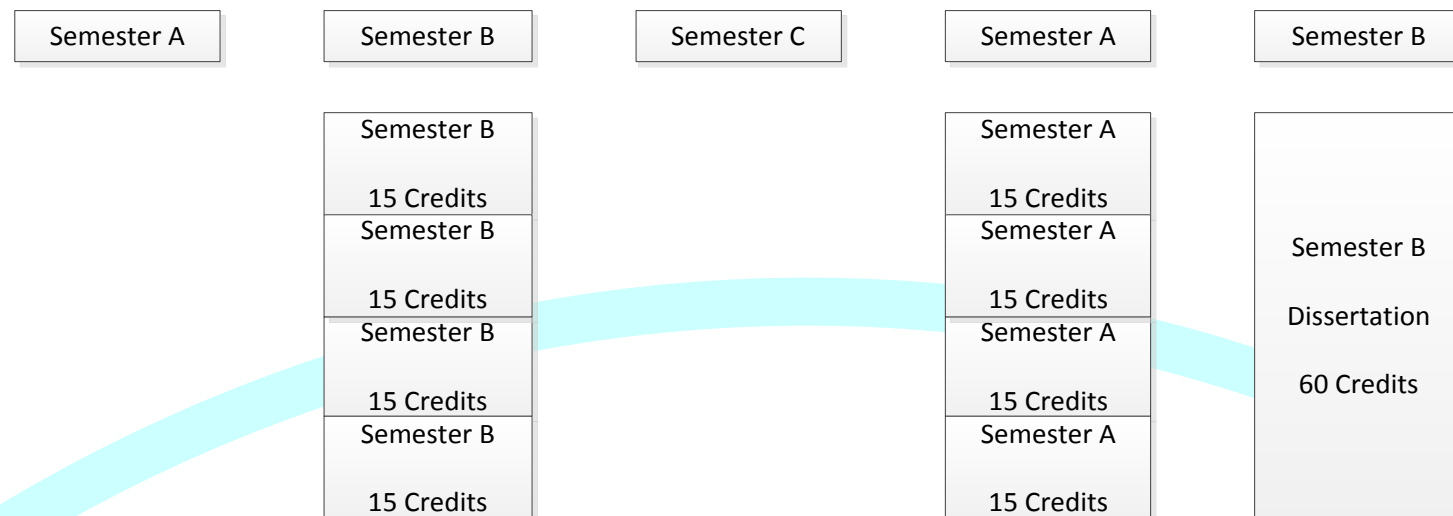

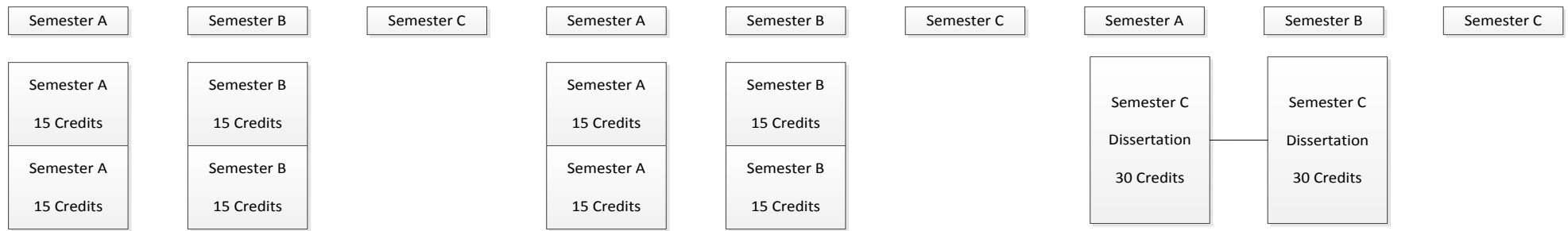
MSc (Semester A Entrant) – Full Time Structure



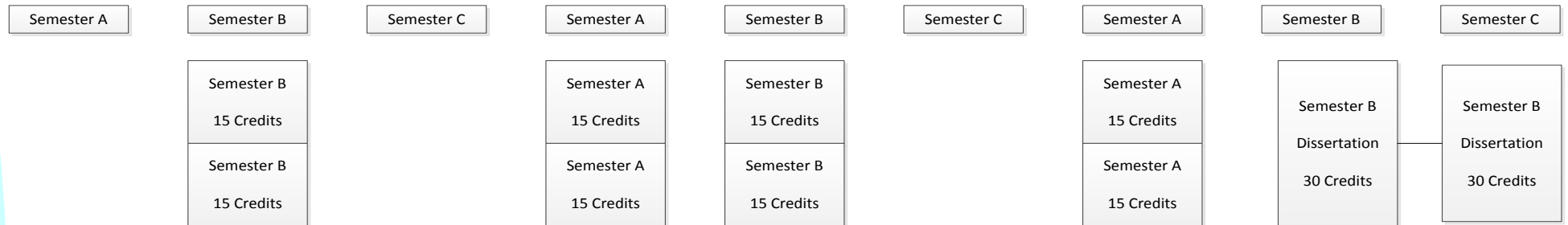
MSc (Semester B Entrant) – Full Time Structure

To comply with IET accreditation regulations students must achieve in all 15 credit point modules, after all available attempts under the University regulations, a minimum of 40% (in any allowable attempt) at level 7, before the board of examiners will be able to consider compensation for an accredited degree

Compensatory credit on the following awards shall be awarded in accordance with UPR AS14 Sections D4.1, D4.2 and D4.5. In exercising their discretion under D4.1, Programme Boards shall not award compensatory credit unless there is clear evidence of genuine engagement with a failed module as shown by a student's attendance record on the module, together with a serious attempt at all elements of assessment.

MSc Power Electronics and Control
MSc Mechatronics

For all awards compensation is not permitted for individual modules worth 30 or more credit points at level 7. Major projects such as the MSc individual project cannot be compensated.

Where the mode of assessment for an individual module is 60/40 (exam/coursework) or 50/50 (exam/coursework) then for a student to pass the module he/she must achieve no less than 40% in each mode of assessment for a Level 7 module.

G. Entry requirements

The normal entry requirements for the programme are:

The normal entry requirements for the programme are:

- i. typically a minimum of 2:ii honours degree in Aerospace, Automotive, Mechanical, or Manufacturing (with a relevant analytical content) based discipline; **or**
- ii. any other contiguous discipline the subject content of which does not overlap with that of the programme to any substantial extent; **or**
- iii. a qualification from any other recognised International academic institution which is of comparable academic standard to those identified above; **or**
- iv. Exceptionally, a number of applicants with other relevant professional qualifications who have the necessary academic achievements and experience will be considered under APCL and APEL.

English Language Requirements

In addition to the requirements stated above, students entering the programme and whose first language is not English will be required to demonstrate a proficiency in English to TOEFL 550/IELTS 6.0 or an equivalent recognised qualification. For IELTS, this should include a minimum score of 5.5 in each band. Students without IELTS of 6.0 or equivalent, depending on the Country of Origin, would normally be expected to complete a suitable programme of study prior to the commencement of their MSc programme, such as Pre-Sessional English Classes or any other suitable programme deemed appropriate by the University.

The programme is subject to the University's Principles, Policies and Regulations for the Admission of Students to Undergraduate and Taught Postgraduate Programmes (in [UPR SA03](#)), along with associated procedures. These will take account of University policy and guidelines for assessing accredited prior certificated learning (APCL) and accredited prior experiential learning (APEL).
