Important points

- This Masters programme is particularly attractive to those wishing to pursue a professional career in Clinical Psychology, or a career as a researcher in the area of mental health.
- It provides you with an up-to-date introduction into Clinical Psychology covering all essential areas of knowledge relating to current theories of psychopathology, psychiatric diagnosis and psychological methods of assessment as well as effective psychological interventions.
- The module Professional Clinical Skills will introduce you to professional standards in clinical psychology and provides you with an opportunity to practice those skills in a simulation exercise.
- A particular strength of the programme is its intensive research training in the area of quantitative and qualitative research. This should enable you to develop your competence in applying such methods to research problems in the area of clinical psychology.
- The module Research Internship in Clinical Psychology allows you to familiarise yourself with professional research through practical experiences under supervision.
- Following on from your internship, you will then conduct your own research for your Masters thesis in an area of your interest under supervision.
- You will be taught in a dedicated postgraduate teaching room. Teaching includes lectures, seminars, practical sessions in class, workshops, group work and simulation exercises.
- There are two major components of assessment, exams and written coursework. Coursework is by far the larger component.
- Part-time and full-time routes are both available.

Academic Year

Academic Year 2019 - 2020

The University's academic year is made up of 3 Semesters. For most postgraduate students the academic year is split into two Semesters (A & B). Each of these is made up of teaching weeks followed by exams (the re-sit period and MSc project fall within Semester C).

- Semester A runs from Monday 23 September 2019 to Friday 17 January 2020
- Semester B runs from Monday 20 January 2020 to Friday 22 May 2020
- Semester C runs from Monday 25 May 2020 to Friday 18 September 2020
