## A. Programme Rationale

The media industry is having to adapt at speed to dramatic changes in production and consumption, and employers now want skilled Journalism graduates who can work flexibly across a whole range of evolving platforms.

The BA (Hons) Journalism is designed to produce highly competent, industry-ready journalists. This intensive course ensures students receive an excellent grounding in journalism in the digital age, enabling them to work across tv, radio, print, social media and online platforms. With a work placement in the final year, the Journalism degree is designed to enhance employability, ensuring that graduating students are capable of working as journalists in the production of online, multimedia and broadcast content in the world of news, current affairs, features, and documentaries.

The Journalism degree will make a feature of giving students a wide palette of skills and an understanding of how to apply them. While developing the traditional journalistic skills of research and storytelling, it will equip students with the ability to apply this learning across a wide range of media, including, photography, video, audio, the written word and it will do so across different platforms and varying publishing formats.

#### B. Educational Aims of the Programme

The programme has been devised in accordance with the University's graduate attributes of programmes of study as set out in <u>UPR TL03</u>.

#### Additionally this programme aims to:

- develop students' knowledge and understanding of the operation and social, legal and economic contexts of the journalism industry
- provide education and training that is in line with the requirements set by the programme accrediting body, the BJTC (Broadcast Journalism Training Council)



 provide students with the knowledge and understanding to equip them for a career in Journalism or media-related employment

## C. Intended Learning Outcomes

The programme provides opportunities for students to develop and demonstrate knowledge and understanding, skills and other attributes in the following areas. The programme outcomes are referenced to the QAA benchmark statements for Communication, Media, Film and Cultural Studies and the Frameworks for Higher Education Qualifications of UK Degree-Awarding Bodies (2014) and relate to the typical student. Additionally, the SEEC Credit Level Descriptors for Further and Higher Education (2016) have been used as a guiding framework for curriculum design.

## Knowledge and Understanding

- A1 Demonstrate a broad knowledge and understanding of the essential characteristics of news and features journalism, journalistic markets, and styles across a range of platforms.

## Teaching and learning methods

Acquisition of knowledge and understanding is through a combination of lectures, seminars, workshops, tutorials together with guided learning.

Acquisition of knowledge and understanding A1, A3, A4, and A7, is through a combination of seminars, workshops, simulated newsroom activities, and guided learning.

Acquisition of A2, A5 and A6 is through a combination of lectures, seminars, and guided learning.

Throughout, the learner is encouraged to undertake independent study both to supplement and consolidate what is being taught/learnt and to broaden their individual knowledge and understanding of the subject.

#### Assessment strategy

Knowledge and understanding are assessed through a range of coursework, including essays, comparative analyses, reports, reflective essays group projects and in-class presentations.

Knowledge and understanding of A1, A3, and A5 are assessed through portfolios of news and features content, critical analyses and supporting portfolios.

Assessment of knowledge and understanding of A2, A4, A5 and A6 is through formal essay and examination.

Throughout, the learner is encouraged to undertake independent study both to supplement and consolidate what is being taught/learnt and broaden their individual knowledge and understanding of the subject.



- A6 Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the interrelating role of communication systems, modes of representation and systems of meaning in the structuring of society as well as an in depth understanding of journalism in an international context.
- A7 Demonstrate a broad knowledge and understanding of the audio and/or visual conventions through which sounds, images and words make meaning alongside the use of technology to report news, construct features and be creative.

#### Teaching and learning methods

Intellectual skills are developed through lectures, seminars, class exercises, in-class analysis of model examples and the development of coursework projects.

Acquisition of B2 is through a combination of lectures, seminars, and guided learning.

Throughout, the learner is encouraged to undertake

Assessment of intellectual skills is through formal essays, coursework involving critical evaluation and development of a media product including documentation.

## D. Programme Structures, Features, Levels, Modules, and Credits

The programme is offered in full-time (3 years), sandwich (4 years) and part-time (6 years) modes and leads to the award of a BA degree with honours.

Entry is normally at Level 4 (with suitable A level or equivalent qualifications). Intake is normally in Semester A (September).

#### Work-Based Learning, including Sandwich Programmes

An award in the sandwich mode requires the successful completion of at least **360 hours** placement activity from a maximum of two separate placements in addition to the period of academic study required for the award. This optional placement year is undertaken after Level 5 and before Level 6 and meets the SEEC criteria for Level 6.

#### Programme Structure

The programme structure and progression information below (Table 1a and 1b) is provided for the Honours award. Any interim awards are identified in Table 1b. The Programme Learning Outcomes detailed above are developed and assessed through the constituent modules. Table 2 identifies where each learning outcome is assessed.

#### Table 1a Outline Programme Structure

#### Mode of study Full-time

Students on a full-time mode of study must normally take the equivalent of eight 15 credit modules per year with the equivalent of four 15 credit modules undertaken per semester.

In addition, at level 5 students must study the module 5HUM1064 Graduate and Employability Skills. Failure in this module would not prevent progression, providing the normal progression rules had been met, but would result in a code of FREN (Fail, Re-enrol). Should a student fail the module at the second attempt, a fail would show on his/her transcript.

The award of an Honours Degree normally requires 360 credit points passed with a minimum of 120 credit points at level 6.

#### Sandwich Year and Year Abroad

Students may optionally undertake a placement year or a year abroad studying at a foreign University after successfully completing their level 5 studies at honours level. The placement year and year abroad offer an additional optional year (0 credited) which increases the length of the Honours degree award to a four year full-time degree. Successful completion of the placement year or year abroad is reflected in the degree title.

#### Sandwich Year

The placement year comprises an agreed period of 36 weeks (including employers and statutory holidays) of work based learning a maximum of two institutions or companies which has agreed to those terms and conditions regarded as essential by the University of Hertfordshire. Students will be supervised according to university regulations. The learning experience will be assessed with assessments set by the Employability Tutor to enable students to demonstrate both their knowledge of the industry, their skills development and their professional attributes.

Placements are advertised through the Career and Placements Office and have included areas such as marketing, journalism, PR, management and Policy Units. Students may also source their own placement, but it must be subsequently approved by the School in terms of health and safety, equality legislation and supervisory guidelines before a student can take it up.

All students are eligible to proceed to a placement year provided they have achieved 120 credits at Level 4 and 90 credits at Level 5 and have completed the appropriate placement induction and documentation. Success in the placement will be recognised in the title of the award but does not carry additional credit towards the Honours programme.

#### Year Abroad

The year abroad comprises an agreed programme of study in the third year of a partner institution in Europe (other than the UK), North or South America, Australia or Singapore with which the University of Hertfordshire has an institutional agreement.

A student's programme of study will be negotiated and approved by the Dean of School (or nominee) in consultation with appropriate others and the host University. The programme provided by the host institution may comprise taught modules, a research project, field studies, or a mixture of these components. The programme of study will require a minimum of 25% of studies to be undertaken in aspects of culture of the placement country. Prior to the commencement of the year abroad, the student and Study Abroad Tutors from UH and the host institution will agree a learning contract. The learning contract will specify the assessment requirements to be met for successful completion of the programme of study. A Module Board of Examiners will consider the results for the year abroad during the first semester of the following academic year. All assessments must be completed by the end of the year abroad, and no subsequent referrals will be permitted. Students who have varied their programme of study without agreement from UH or have failed to meet the requirements of the learning contract will not have their year abroad studies included in the degree title.

A student must confirm the intention to study abroad during the first ten weeks of study at Level 5. This will enable a place to be negotiated at a host institution and the study programme and learning contract to be arranged and agreed. Only a limited number of places exist. These will be awarded on the basis of the suitability of students and guided by choice on the most appropriate programme and host institution.

To be eligible to proceed to a year abroad, a student must, after the Semester B Module Boards of Examiners, have achieved at least 210 credits overall, including at least 90 credits at Level 5. Success in the year abroad will be recognised in the title of the award but does not carry additional credit towards the Honours programme.

Further programme-specific regulations (requiring School-level approval) are given below:

- Progression from one Level to the next depends on meeting the pre-requisite requirements: students
  must normally have 60 credits in Journalism at the lower Level before progressing to study at the higher
  Level.
- Attendance at all scheduled learning and teaching sessions is required on this programme. To pass a module, a student must have attended 75% of the learning and teaching sessions at which attendance is required. If attendance falls below 75% but not lower than 50% and the student passes the assessment, the module grade will be capped at the pass mark (40%). If attendance falls below 75% on and the student fails the assessment or attendance falls below 50%, the student will normally be deemed to have failed the module at the first attempt and will not be permitted to undertake referred assessment in the module.

Students who have a disability which might impact on their attendance should consult with their disability advisor.

## Management

The programme is managed and administered through:

- A Dean of School who has overall responsibility for all programmes in the School
- An Associate Dean of School (Academic Quality Assurance) who has overall responsibility for academic quality, assurance and enhancement with and on behalf of the Dean of School
- A Programme Leader for the Mass Communications Programme
- Admissions Tutors, with specific responsibility for selection
- A Tutor for Employability
- A Head of Media who is responsible for all the modules in the subject area

- Designated Student Administrators to deal with day-to-day administration associated with the courses and modules within the Programmes
- A Programme committee which has a membership which includes all of the above plus an Information Manager and student representatives
- An Associate Dean of School (Learning and Teaching) who has overall responsibility for learning and teaching with and on behalf of the Dean of School
- An Associate Dean of School (Commercial) who has specific responsibility for induction.
- Module Leaders who are responsible for individual modules

#### Support

At university level, students are supported by:

- Attractive modern study environments in two Learning Resource Centres, incorporating libraries and computer centres

At School level, students are further supported by:



- A Head of Media
- A Journalism Co-ordinator
- A student support team to provide confidential academic and pastoral advice through a daily Helpdesk run during term-time
- Scheduled weekly Student Drop-In hours for all academic staff for student support and guidance
- Designated Programme Administrators to deal with day-to-day administration associated with the modules within the Programme
- Module Leaders who are responsible for individual modules
- A School Community Officer (SCO)
- An induction session at the beginning of each new academic session
- A Study Abroad Tutor
- A Tutor for Employability
- An Academic Skills Tutor

On the Mass Communications Programme students are further supported by:

- A Programme Leader to help students understand the programme structure and provide confidential academic and pastoral advice through a Programme Helpdesk run during term-time
- Personal tutors to provide further academic and pastoral support, with scheduled meetings each semester to advise on academic performance, feedback, module choices, and long term plans
- Student Representatives on the Programme Committee

## G. Entry requirements

The normal entry requirements for the programme are:

112 UCAS points

IB - 112 points from a minimum of 2 HL subjects at H4 or above. GCSE Maths and English Language at Grade 4 or above (Grade C or above under the old grading structure).

All non-majority English speaking countries are required to demonstrate an English language capability of IELTS 7.0 or equivalent in speaking, listening, reading and writing assessments. Where the standard is not achieved, the BJTC will require evidence of remedial measures in place.

The programme is subject to the University's Principles, Policies and Regulations for the Admission of Students to Undergraduate and Taught Postgraduate Programmes (in <u>UPR SA03</u>), along with associated procedures. These will take account of University policy and guidelines for assessing accredited prior certificated learning (APCL) and accredited prior experiential learning (APEL).
