A. Programme Rationale

The purpose of this programme is to develop graduates who are equipped with the skills, knowledge, and competencies in nutrition to be able to work in the public and private sector nationally and internationally. The content is designed to enable graduates to play a role in health promotion and education and to examine the scientific basis of the link between nutrition and disease prevention. Academics use a variety of pedagogic techniques including research-informed teaching, which increases in intensity as students progress through the levels. In the final year, students undertake a research project, many of which are of a sufficiently high standard to warrant presentation and publication in national and international conferences and academic journals. Joint teaching on a variety of modules enhances the learning experience through peer-to-peer engagement within a diverse student population. The programme has a student-centred approach to management and delivery with representatives sitting on programme committees and fora. Academics provide support to all students according to their needs, and value-added data suggest that graduating students exit with an elevated standard of academic achievement compared to entry. The aim is to provide students with a breadth and depth of nutrition knowledge, transferable skills, and work experience in order to engage with the numerous career options available. The programme has been designed to meet the Association for Nutrition (AfN) course accreditation competencies and is accredited by the AfN (Number AC272). Graduates with an honours degree will be eligible to apply to the Association for Nutrition (AfN) for registration as Associate Registered Nutritionist (ANutr).

B. Educational Aims of the Programme

The programme has been devised in accordance with the University's graduate attributes of programmes of study as set out in [UPR TL03](#).

Additionally this programme aims to develop:

- in graduates, the key features common to all professional nutritionists in line with the accreditation requirements of the Association for Nutrition
- an ability to integrate the molecular, cellular, organism and population levels of the biosciences
- an ability to understand the biological basis of the interaction between the organism and its food
- an ability to take account of economic, social, and behavioural dimensions when applying nutrition and other sciences
- an ability to use knowledge, understanding and skills to optimise the health and wellbeing or welfare of individuals, groups, and populations

C. Intended Learning Outcomes

The programme provides opportunities for students to develop and demonstrate knowledge and understanding, skills and other attributes in the following areas. The programme is designed to meet the AfN accreditation competencies. Additionally, the programme outcomes are referenced to the QAA benchmark statements for Biomedical Sciences (2015) and the Frameworks for Higher Education Qualifications of UK Degree-Awarding Bodies (2014) and relate to the typical student. Additionally, the SEEC Credit Level Descriptors for Further and Higher Education (2016) have been used as a guiding framework for curriculum design.

D. Programme Structures, Features, Levels, Modules, and Credits

The programme is offered in full-time (3 years, or 4 years including a year abroad or sandwich placement year) mode, and leads to the award of a BSc (Hons) Nutrition, or BSc (Hons) Nutrition with a Year Abroad, or BSc (Hons) Nutrition (Sandwich).

Entry is normally at Level 4 with A-level or equivalent qualifications. Intake is normally in Semester A (September).

Professional and Statutory Regulatory Bodies

The degree has been accredited by the Association for Nutrition (AfN). Upon successful completion of the programme and all modules, graduates are eligible to apply to the AfN for registration as an Associate Registered Nutritionist (ANutr). After a period of three years' professional experience, an ANutr will be eligible to apply to become a Registered Nutritionist (RNutr) and to join the UK Voluntary Register of Nutritionists. Students graduating from this programme are not eligible to apply for HCPC registration.

Work-Based Learning, including Sandwich Programmes

The programme includes an optional module of a year-long placement as well as a mandatory work experience placement module in the final year. A Sandwich award requires successful completion of at least 36 weeks full-time equivalent placement activity from a maximum of two separate placements, neither of which should normally be fewer than 12 weeks in duration.

Erasmus Exchange programme

This opportunity is typically unavailable as there are insufficient programmes in Europe that are taught in

English.

Programme Structure

The programme structure and progression information below (Table 1a and 1b) is provided for the Honours award. Any interim awards are identified in Table 1b. The Programme Learning Outcomes detailed above are developed and assessed through the constituent modules. Table 2 (in section 2) identifies where each learning outcome is assessed.

The award of an Honours Degree requires 360 credit points passed, with a minimum of 120 credit points at level 6.

Students who in addition pass the zero-credit rated level 6 Year Study Abroad module are eligible for the award of a BSc (Hons) Nutrition with a Year Abroad. This module requires study at one of the School of Life and Medical Sciences academic partner institutions outside the UK. The assessments completed at the partner institution will not contribute to the Honours classification. To be eligible for this award at least two (2) semesters of study must be completed and at least 90 credit points accumulated. One (1) semester could be a semester of placement activity abroad (typically, at least 12 weeks), in which case at least 45 credit points must be accumulated.

Students who in addition complete and pass the zero-credit rated level 6 Year Placement module are eligible for the award of a BSc (Hons) Nutrition (Sandwich).

Honours classification

Programme-specific assessment regulations

The programme complies with the University's academic regulations (in particular, [UPR AS11](#), [UPR AS12/UPR AS13](#), and [UPR AS14](#)) with the exception of those listed below, which have been approved by the University:

- Length of student registration is a maximum of **six** years.

Further programme-specific regulations (requiring School-level approval) are given below:

- As specified by the external validating body, no intramodular compensation for referred modules is permitted
- In order to pass modules students must pass the examination and pass each component of coursework at 40%, unless stated otherwise in the Definitive Module Document.
- Attendance is monitored. Students are expected to attend all timetabled sessions and failure to do so may negatively affect progression.
- Students must achieve a minimum of 45 credits to be considered for reassessment at levels 4 and 5.

E. Management of Programme & Support for student learning.

The programme is managed and administered through:

- Programme Leader who is responsible for the day to day management

G. Entry requirements

The normal entry requirements for the programme are:

72-168 UCAS points.

A levels

Required subjects: Biology at Grade C and preferably Chemistry at Grade C*.

The remaining UCAS points should come from an additional A level or equivalent.

*We may consider applicants without A level Chemistry. Applicants that do not have Chemistry A level will be required to study a Chemistry module at Year 1.

International Baccalaureate (IB)

Total score 24 points to include biology and preferably chemistry at HL 4*

*Applicants without chemistry will be considered but will be required to study a Chemistry module at Year 1.

BTEC QCF (Level 3) qualifications

- BTEC Extended Diploma in Applied Science, to include units in Biology and Chemistry
- BTEC Diploma in Applied Science, to include units in Biology and Chemistry. Students will also need to have an additional A level preferably in science.

Please contact us if you are taking a different BTEC. All BTEC offers will be subject and grade specific particularly in the science subjects.

Access to Science Diploma

45 Level 3 credits overall all at Merit. This should include 15 credits in Biology and preferably 15 credits in Chemistry.

Irish Higher Leaving Certificate

Required subjects: Biology at Grade B3 and preferably Chemistry at Grade B3*.

*We may consider applicants without Chemistry. Applicants that do not have Chemistry will be required to study a Chemistry module at Year 1.

Alternative qualifications

We welcome applications from applicants with alternative qualifications including:

Science Foundation / Extended Degree

Pass in all modules to include 60% in Biology and 60% in Chemistry.

Graduates from other degrees

Typically minimum of 2.2 level of achievement in a related subject area e.g. Science.
