- To be eligible for the dissertation option students must have passed 120 credits at level 4 AND level 5, at least 60 of which at 50% or above at level 5 and no level 5 module grade below 40%.

Year 4 – Compulsory Study Abroad/Placement Year

The placement year can comprise of one semester study abroad combined with a short work placement (min. 12 weeks full time work) **or** two semesters study abroad. For **Two Continents Route** students, the Placement Year is spent in a different continent to that in which they studied Level 5.

A. Programme Rationale

The BA International Business programme is accredited by EPAS/EFMD. There are only 102 such programmes in 76 institutions in the world, and 11 in the UK, which are currently accredited in this way. Both the rationale and the delivery of the programme were instrumental in this accreditation.

The BA International Business caters for students who wish to add an international dimension to their business education and who are aiming for a career in the global business market. It will be equally attractive to students from the UK and from other countries and will give them the opportunity to live and work in one, two or even three, countries other than their own. It is designed to provide the managers of tomorrow with the business and management skills, language competence and/or cultural awareness required for success in an international business environment. It will equip the student with the knowledge and skills required for managerial posts in the UK or other countries. The international experience will be an important and positive factor in the personal development of students and, for those who choose to study it for the four years of the degree, a foreign language competence will give them a competitive edge in the job market.

B. Educational Aims of the Programme

The programme has been devised in accordance with the University's graduate attributes of programmes of study as set out in [UPR TL03](#).

Additionally this programme aims to:

- enable students study organisations, their management practices and changing global economy in which they operate;
- prepare and develop students for a career in business and management, especially in an international context.
- develop and enhance in students transferable, intellectual and study skills;
- enable students to attain a knowledge of a language other than their own, and for some, to gain a high level of proficiency in it;
- foster an awareness of, and sensitivity to, their own and others' cultural background and influences.
- produce readily employable graduates possessing lifelong learning skills to make immediate contribution to employing organization and society at large.

C. Intended Learning Outcomes

The programme provides opportunities for students to develop and demonstrate knowledge and understanding, skills and other attributes in the following areas. The programme outcomes are referenced to the QAA benchmark statements for General Business and Management (2015) and the Frameworks for Higher Education Qualifications of UK Degree-Awarding Bodies (2014) and relate to the typical student. Additionally, the SEEC Credit Level Descriptors for Further and Higher Education (2016) have been used as a guiding framework for curriculum design.

The programme provides multiple opportunities for both group working and individual work, and encourages negotiation skills through role-play and in-class exercises and assessments. Students emerge confident and able to work in a variety of organizational environments across the globe.

From the start, students learn the value of quantitative methods in the context of international business, and are assessed on their ability initially, to undertake business data analysis, but ultimately, to use that analysis to inform strategic decisions.

Students' interpersonal skills and understanding of leadership and teamwork are developed in the teamwork in formative and summative assessments, as well as academically within the Human Resource Management modules.

D. Programme Structures, Features, Levels, Modules, and Credits

The programme is offered in as a full-time, 4 year degree, with a mandatory year abroad in the placement year. Students may additionally opt to study Level 5 of their programme overseas (as a 'replacement' year). These periods of International Study, on successful completion lead to the awards of:

1. BA (Hons) International Business with Study Abroad (for students who have studied one semester abroad, and combined this with a work placement semester)
2. BA (Hons) International Business with a Year Abroad (for students who have studied two semesters abroad)
3. BA (Hons) International Business with Extended Study Abroad (for students who have studied three semesters abroad with work placement, or studied four semesters abroad)

Entry is normally at level 4 with suitable A-level or equivalent qualifications, but direct entry at level 5 is possible with suitable qualifications. The intake is normally in Semester A (September).

The programme offers 5 languages: French, German and Japanese at beginner and intermediate Levels, Mandarin at beginner level and Spanish at beginner, intermediate and advanced levels. A post experience or post placement level is available in all languages.

These titles are all available as titles 'with <French>, <German>, <Spanish>, <Mandarin Chinese> or <Japanese>', and these languages will be added into the title if the student passes a minimum of 75 credits of consistent language in years 1, 2 and 4.

Where languages enter into a degree title with the addition of Study Abroad or a Year Abroad etc. the final award shall look like this:

Examples:

BA (Hons) International Business *with French and Study Abroad*

BA (Hons) International Business *with Spanish and a Year Abroad*

BA (Hons) International Business *with Japanese and Extended Study Abroad*

Professional and Statutory Regulatory Bodies

This is an EPAS-accredited programme. EPAS is an international programme accreditation system operated by EFMD. EFMD evaluates the quality of business and/or management programmes that have an international perspective.

Study and Placement Overseas

All students undertake a compulsory year abroad in their third year. This placement period is an important element of the programme as it gives students a practical perspective to their academic studies and enables them to increase greatly their proficiency in the foreign language (where applicable). During that year students undertake a period of study of one semester minimum at one of the University's partner institutions, and are strongly encouraged to undertake an approved work placement abroad of at least 12 weeks duration before or after this period of study. This helps them to further develop their cultural awareness and acquire an understanding of foreign business practices. (Students are not permitted to take Study Abroad in their country of origin, in order to broaden their learning experience).

To pass the placement year, students are required to pass the equivalent of 45 credits of assessment per semester of study, and, if undertaking work placement, students need to successfully complete the 'Professional Experience - Short Placement' module.

Erasmus Exchange programme

The degree programme is open to all Erasmus students who select option choices from across the programme. For further details, please contact the Programme Leader.

Optional Extra Year Abroad in Level : The 'Two Continents Route'

Students may also choose to study Level 5 (second year) of their programme abroad, in a partner institution overseas, rather than at UH (see Diagram 1: Study routes, below). Students on this '**Two Continents Route**' study at one of the University's partner institution in North America, Latin America, Australia or the Asia Pacific regions for both semester in Level 5, and must follow a programme of study, in English, broadly equivalent to level 5 of this programme back home. This has to be approved by the UH Programme Leader, the host institution, and also signed by the student. The student's study abroad cannot be in the student's country of origin (or in the UK)

The approved programme of study needs to be equivalent to 120 credits towards their degree. The study abroad year is 'pass/fail' with credits generated at the partner institution carried across. For these students, their degree calculation is derived solely from final year grades gained from UH modules at Level 6*.

The **Two Continents Route** is classified as an integrated (or 'replacement') Level 5 Study Abroad year, and this option is available subject to students achieving sufficiently high grades, and programme leader approving the proposed programme of study. BAIB Level 5 overseas would then go on to study a further 'Placement Year' abroad in a different continent to that in which they studied Level 5, either taking a further two semesters at the next University, or studying in the first semester and spending the second in a short work placement (min. 12 weeks full time work). Students passing three semester or more of overseas study qualify for the degree suffix 'with Extended Study Abroad'

- Research Methods is compulsory for any student who selects the dissertation option. It is 0 credit rated, so does not 'count' as an option choice (it is part of the dissertation support process)
- To be eligible for the dissertation option students must have passed 120 credits at level 4 AND level 5, at least 60 of which at 50% or above at level 5 and no level 5 module grade below 40%.

The award of an Honours degree requires 360 credit points, with at least 240 credits at level 5 or above, of which at least 120 credits must be at level 6. An unclassified degree requires 300 credit points, with at least 180 credits at level 5 or above, of which at least 60 credits must be at level 6.

Programme-specific assessment regulations

The programme complies with the University's academic regulations (in particular, [UPR AS11](#), [UPR AS12/UPR AS13](#) and [UPR AS14](#) with the exception of those listed below, which have been approved by the University:

The results for the placement year - two semesters of study or one semester of study and 12 weeks of work placement - will be shown on University transcripts as Pass or Fail.

Students on their placement year who do not pass 45 credits (22.5 ECTS or equivalent) of assessment at one of the University's partner institutions abroad will not be able to pass the placement year, but can stay on the programme and complete their International Business degree though without gaining the addition of "study abroad", "a year abroad" or "extended study abroad" to their degree title. Students could also choose to transfer to a default Business programme, as arranged with their Programme Leader.

Research Methods is compulsory for any student who selects the dissertation option. It is 0 credit rated, so does not 'count' as an option choice (it is part of the dissertation support process)

To be eligible for the dissertation option students must have passed 120 credits at level 4 AND 120 credits passed a level 5, and students need to achieve a module grade of at least 50% in half of the 120 Level 5 modules.

Taking Level 5 overseas as a 'replacement' for Level 5 UH Study:

- As in the UPRs, but included here for clarity, Students opting to study Level 5 overseas, as a 'replacement' year (replacing UH Level 5 study), receive [pass/fail] credits based on their results from the partner institution (using appropriate world-wide equivalence tables for grade translations). Their final degree award is based on UH generated credit at level 6, based on their average numeric grade calculated from the best 90 of 120 credits at Level 6 (UPR AS14 D.6.1.1)
- Students who opt to study abroad, outside Europe, for all of level 5, and fail up to the equivalent of 30 UH credits or equivalent will have to repeat equivalent, UH modules on their return to the University of Hertfordshire in their final year, in order to remain on the Honours pathway.
- Students who opt to study abroad, outside Europe, for all of level 5, and fail more than the equivalent of 30 UH credits or equivalent, will not be allowed to proceed to the placement year, and must either repeat the year or transfer to another Business programme at level 5, as arranged with their Programme Leader.
