A. Programme Rationale

The LLM Legal Practice fulfils the academic requirements of the vocational stage of training for qualification as a solicitor. The programme is validated by the Solicitors Regulation Authority who have authorised the University of Hertfordshire as a provider.

The programme complements the range of programmes offered by Hertfordshire Law School which also offers the academic stage of training for the solicitors' profession through two undergraduate programmes, the LLB and Joint Honours, thus allowing students to complete both academic and vocational stages of training to enter the solicitor's profession.

The programme also provides students with an advanced academic qualification which will enhance their employability and allow them to access the postgraduate loan from Student Finance England.

B. Educational Aims of the Programme

The programme has been devised in accordance with the University's graduate attributes of programmes of study as set out in UPR TL03.

Additionally, this programme aims to:

Prepare students for work-based learning during the Training Contract/Period of Recognised Training (PRT).

C. Intended Learning Outcomes

The programme provides opportunities for students to develop and demonstrate knowledge and understanding, skills and other attributes in the following areas. The programme outcomes are referenced the Frameworks for Higher Education Qualifications of UK Degree-Awarding Bodies (2014) and relate to the typical student. Additionally, the SEEC Credit Level Descriptors for Further and Higher Education (2016) have been used as a guiding framework for curriculum design.

- A1- Research and apply knowledge of the law and legal practice accurately and effectively in the core practice areas of Business Law and Practice, Property Law and Practice, Litigation and the areas of Wills and Administration of Estates and Taxation.

- A4- Demonstrate a comprehensive theoretical knowledge and understanding in the three areas covered by their choice of electives as described in the SRA Learning Outcomes requirements for the Legal Practice Course.

Teaching/learning methods & strategies

Acquisition of knowledge and understanding is through large group sessions which include embedded multiple-choice questions together with a mixture of face to face and online workshops in which students will work individually and collaboratively to develop knowledge and understanding of the law and practice matters covered in each module of study.

A detailed weekly timetable is provided indicating the sequence of online and face to face sessions.

Throughout, the student is encouraged to undertake independent study both to supplement and consolidate what is being taught/learnt and to broaden their individual knowledge and understanding of the subject.

Online large group sessions are designed to draw students' attention to key issues arising within the topic area, including law, practice, professional conduct and key skills requirements. Online workshops focus on legal research, writing, drafting, advising and professional conduct in the context of case studies.

Face to face workshops consolidate knowledge and understanding developed through online workshops and will apply the principles learnt to more complex situations.

In both forms of workshops students will be given collaborative and individual tasks.

Throughout, the student is encouraged to undertake independent study both to supplement and consolidate what

Teaching/learning methods & strategies

Intellectual skills are developed through online large group sessions which include embedded multiple- choice questions together with a mixture of face to face and online workshops in which students will work individually and collaboratively to develop knowledge and understanding of the law and practice matters covered in each module of study.

Online workshops will focus on legal research, writing, drafting, advising and professional conduct in the context of case studies.

Face to face workshops will consolidate knowledge and understanding developed through online workshops and will apply the principles learnt to more complex situations.

In both forms of workshops students will be given collaborative and individual tasks.

Throughout, the student is encouraged to develop intellectual skills further by independent study.

The skills of knowledge and understanding, analysis and synthesis of data, documentation and other information relevant to a client will enable students to logically and coherently resolve complex legal situations and give competent legal advice.

Critical Evaluation will enable students to effectively apply statute and common law to the particular client and identify and highlight the strengths and weaknesses of the client's case.

Assessment

Intellectual skills are assessed through knowledge and understanding are assessed through examinations which are either 'Open Book' or with 'Permitted Materials' (B1-2) or courswork and oral assessments (B3-4) which are either 'Open book 'or with 'Permitted Materials.'.

Teaching/learning methods & strategies

Practical skills are developed through face to face and some online workshops.

Core skills of writing, drafting, interviewing and advising, advocacy, practical legal research and professional conduct pervade both Stages 1 and 2 of the programme. Workshops are structured through practical case studies which require students to demonstrate the appropriate approach to each skill element.

Workshops will allow students to acquire and demonstrate practical skills - The provision of sound legal advice with regard to the client's personal circumstances; the communication of solutions to legal problems both orally and in writing to a range of clients; the demonstration of proper ethical behaviour when advising clients; monitoring and adapting to legal changes; proposing solutions to new legal developments when they arise.

Assessment

Practical skills are assessed through examinations which are either 'Open Book' or with 'Permitted Materials., or coursework (C1-2), and oral assessment (C3), which are either 'Open Book' or with 'Permitted Materials' (C4).

The core skills assessed in Stage 1 of the programme are embedded within the core modules of Stage 1 and separately assessed as Competent/Not yet Competent. These skills are writing, drafting, interviewing and advising, advocacy and practical legal research (C3).

Professional Conduct is formatively assessed within elements of the examinations which are either 'Open Book' or with 'Permitted Materials' in Business Law and Practice, Property Law and Practice and Litigation and summatively assessed by a separate examination which is either 'Open-Book' or with 'Permitted Materials'



Transferable skills:

Teaching/learning methods & strategies

Transferable skills are developed through workshops in which students are encouraged to reflect on their learning needs, in relation to knowledge and understanding, intellectual and practical skills.

Each workshop provides the opportunity for formative assessment in the context of the requirements of the programme.

Students receive formal formative assessment opportunities for each element of assessment and receive individual feedback on this performance (D1).

As the skills requirements pervade the programme, students are able to benefit from their experience earlier in the programme to further develop and apply skills appropriately to other areas (D2).

Throughout, the student is encouraged to develop transferable skills by maintaining a record of evidence and completing a personal development plan.

Assessment

Transferable skills are assessed through weekly workshops and formative assessment tasks. D1 is not generally summatively assessed (with the exception of the Research Project oral) and students are expected to identify their learning needs in response to formative assessment feedback and to address the feedback when undertaking summative assessment.

Students are assessed through examinations which are either 'Open Book' or with 'Permitted Materials', or coursework and practical skills exercises in Stages 1 & 2 and the Semester C elements of the programme and are required to demonstrate their application from the module in which they were taught to other modules in the programme (D2).

The research project requires students to develop their research skills and present their conclusions and proposal in a clear and comprehensive manner.

D. Programme Structures, Features, Levels, Modules, and Credits

The programme is offered in a full-time mode over an extended academic year of 48 weeks, and leads to the award of the LLM in Legal Practice (Stage 1 and Stage 2 and the Semester C Marketing and Business Development for Legal Professionals module). Entry is at Level 7 following satisfactory completion of a qualifying undergraduate degree or the completion of the Common Professional Examination/Graduate Diploma in Legal Studies which satisfies the Solicitors Regulation Authority requirements for admission to the vocational stage of training upon a Legal Practice Course.

The annual intake occurs in early September in Semester A for Stage 1 entrants.

Stage 1 comprises: Business Law and Practice (including Business Accounts), Property Law and Practice, Litigation, Wills and Administration of Estates and Solicitors Accounts together with the core skills of Interviewing and Advising, Advocacy, Writing, Drafting, Practical Legal Research and Professional Conduct and Regulation. All modules are compulsory.



Stage 2 comprises three optional modules selected from Table 1a below which build upon the compulsory elements of Stage 1 and permit further in-depth study into chosen areas of law and practice and further development of core skills. Completion of Stage 2 on its own does not carry an academic award.

The Employability Skills and Career Planning module will run alongside the Stage 1 and Stage 2 modules and will complement the specific legal skills development which forms an intrinsic part of this programme by helping students to continue to evaluate, develop and demonstrate their employability skills and formulate, refine and implement a career development plan.

In order to gain the LLM qualification students will be required in Semester C to undertake one further module. They will complete a 60 credit Marketing and Business Development for Legal Professionals module.

Work-Based Learning, including Sandwich Programmes

The programme is subject to the approval of the Solicitors Regulation Authority and all modules must be passed in order to gain the award.

A candidate who is shown to have cheated or plagiarised in any coursework or examination will be subject to the University's internal disciplinary sanctions and will be reported to the Solicitors Regulation Authority

Study Abroad and Exchanges

N/A. This is a one-year vocational course which is followed by a Training Contract/ Period of Recognised Training (PRT) usually for a period not exceeding two years which provides the work-based learning elements.

Programme-specific assessment regulations

The programme complies with the University's academic regulations (in particular, <u>UPR AS11</u>, <u>UPR AS12</u> and <u>UPR AS14</u>) with the exception of those listed below, which have been approved by the University:

- Only three attempts at a module must be permitted
- There is no provision for compensation of a failed module

A student must complete the LPC Stage 1 and Stage 2 within five years of the date of the first assessment submission date in the year the student commenced the course.

E. Management of Programme & Support for student learning.

Management

The programme is managed and administered through:

- The Dean of the School of Hertfordshire Law School.
- Associate Dean of School (Learning & Teaching) who has delegated responsibilities for learning and teaching.
- Associate Dean of School (AQA) who has delegated responsibilities for academic quality matters.
- Associate Dean of School (Research) who has delegated responsibilities for reseach.
- Associate Dean of School (International & Development) who has delegated responsibilities for marketing and recruitment.
- Associate Dean of School (Enterprise) who has delegated responsibility for employability matters.
- A Programme Leader and Deputy Programme Leader who are responsible for the day to day management and organisation of the programmes together with the pastoral care of students.
- Cohort Leaders and Academic Support Tutors who support the Programme Team on pastoral care.
- An Admissions Tutor with specific responsibility for open days.
- A designated Programme Team to deal with day to day administration associated with the programme, together with administrative assistance from the Student Hub.
- A programme committee, the membership of which includes the programme officers, all staff contributing to teaching on the programme together with student representatives.

Support

Students are supported by:

- An induction programme at the commencement of Stage 1 at which attendance is compulsory as this is
 an integral part of the programme of study. Students will generally attend two days per week for face to
 face sessions, though additional attendance might be required in some weeks for skills training and
 assessment and for examination assessments and the delivery of Elective teaching.
- Large group sessions offered either face to face or online with embedded multiple-choice questions to
 assess understanding and links to precedents and other online resources •Workshops take place face to
 face and occasionally online, allowing students to work collaboratively and individually to undertake
 research, writing and drafting exercises applying their knowledge of law and practice to case study material
- An extensive Learning Resources Centre, incorporating a library and computer centre with an induction programme and self-help guides to electronic and learning resources.
- Full access to programme and module information via Canvas together with weekly online workshop tasks.



- A Programme Leader and Deputy Programme Leader to provide academic support, to advise students in academic difficulty, and to provide students with guidance on using appeals, complaints procedures, and issues involving disciplinary processes.
- Academic Support Tutors who provides both pastoral and academic support.
- Module Leaders for individual modules, who provide academic support as students' progress through the programme.
- The Student Administration Service, who offer general guidance on semester dates and UH facilities.
- A substantial Student Services Centre at the College Lane Campus which provides advice on issues such as finance, University regulations, legal matters, accommodation, international student support.
- Office of the Dean of Students, incorporating a Medical Centre, an Equal Opportunities Officer, Chaplaincy, Counselling and nursery provision.
- Disability Services for advice to disabled students.
- A School Careers Officer and a Professional Liaison Officer for all current and graduate students together with a careers service for all current students and graduates.
- Student representatives on programme committees.
- The Students' Union based on De Havilland Campus.

The entry requirements for the programme are:

A minimum of a lower second class LLB Honours or Joint Honours degree, both of which have qualifying status, through recognition as a qualifying degree which satisfies the 1999 Joint Statement on the academic stage of training on behalf of the Solicitors Regulation Authority and the Bar Council.



OR: A pass on the Common Professional Examination or Graduate Diploma in Legal Studies

OR: Any other qualifications approved on an individual basis by the SRA.

In order to be admitted as a solicitor, students will have to meet the SRA's admissions requirements in relation to character and suitability. Students who are aware they might have an issue in this regard should contact the SRA for guidance or an early assessment of their suitability.

The programme is subject to the University's Principles, Policies and Regulations for the Admission of Students to Undergraduate and Taught Postgraduate Programmes (in <u>UPR SA03</u>), along with associated procedures. These will take account of University policy and guidelines for assessing accredited prior certificated learning (APCL) and accredited prior experiential learning (APEL).
