### Important points

This programme meets the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC) requirements for student midwives, who upon graduation will be eligible to apply for registration with the NMC professional register.

You will be subject to Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) checks and Occupational Health (OH) screening.

Non-disclosure of any criminal activity prior to or during your studies may lead to your withdrawal from the programme, as outlined in the School's Disclosure and Barring Service Procedure. OH Screening will assess your ability to meet the programme requirements as set out in accordance with the Nursing and Midwifery Council. OH clearance will be required prior to attendance on placement. If, for any reason, you should fail to obtain OH clearance this will prevent you from meeting the programme requirements and may lead to your withdrawal from the programme.

You must comply with the 'Principles of Professional Behaviour' expected of students detailed in the University's Fitness to Practice Policy, to demonstrate that you are fit to practice; failure to do so may result in referral to University Fitness to Practice processes.

Students should read them before accepting their offer and contact us if they have any questions about anything in them. New students starting from 1 August 2018 will have access to the standard student support system provided by the Student Loans Company (SLC) to cover the cost of their tuition fees and will also be provided with salary support (TBC for Jan 2021 intake). Health Education England will offer each student on this programme salary support usually at band 5 via their Trust provider and tuition fee contribution of up to £9,250 per annum via the University. Students eligible for this funding offer will not be able to access the Learning Support Fund (LSF). However, students are entitled to seek support, if eligible, from the Student Loans Company for a maintenance loan.

#### **Academic Year**

#### Academic Year 2022 - 2023

The University's academic year is made up of 3 Semesters. Normally most undergraduate programmes use Semesters A and B, additionally postgraduate programmes and specific undergraduate programmes use Semester C. Each of these is made up of teaching weeks followed by exams (the re-sit period falls within Semester C).

- Semester A runs from Monday 26 September 2022 to Friday 20 January 2023
- Semester B runs from Monday 23 January 2023 to Friday 12 May 2023
- Semester C runs from Monday 15 May 2023 to Friday 08 September 2023

### **Expected workload**

Over the programme a full-time student midwife is expected to achieve a minimum of 3000 hours on their studies, with 50% theory and 50% practice (NMC, 2019). In accordance with the NMC guidelines, the theory: practice ratio across this programme is approximately 50:50
