### **Important points**

- New UK or EU, but UK-residing students, may have access to the standard student support

- To commence on the programme you will be subject to Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) checks and Occupational Health (OH) Screening:
  - Non-disclosure of any criminal activity prior to, or during, your studies may lead to your withdrawal from the programme, as outlined in the School's Disclosure and Barring Service Procedure.
  - b) OH Screening will assess your ability to meet the programme requirements as set out in accordance with the Professional Statutory and Regulatory Bodies (or equivalent bodies). OH clearance will be required prior to attendance on placement. If for any reason, you should fail to obtain OH clearance this will prevent you from meeting the programme requirements and may lead to your withdrawal from the programme. However, even with OH clearance there may be the need to request an enhanced OH review if you have more specialist needs to ensure you are able to meet the requirements of the programme whilst being provided with support and reasonable adjustments.

## **Trips/Activities**

Students usually have the opportunity to visit an anatomy lab for a prosection session at a large London teaching hospital.

Each year there is usually also the opportunity for Year 2 and 3 students to participate in providing massage for runners who have taken part in the London Marathon.

Other activities will be scheduled to link to teaching or other charitable events where possible and students will be given notice ahead of time.

These opportunities will incur travel costs and it is hoped that these can be recommenced once the pandemic situation has been stabilised and it is safe to do so.

#### **Academic Year**

#### Academic Year 2023 - 2024

The University's academic year is made up of 3 Semesters (A, B and C). Semester A and B are made up of teaching weeks followed by exams, where applicable (the re-sit period falls within Semester C). Semester C is normally used for final dissertations and projects.

- Semester A runs from Monday 25 September 2023 to Friday 19 January 2024
- Semester B runs from Monday 22 January 2024 to Friday 10 May 2024
- Semester C runs from Monday 13 May 2024 to Friday 6 September 2024

### **Expected Workload**

In the UK, a full-time student is expected to spend 1200 hours on their studies each year and over 1000 hours of placements over the three years. Please find below an estimate of how your time will be spent on this programme during each year of study.
