Important points

- This is apprenticeship programme, and you will be working towards standard ST0827. Once complete the programme you will have a Foundation Degree in Health Care Practice and be able to enter the register as a Nursing associate.
- Your progression against the standard will be reviewed every 12 weeks in a tripartite progress review meeting with yourself, your employer and your tutor from UH.
- You must be in current employment in a health or social care setting for a minimum of 30 contracted hours per week.
- Teaching will be one day a week and there will be six, 6-week placement blocks organised throughout the 24-month programme.
- There will be a blend of teaching with face-to-face sessions normally taking place at the University of Hertfordshire, Hatfield with some content delivered online.
- Apprentices are expected to attend all scheduled teaching sessions.
- Annual leave must be planned outside these sessions and ideally within the allocated annual leave outlined in the programme structure.
- The programme and its content are occasionally subject to review, which may result in enhancements being made to the programme.
- You will be expected to typically undertake 7 hours a week independent study in addition to scheduled teaching sessions.
- Your place will be subject to evidence that satisfactory health screening and the Disclosure and Barring Services (DBS) checks have been undertaken prior to the commencement of the programme.
- You must comply with the 'Principles of Professional Behaviour expected of Students'
 detailed in the <u>Fitness to Practice Guidance</u>, in order to demonstrate that you are fit to
 practice; failure to do so may result in referral to University Fitness to Practice processes.

Academic Year

Academic Year 2023 - 2024

The University's academic year is made up of 3 Semesters (A, B and C). Semester A and B are made up of teaching weeks followed by exams, where applicable (the re-sit period falls within Semester C).

- Semester A runs from Monday 25 September 2023 to Friday 19 January 2024
- Semester B runs from Monday 22 January 2024 to Friday 10 May 2024
- Semester C runs from Monday 13 May 2024 to Friday 6 September 2024

This course runs throughout the academic year and across all three semesters.
