## A. Programme Rationale

- The rationale for the History programme is to provide students with a sequence of modules through
  which they can develop their knowledge, skills and understanding of topics in History as a single honours
  subject, major or joint.
- The Programme is designed to recruit students who have an A-Level in History or a related subject and/or who have a desire to develop their historical knowledge and skills.
- The structure of the programme is designed such that students have a degree of choice and students can, therefore, determine to follow a pattern of study within History or between History and other subjects offered on the different programmes.
- Through the learning of transferable skills embedded in the History Programme graduates are equipped for a variety of careers, including those traditionally open to Honours graduates in the Arts and Humanities: teaching, work in the Heritage Sector, the Civil Service, local government, journalism and publishing as well as for further study at post-graduate level.

# **B. Educational Aims of the Programme**

### **Diversity and Inclusion**

Our programmes are purposefully designed to enable all students to engage meaningfully with the curriculum by being accessible and representative. We will support students to shape their learning experience, removing barriers and enabling them to succeed. The curriculum explicitly includes multiple and representative perspectives, valuing collective identities and individual diversity. - the opportunity to write an extended piece of independent work;
- an understanding, knowledge and the skills to enable them to pursue post-graduate study.

The aims of a Single Honours in History are, in addition to the above, to develop in students:

- a comprehensive body of historical knowledge;
- an understanding of the variety of approaches to understanding, constructing, interpreting and presenting the past;
- a critical awareness of history's role and use in the modern world;
- a substantial knowledge of the theoretical underpinnings of the historical discipline;
- an ability to read, analyse and reflect critically and contextually upon primary historical sources;
- the ability to develop and sustain historical arguments in a variety of literary forms, formulating questions and utilising evidence;
- experience of writing an extended piece of independent work;
- a good understanding, knowledge and the skills to enable them to pursue post-graduate study.

Students receive feedback not only on their knowledge and understanding but also on their ability to communicate their ideas effectively and to reference appropriately. Effective oral communication is developed in seminar and seminar group work, and several modules require oral presentations, either individually or in groups.

Skills D3, D5 and D6 are developed primarily in seminar and group work.

Skill D4 is developed when students are inducted into the facilities of the Learning Resources Centre (use of e-mail, Internet, online resources), at the beginning of their programme,

Assessment strategy

Transferable skill D1 is not formally assessed but it is expected that students will have to demonstrate this skill in order to pass through the programme and meet module deadlines. Work submitted after the module deadline will be penalised in accordance with University guidelines.

Transferable skills D2 and D7 are assessed formatively by tutorials and summatively in a range of assignments built into the curriculum, e.g. coursework, examination essays, and oral presentations. Skills D3 and D5 are assessed by group presentations and debates.

Transferable Skill D4 is built into the programme. All students are required to access module StudyNet sites for module information and seminar tasks and to access electronic resources as appropriate in the completion of their

# D. Programme Structures, Features, Levels, Modules, and Credits

The programme is offered in full-time (normally 3 years), sandwich (normally 4 years) and part-time (normally 5 years) modes, and leads to the award of a BA Degree with Honours with the appropriate title from those listed in Section 1. Intake is normally Semester A (September).

Entry is normally at Level 4 (with suitable A level or equivalent qualifications) but is possible at Level 5 and Level 6 with suitable accredited prior learning.

### Work-Based Learning, including Sandwich Programmes

A sandwich award requires the successful completion of at least **30** weeks full-time equivalent placement activity from a maximum of two separate approved placements, neither of which will be normally less than **12** weeks in duration, in order for the award to be made. This is in addition to the period of academic study required for the full-time award. This optional placement year is undertaken after Level 5 and before Level 6 and meets the SEEC criteria for Level 6.

### **Programme Structure**

In addition, on the Major-Minor and Joint pathways the Minor or Joint Subject/Programme Learning Outcomes are developed and assessed through the constituent modules, as identified within the relevant Subject /Programme Specification.



### **Table 1a Outline Programme Structure**

### Mode of study

### Full-time

Students on a full-time mode of study must normally take the equivalent of eight 15 credit modules per year with the equivalent of four 15 credit modules undertaken per semester.

In addition, at level 5 students may take 5HUM1175 Employability Skills. Failure in this module will not prevent progression, provided the normal progression rules had been met.

### Part-time

Students on a part-time mode of study are allowed to take up to five 15 credit modules per year and most normally choose to study between 2 and 5 modules per year, with modules being taken in each semester. Varying rates of study are possible: students can increase or decrease their rate of study year by year or semester by semester in response to their changing circumstances. Students are entitled to take a break from study for a semester or even a year if their circumstances require it.

Students can apply to transfer to a full-time rate of study; this should be arranged before the beginning of the academic year.
