A. Programme Rationale

The programme is one of only a few nationally that offers an initial experience of both graphic design and illustration at the start of Level 4, before further specialisation within the Graphic Design course from Level 5 onwards with the option of the 'Graphic Design: Advertising and Branding' award. These three options give a clear and distinct choice for applicants, but with flexibility to change from one pathway to another at certain stages of Level 4. The curriculum is designed to encourage and challenge students who have already decided on their future pathway; whilst also offering support and guidance to those who may be unsure of which direction to take.

Although it has a strong professional ethos, a characteristic of the programme is its breadth in terms of the range of media, processes and approaches to problem solving it encourages – resulting in graduates with diverse portfolios and interests. It acknowledges the fact that designers of the future will need to possess multidisciplinary skills as well as the ability and confidence to collaborate with others. Encouraging students to have an awareness of the social, political, environmental and ethical contexts that surround their work is a vital part of the programme.

Level 4 is a common, shared experience during which students are given the time to explore and develop the common aspects of these two disciplines, as well as providing a sound grounding in the differences so as to allow students to make an informed choice about which award to join. The first semester is characterised by a set of assignments that explore the importance of a thorough design process, ways to generate original and appropriate ideas, and introductory workshops to a variety of skills and techniques. The second semester

focuses on the student's chosen discipline and is characterised by a set of intensive workshops, supported by appropriate creative briefs that test the knowledge, understanding and skills acquired.

Level 5 continues with intensive discipline-specific workshops and creative project briefs allied to the workshops. Philosophically students are encouraged to consider the idea that the module in Level 5 Semester A is simply a continuation of, or an extension of the Level 4 Semester B module. There is an increasing focus on the professional world that flows throughout Level 5 characterised by constant reference to contemporary professional practitioners, project briefs, constraints and timescales that are typical of industry, live projects, collaborations with industry partners, work experience opportunities, study trips and talks from visiting guest speakers. Graphic Design students will either study two specialist modules exploring the wider possibilities of graphic design, or two modules which introduce and explore advertising and branding.

Level 6 is considered the 'portfolio year' and is largely concerned with the development of a high quality graduate portfolio of design/illustration work, alongside the writing of a substantial piece of critical writing. Given the highly vocational nature of this particular programme, the Level 6 curriculum is designed to allow students the opportunity to work on a wide variety of visual communication problems that will be recognised, understood and appreciated by potential employers. In Semester B students will engage in a number of projects including a single, large Final Major Project and a comprehensive self-promotion and portfolio development exercise.

B. Educational Aims of the Programme

The programme has been devised in accordance with the University's graduate attributes of programmes of study as set out in <u>UPR TL03</u>.

- develop in students an ability to communicate effectively to a range of audiences, to collaborate with others, to listen, discuss and negotiate and to develop self-reflective practices;
- enable students to develop a range of personal and entrepreneurial skills which will equip them with the ability to respond to current and future career challenges.

Teaching and learning methods

Acquisition of knowledge and understanding is through a combination of lectures, studio-based project work and workshops at all levels. (A1 to A4 and A4, A5, or A6)

Throughout, the learner is encouraged to undertake independent study both to supplement and consolidate what is being taught/learnt and to broaden their individual knowledge and understanding of the subject.

Acquisition of knowledge and understanding is through a combination of lectures, studio-based project work and workshops at all levels. (A1 to A4 and A4, A5, or A6)

Learning is instigated by set projects with tutorial support including individual and small group tutorials (A1 to A4). For A5, A6 and A7, self-managed learning, responsible independence and autonomy develop knowledge and understanding of the student's chosen specialist field in the context of projects proposed by students and negotiated with tutors to ensure the fulfilment of Learning Outcomes.

Throughout, the learner is encouraged to undertake independent study both to supplement and consolidate what is being taught/learnt and to broaden their individual knowledge and understanding of the subject.

Assessment strategy

Knowledge and understanding are assessed through in-module assessments, portfolio submissions and presentations in a range of media formats.

From Level 4 Semester B onwards, students demonstrate their knowledge and understanding through a programme of work within dedicated award-specific modules. (A4, A5, A6)

A7- Developments within historic and contemporary professional practice within illustration.

The modules 'Visual Thinking: Histories, Theories and Context' (Level 4), 'Contextualising Contemporary Practice' (Level 5) and 'Degree Essay' (Level 6) make a particular contribution to the acquisition of cultural, historical and critical understanding (A1) and to the knowledge and understanding of current practices (A5, A6, A7) especially at Levels 5 and 6. There is a requirement of written work at all levels and an extended essay at level 6. Additional academic writing support is available.

Teaching and learning methods

Intellectual skills are developed through a combination of lectures and studio-based module work. (B1, B2, B3, B4)

Typically, the student's conceptual development will be evident in a design process, which demonstrates creative thinking and problem solving, analysis and judgement in the development of solutions and a willingness to explore a range of media. Conceptual skills are an integral part of studio work and are fostered by set briefs, inmodule exercises and workshops (B2, B3, B4)

The 'Visual Thinking: Histories, Theories and Context' (Level 4), 'Contextualising Contemporary Practice' (Level 5) and 'Degree Throughout, the learner is encouraged to develop intellectual skills further by independent study Essay' (Level 6) modules contribute significantly to the development of analytical thinking and enquiry skills (B1).

Intake is normally at level 4 with A-level or equivalent qualifications as detailed on the University website, but is possible at subsequent levels subject to appropriate qualifications and experience. Intake is normally Semester A (September).

Work-Based Learning, including Sandwich Programmes

A designated Sandwich programme leads to a University award in the sandwich mode, with the word "(Sandwich)" appearing on the final award certificate. In order for the programme to lead to an award in the sandwich mode, the student must undertake a period of approved work experience of not less than 30 weeks full-time equivalent with no possibility of exemption, usually between the end of Level 5 and the beginning of Level 6. This will usually be completed within the United Kingdom but, with prior approval, may be completed within other countries. Progress of the student's training and development is monitored through visits from University academic staff and/or through reports from the student. Students will be required to document this period of work in accordance with the guidelines produced by the School. Students on the Sandwich programme will be registered on the Sandwich Year Module (6CTA1008).

Students who have not achieved the minimum progression requirements at the end of Level 5 may be prevented from undertaking a sandwich placement. Students who are on the sandwich programme but have a 'Failed' grade in any Level 4 or Level 5 module will not normally be allowed to register to repeat this module until they return from placement.

Students may choose to combine study abroad and work experience awards, by completing a full Year Abroad followed by a Sandwich, over 2 years, leading to the award of "with a Year Abroad (Sandwich)".

Where a student enrols on Year Abroad or Sandwich, but encounters circumstances that prevent completion of the minimum number of weeks required, they may, with permission from their programme leader, be transferred onto single semester Study Abroad and/or Employment Experience.

Other Work Experience (Short and Medium Term)

In addition to offering a full Sandwich year (as explained above and referred to in the School as a 'Long Term Work Experience'), we encourage students to participate in shorter work experiences/placements.

With agreement from the Programme Leader, a student negotiated work experience is available within this Programme at Level 5.

This means that, with prior written agreement, a student may undertake:

Student Exchange programme Incoming Exchange

Incoming Study Abroad students study the course at level five.

In such cases, an Approved Study Pattern for single-semester study will be determined at the commencement of the study period. The Study Pattern should clearly specify the format/quantity/weighting of assessments that are to be submitted at the conclusion of the study period – please see the relevant DMDs for more information.

NOTE: Visiting students wishing to study for a single semester in the School of Creative Arts may participate in the Level 5 activities within a single Programme only during the required semester.

Study Abroad

All students on the course are eligible to complete a study abroad option, usually between levels four and five, or levels five and six. Study abroad is normally one full year, but students can opt to complete one semester of study abroad and one semester of work experience, with the permission of the school.

Students wishing to study abroad at a host institution in another country, or to complete a work placement during their studies, may choose to undertake one of the following:

- Sandwich (for a full year)
- Year Abroad (for a full year)

Some students may alternatively be eligible for the following:

- Study Abroad (for a single semester only)*
- Employment Experience (for a single semester only)**
- Employment Experience and Study Abroad (Employment Experience for a single semester + Study Abroad for a single semester)***
- * Students can choose to Study Abroad for a <u>single</u> semester only in either semester A or B. Students will be made Dormant for the semester they are not engaged with.
- ** Students can choose Employment Experience for a <u>single</u> semester only in either semester A or B. Students will be made Dormant for the semester they are not engaged with. Students wishing to undertake Employment Experience for the whole year will be registered on the Sandwich option.
- ***Students can choose to combine Employment Experience for a single semester and Study Abroad for a single semester in the same academic year only. There is no condition to which way around this takes place.

Students choosing to undertake Sandwich, Year Abroad, Study Abroad and/or Employment Experience will need to decide in advance of the following eligible academic year and discuss this with the Programme Leader and Student Record Administrator first.

Students normally progress to the next level of study in the academic year following any of the above.

A designated Year Abroad programme leads to a University award in Study Abroad mode and the words "with a Year Abroad" appear on the award certificate. The Year Abroad will provide students with the opportunity to expand, develop and apply the knowledge and skills gained at the start of their course in the School of Creative Arts (UH), within a different organisational and cultural environment in a partner academic institution. The host institution will appoint a Programme Co-ordinator who will oversee the student's programme during the Year Abroad and will liaise with the appointed UH Supervisor.

Students undertaking a full Year Abroad may undertake a period of study at an approved partner institution as an additional year either between Levels 4 and 5 (students must have passed 120 credits) or between Levels 5 and 6 (students must have passed 240 credits).

Alternatively, in exceptional cases where the curriculum provided at an approved franchise partner is aligned with that of their home programme and where this has been formally agreed by the Programme Leader, students may undertake this study period in place of Level 5 (Year 2) at the School of Creative Arts (UH). In this case, successful students will receive credit for 120 credits at Level 5 and their final degree classification will be calculated in line with those for a direct Level 6 entrant (i.e. Level 5 achievement/grades will not be taken into account).

Programme Structure

The programme structure and progression information below (Table 1a and 1b) is provided for the Honours award. Any interim awards are identified in Table 1b. The Programme Learning Outcomes detailed above are developed and assessed through the constituent modules. Table 2 identifies where each learning outcome is assessed.
