A. Programme Rationale

The programme combines theoretical discussions with practical examples to foster a broad understanding of the forces that shape global politics in the 21st Century. There will be a focus on traditional issues, like war, peace and security, as well as more contemporary debates in the discipline, such as the global economy, international ethics, energy scarcity and ecological changes.

The programme aims to provide and develop the knowledge, skills and tools required to critically analyse and tackle global society's most pressing issues. Innovative teaching approaches, including simulations and panel-style debates, help establish a thorough grasp of the theoretical approaches and empirical methods used to study, understand and analyse International Relations. Research is at the forefront of our programme's thinking and teaching. The modules are designed and led by active researchers, who are able to provide cutting-edge insights into current debates, developments and perspectives within the discipline. Students will also complete an individual, extended research dissertation that will be supervised by one, or more, of the department's dedicated research staff.

Alongside, in-depth theoretical and conceptual knowledge, the programme will encourage students' professional development. The programme focuses on developing and enhancing transferable, soft and interpersonal skills that increase employability and are attractive to a range of employers. The research focus of the programme, paired with its analytical rigour means that it provides a pathway for careers in research, in academia or the private sector, policy development, in NGOs or government, or vocational positions in the media, marketing or businesses.

The programme consists of a number of different pathways which sets it apart from the competition and fits with the individual needs and/or professional aims of students. The standard route MA is offered full-time (one year) or part-time (two years) and is designed with flexibility in mind. The standard MA combines in-class activities with online learning provisions to ensure that studies can be balanced with other commitments, including work and family life. Alternatively, students may have a stronger eye on employability and wish to take a Sandwich option (two years full-time), which combines a year of university study with a year-long work placement in a field or industry of the student's choice. Finally, students may wish to strengthen the academic/research dimension of their studies through the 'with Advanced Research' route (two years full-time), where students complete an extended, year-long research project in addition to the first year of taught modules.



B. Educational Aims of the Programme

The programme has been devised in accordance with the University's graduate attributes of programmes of study as set out in UPR TL03.

Additionally this programme aims to:

- Critically engage and evaluate current research and advanced scholarship in the discipline.
- Develop the students' understanding of the complex institutions and processes that determine and shape international relations.
- Develop a critical awareness of contemporary issues and debates, and understand how these are informed and shaped by the field of study and political actions.
- Encourage students to use their theoretical knowledge to critique existing policies and inform new policy prescriptions.
- Enhance the independent research skills of students through an individual, extended piece of academic research.
- Become a multi-skilled communicator by developing the written and oral skills required to operate effectively within an academic and professional environment.
- Enhance students' employability, through the development of transferable, soft and interpersonal skills.

The programme provides opportunities for students to develop and demonstrate knowledge and understanding, skills and other attributes in the following areas. Sandwich Year

The placement year comprises an agreed period of a minimum of 30 weeks (including employers' and statutory holidays) of work based learning at an organisation or company which has agreed to those terms and conditions regarded as essential by the University of Hertfordshire. Students will be supervised according to university regulations. The learning experience will be assessed in the module 'Work Placement Assessment', to enable students to demonstrate both their knowledge of the industry, their skills development and their professional attributes.

Placements are advertised through the Career and Placements Office. Students may also source their own placement, but it must be subsequently approved by the School in terms of health and safety, equality legislation and supervisory guidelines before a student can take it up. For students with visa restrictions, the placement will need to take place in the UK.

All students on the on the pathway leading to the award MA International Relations (Sandwich) are eligible to proceed to a placement year provided they have achieved 60 credits by the end of Semester A and a further 60 credits by the end of Semester B, and they have completed the appropriate placement documentation. Success in the placement will be recognised in the title of the award but does not carry additional credit towards the Honours programme.

All students are eligible for a work placement regardless of GPA, but the work placement cannot be guaranteed.

- In order to enrol onto the Work Placement module, students need to have passed 60 credits in Semester A. Students who have not passed 60 credits in Semester A are able to transfer to the International Relations pathway or the International Relations (with Advanced Research) pathway.
- To qualify for the award of MA International Relations (Sandwich), students must successfully complete the
 module Work Placement Assessment, as well as the Work Placement. Students who do not successfully
 complete these modules will be eligible for the award MA International Relations on successful completion
 of 180 credits, including International Relations Dissertation.
- To qualify for the award of MA International Relations (with Advanced Research), students must successfully complete the 30 credit Level 7 module 'International Relations in Practice', and the 30 credit module 'Advanced Political Research Methods'. No final compensatory credit can be awarded for these modules. Students who do not successfully complete one or more of these modules will be eligible for the award MA International Relations on successful completion of a minimum of 180 credits, including the International Relations Dissertation.
- The award calculation for the award of MA International Relations (with Advanced Research) will be based on an average of the best 150 of 180 grade-bearing credits on the programme. The remaining 60 credits gained from 'International Relations in Practice' and 'Advanced Political Research Methods' are excluded from this calculation as these modules are graded on a pass/fail basis.

G. Entry requirements

The normal entry requirements for the programme are:

Graduates with an honours degree, Second-Class Upper Division, in a Humanities, Social Science, Business or Law subject (Human Geography will be considered). Graduates with an honours degree, Second-Class Lower Division, in a Humanities, Social Science, Business or Law subject (Human Geography will be considered), may be considered on an individual basis.

We request that applicants submit a short (800-1000 words) personal statement (detailing their academic background and personal interests in the subject) with their application.

International students should have an English Language assessment of an overall average IELTS 6.5, with no individual component lower that IELTS 6.0, or equivalent as determined by the School of Humanities.

For current entry tariff point requirements, please refer to the relevant page for the Course on the University website or on the online prospectus.
