## A. Programme Rationale

Studying astrophysics offers a thorough grounding in fundamental physics while exploring cutting edge topics about the Universe, its constituents and structure, and humanity's place within it. Astrophysics students develop important skills in physics research enquiry and problem solving, critical thinking, scientific writing, communication/presentation, and programming/software application. And in addition to opening up a wide range of career opportunities in STEM areas, such study offers a pathway to PhD and potentially an astrophysics research career.

PAM's Centre for Astrophysics Research is an internationally renowned research group, with teaching and research expertise over a wide range of contemporary topics, and a well-trodden path from undergraduate study through to professional research. The University's Bayfordbury Observatory is also a major strength, and is a national leader in the field of astrophysics teaching. The Observatory allows our students to study a wide variety of astrophysical phenomena ranging from extra-solar planets to distant galaxy clusters, and processes across many scales from the orbits of earth-crossing asteroids to the expansion of the universe.

This Astrophysics taught Masters programme offers a learning experience that provides a wide range of intellectual and practical skills through taught modules with substantial content at or informed by the forefront of the field. The degrees include a major component of observational astrophysics at the Bayfordbury Observatory, and a major research project supervised by a research expert in the field. The programme teaches modern astrophysical techniques, as well as concepts and theories associated with cutting edge research ranging from extra-solar planets to dark energy. And the degree structure also offers a wide choice of option modules that can cater for student interests focused in a number of different directions; including galactic astrophysics, extra-galactic evolution and cosmology, space science, and theoretical study.

## B. Educational Aims of the Programme

The programme has been devised in accordance with the University's graduate attributes of programmes of study as set out in [UPR TL03](#).

**Additionally this programme aims to:**

- offer an education based on the fundamental concepts, techniques, and theories of astrophysics, with studies involving current problems and/or new insights that are at or informed by the forefront of the field.
- develop the ability for practical understanding of how established research techniques and enquiry are used to create and interpret knowledge in the physics and astrophysics field.
- provide training that is suited to the abilities and career aspirations of students and which will help them realise their own potential, preparing them for employment in a wide range of sectors and/or postgraduate research in astrophysics.
- develop the ability to approach problem-solving activities using physical insight and laboratory/observatory skills aided where appropriate, by computer-based techniques.
- develop competence in communicating scientific results to other experts and to non-specialists, including the use of computers and software packages for information retrieval, analysis, and presentation.

The programme provides opportunities for students to develop and demonstrate knowledge and understanding, skills and other attributes in the following areas. ## D. Programme Structures, Features, Levels, Modules, and Credits

The programme is offered in the following modes:

- Full-time (1 year), leading to the award of MSc Astrophysics.
- Part-time (2 years), leading to the award of MSc Astrophysics.
- Full-time (2 years), leading to the award of MSc Astrophysics with Advanced Research.
- Full-time (2 years) including a work placement in industry, leading to the award of MSc Astrophysics (Sandwich).

The standard 'MSc Astrophysics' degree (1 year full-time or 2 years part-time) is structured to have 90 credits of core level 7 taught modules and a 60-credit level 7 project in semester C (or in year 2 for the part-time route), as well as 30 credits of optional modules at level 6 / level 7.

The 'MSc Astrophysics with Advanced Research' degree (2 years full-time) is structured to have 90 credits of core level 7 taught modules, and a 60-credit level 7 project during year 2. It also includes 60 credits of option modules at level 6 / level 7, and a 30-credit level 7 'Advanced Research Seminars' module that runs in parallel with the project.

The 'MSc Astrophysics (Sandwich)' degree is a 2-year route and includes a work placement.

Other (interim) award outcomes are listed in Table 1b. Entry is normally at Masters (7) level (with related qualifications). **Intake is normally in semester A (September).**

To be eligible for a placement, students must have passed 120 credits, AND passed their first 60 credits at first sitting. Students who have not met these progression requirements, including those with outstanding deferrals, will normally be transferred from the sandwich course to the corresponding 2-year 'with Advanced Research' course.

To progress into year 2 of the Advanced Research route students must pass 90 credits in year 1. If they pass 75 credits or less in year 1, they must repeat their failed modules before progressing onto year 2 modules.

On entry into the programme students on all routes have the option to do the 'Data Science Core Skills Boot Camp' module (7PAM2003) to ensure an appropriate level (or offer a revision opportunity) in mathematics, statistics, and Python programming.

On entry into the programme all students will be allocated a personal tutor.

## Programme-specific assessment regulations

The programme is compliant with the University's academic regulations (in particular, [UPR AS11](#), [UPR AS12](#) and [UPR AS14](#)) with the exception of those listed below, which have been specifically approved by the University:

Further points of clarification and interpretation relevant to this specific programme are given below:

- To enrol on the project module, students must typically have studied 120 credits of taught modules from the programme and passed at least 60 credits (in order to satisfy UPR AS14, D5.2.3).
- **To be eligible for a placement, students must have passed 120 credits, AND passed their first 60 credits at first sitting. Students who have not met these progression requirements, including those with outstanding deferrals, will normally be transferred from the sandwich course to the corresponding 2-year 'with Advanced Research' course.** Students may also be eligible to transfer to the corresponding 180-credit pathway, following consultation with the programme leader.
- Students are responsible for securing their placement. Students are required to secure their placement by the School's published deadline. Students who do not secure a placement by the deadline, will normally be automatically transferred from the Sandwich award to the corresponding 2-year 'With Advanced Research' course.
- For registration to continue, students should normally have met the requirements for the Postgraduate Diploma within three years and the MSc award within four years (all periods calculated from date of registration on the Programme).
- Students who are registered on the standard 180-credit full time course are not normally allowed to change their study pattern to the corresponding 2-year full time Sandwich course or the 2-year full time 'With Advanced Research' course.
- **Modules normally only run in either Semester A or Semester B. Failed modules can only be repeated in the semester in which they run. Therefore, depending on when the opportunity exists to repeat failed modules, International Students on certain student visas will need to return to their country of residency and apply for a new visa to return to repeat modules at a later date.**

## E. Management of Programme & Support for student learning

### Management

The programme is managed and administered through:

- Dean of School;
- Head of Department;

- A Programme Leader, who has overall responsibility for the effective operationalization of the programme, and ensuring that academic standards are maintained and an effective student learning experience is provided. The Programme Leader also has overall responsibility for the quality assurance and enhancement of the programme providing advice and guidance to programme staff as appropriate. In addition the Programme Leader advises students about programme structure and regulations;
- A Programme Team led by the Programme Leader to assist with the operationalization of the programme and maintaining academic standards and student learning experience. The Programme Team includes Principal Technical Officers at Bayfordbury and a Level 7 Year Tutor (who also monitors student special needs issues and attendance);
- Project Supervisors who in addition to supervising the 60 credit 'Astrophysics Masters Project' module also provide personal tutoring (academic and pastoral support) to their supervised student/s;
- An Admissions Tutor with specific responsibility for open days and selection;
- Placement Tutors to oversee students on the "MSc Astrophysics (Sandwich)" degree, while they are undertaking their industrial/research placement;
- Module Leaders to advise students about module-specific issues;
- Student representatives and advocates who are members of a Programme Committee;
- A designated administrative team to deal with day-to-day administration associated with the modules within the programme.

## **Support**

- An induction week at the beginning of each new academic session;
- Overseas Orientation;
- You will have a Personal Tutor who will be an important point of contact, able to help you gain a good understanding of the School and programme you are studying;
- Technical support and supervision in the physics laboratories.

- The Physics, Astronomy & Mathematics (PAM) Industrial Training Placements Officer.

## G. Entry requirements

The normal entry requirements for the programme are:

- A good (2.1 or above) Honours degree (or equivalent) in physics, astrophysics, or a closely related subject, where the degree is accredited by a Professional Statutory Regulatory Body such as the IoP (or a body of equivalent standing in a related subject or overseas).

Students who wish to join the course with a 2.2 may be considered on a case-by-case basis, where entry may be possible based on additional information and/or an interview.

It is not possible for students who have already obtained the MPhys (Physics) degree (PMMPHY) or MPhys (Astrophysics) degree (PMMPHYAP) to register on the Astrophysics MSc.

For current entry tariff point requirements, please refer to the relevant page for the Course on the University website or on the online prospectus.
