A. Programme Rationale

This programme applies psychological principles to the workplace. It is designed to help students acquire the skills to develop evidence-based solutions for workplace issues and focuses on developing reflexivity, problem-solving skills, and rigour in research.

There are two pathways within the programme. One pathway (MSc Occupational Psychology) is designed to provide Stage 1 for chartership in occupational psychology and therefore will appeal to those with a background in psychology and keen to enhance their skills and qualifications as a psychologist. The second pathway (MSc Business Psychology) is designed for those who wish to apply the principles of psychology to the workplace and will appeal to those who may have some work experience or a different academic background.

There are modules common to both pathways and students learn together and share their knowledge and skills from a range of backgrounds. These modules are an introductory module, The Workplace and Psychology, Psychological Assessment at Work, Learning Training and Development, Culture Change and Leadership, Wellbeing Engagement and Motivation, Consulting and Professional Skills, and Mixed Methods Research. Each pathway then has additional modules designed to support the different learning outcomes – those seeking stage one chartership with the MSc Occupational Psychology will complete the Reflexive Practice module that helps them understand the chartership process and develop skills to support stage two. They also complete the Performance Management module providing an opportunity to develop an evidence-based intervention. Those on the MSc Business Psychology pathway and whose background is not psychology focussed will undertake the module Conceptual & Historical Issues in Psychology to gain a deeper understanding of psychological principles and Human Resource Management for Psychologists which allows them to review business practices through the lens of psychology.

Students on both pathways will complete their studies by undertaking an independent project in applied psychology – this will be a project in or for an organisation. The findings will be delivered in the form of a dissertation and a report for organisations.

Both pathways are accredited by the Association for Business Psychology and allow students a year's free membership of the association. This provides them with networking and knowledge-sharing opportunities. The MSc Occupational Psychology is also accredited by the British Psychological Society and provides stage one for chartership.



The programme team prides itself on the practical application of theory and focuses on developing collaborative skills, essential for working in the field. This is achieved in a variety of ways. Most of the lecturers on the programme are actively involved in both consultancy and research which informs the teaching and the assessments, many of which have a practical element.

The programme has been carefully designed to develop and build both knowledge and practical skills. It reflects our Herts Learning principles:

- 1. A coherent design, as confirmed by our accrediting bodies
- 2. Prioritising student learning, through formative feedback opportunities and personal tutoring
- 3. Building a community, in our highly interactive teaching and networking with employers and alumni
- 4. Harnessing technology, in our assessments, workshops, and practical sessions
- 5. Offering opportunities for personalisation, in our individual project and assignment topics.

D. Programme Structures, Features, Levels, Modules, and Credits

Both pathways are offered in full-time mode (1 year) or in a part-time module (2-3 years). All modules must be completed within 5 years of starting the course. Entry is normally at Masters (7) level (with related degree qualifications).

Part-time students select which modules they study each year – all students should complete The Workplace and Psychology module in their first semester and the Applied Psychology Project module should be completed after all the taught modules. The Mixed Methods Principles module should normally be completed before the Mixed Methods Skills module.

Intake is once a year for semester A beginning in September. Students must attend the induction week for the programme where essential information is shared to set them up for success.

Professional and Statutory Regulatory Bodies

The MSc Occupational Psychology is accredited by the British Psychological Society (BPS). The award of MSc Occupational Psychology requires 180 credit points and passes at level 7. Modules marked * must be passed. The award is also stage 1 of the chartership process for those meeting the BPS criteria.

Both pathways, MSc Business Psychology and MSc Occupational Psychology are accredited by the Association for Business Psychology (ABP). Students are eligible for one year free membership of the ABP whilst studying on the course. The Award of an MSc Business Psychology requires 180 credit points, passes at level 7, including the Master's Project.

For the MSc Business Psychology:

A 2:1 UK Honours degree (or overseas equivalent) in a related area (business or social sciences). If students do not have the above requirements, but relevant work experience (equivalent to one year full-time or two years part-time) or evidence of working at a 2:1 standard, they will be invited to apply and each case will be considered by the Programme Leader. The criteria used to assess suitability are likely to be the following:

- Any psychology relevant qualification obtained such as a Higher national Diploma
- Relevance of previous work experience to the programme
- Any recent CPD undertaken
- Academic writing skills
- Critical analysis and critical reflection skills
- Communication skills
- Data analysis skills

Students applying for the programme outside of the UK will be expected to have a minimum IELTS score of 6.5 overall and in each band and may be required to submit a piece of written work or undertake an online



interview. The written work and interview are intended to assess their interest in the field, their reflexive capability, critical thinking and communication skills.

The programme is subject to the University's Principles, Policies and Regulations for the Admission of Students to Undergraduate and Taught Postgraduate Programmes (in <u>UPR SA03</u>), along with associated procedures. These will take account of University policy and guidelines for assessing accredited prior certificated learning (APCL) and accredited prior experiential learning (APEL).
