Important points

- This programme meets the Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC) requirements for student Therapeutic Radiographers, who upon graduation will be eligible to apply for registration with the HCPC
- You will be subject to Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) checks and Occupational Health (OH) screening:
 - a) Non-disclosure of any criminal activity prior to or during your studies may lead to your withdrawal from the programme, as outlined in the School's Disclosure and Barring Service Procedure.
 - b) OH screening will assess your suitability to meet the programme requirements regarding fitness to practice as set out in accordance with the Professional Statutory and Regulatory Bodies (or equivalent bodies). OH clearance will be required prior to any attendance on placement. If, for any reason, you should fail to obtain OH clearance this will prevent you from meeting the programme requirements and may lead to your withdrawal from the programme.
- You must comply with the 'Principles of Professional Behaviour' expected of students
 detailed in the University's Fitness to Practice Policy, in order to demonstrate that you are fit
 to practice; failure to do so may result in referral to University Fitness to Practice
 processes.

Academic Year

Academic Year 2024 - 2025

The University's academic year is made up of 3 Semesters (A, B and C). Semester A and B are made up of teaching weeks followed by exams, where applicable (the re-sit period falls within Semester C). Semester C is normally used for final dissertations and projects. Placement occurs in each Semester.

- Semester A runs from Monday 23 September 2024 Friday 17 January 2025
- Semester B runs from Monday 20 January 2025 Friday 9 May 2025
- Semester C runs from Monday 12 May 2025 Friday 05 September 2025

Expected workload

In the UK, a full time student is expected to spend 1200 hours on their studies each year. Please find below an estimate of how your time will be spent on this course during each year of study.

- Exams / tests are supervised and timed. They include multiple choice questions and short and long answer essay questions. These can be delivered either online or via paper versions and will 'normally' be at the main University campus.
- Coursework includes essays, posters and timed in-course tests / online exams (multiple choice questions and short and long answer essay questions).
- Practical assessments include presentations, viva voce exams and skills tests that take
 place in university laboratories examining practical skills and application of theory. They
 also include completion of the portfolio which is completed during practice placements
 and is assessed on a pass / fail basis.
- Practice placements take place in the clinical setting and practice-based educators and academic staff assess students on their clinical skills and development.

Please be aware that some teaching sessions may be delivered online. Therefore, to study online you will need access to a suitable computer or similar electronic device (with audio and visual capabilities) and a good reliable Internet connection, which may incur additional expenses.

Please note that our Learning Resource Centres (LRCs) have PCs and Macs available to use, including hi-spec PCs. The university also has laptop loans available at both LRCs and provide a remote desktop portal service to allow users to access the software on Lab and LRC Windows PCs when not on campus.

Attendance

The expectation is that you will attend all your taught and practical sessions. Students must complete a minimum of 1200 hours of supervised clinical placement time. Any absence from the

planned clinical placement weeks will be expected to be made up during vacation weeks, in line with clinical department availability.

Programme Accreditation
