## A. Programme Rationale

The rationale for the Creative Writing pathway is to provide students with a suite of modules via which they can develop their knowledge and understanding of Creative Writing as a practice and develop as writers. Coverage spans different genres, with an increasing emphasis on employability.

Students can study Creative Writing as a joint or minor subject within the framework of the English Language, English Literature, History, Philosophy or Mass Communications Programmes. The rationale for the kinds of modules offered at each level is that, as students progress though levels, the writing projects they encounter should give them skills in different genres and become progressively more challenging.

The Creative Writing Group is committed to offering a programme that enables students to gain a knowledge and enjoyment of the subject which they can take into their future lives but also equip them with transferable skills to improve their employability.

The Creative Writing teaching at the University of Hertfordshire combines a variety of delivery methods with a common purpose of making Creative Writing accessible and meaningful to all our students. Students do not have to have studied Creative Writing previously.

#### B. Educational Aims of the Programme

The programme has been devised in accordance with the University's graduate attributes of programmes of study as set out in UPR TL03.

## Additionally this programme aims to:

- contribute the national provision of Creative Writing by providing for students (including those who are new to the subject) the opportunity to study a stimulating, challenging and enjoyable, but also balanced, range of topics and materials, covering different genres and styles of writing;
- allow students to explore a range of increasingly sophisticated practical skills related to creative writing, taught by practising writers;
- allow students to begin to discover their own writerly voice and develop their creativity;
- equip students with a range of transferable skills.

#### C. Intended Learning Outcomes

The programme provides opportunities for students to develop and demonstrate knowledge and understanding, skills and other attributes in the following areas. The programme outcomes are referenced to the QAA benchmark statements for Creative Writing and the Frameworks for Higher Education Qualifications of UK Degree-Awarding Bodies (2014) and relate to the typical student. Additionally, the SEEC Credit Level Descriptors for Further and Higher Education (2021) have been used as a guiding framework for curriculum design.

Throughout, the learner is encouraged to undertake independent study both to supplement and consolidate what is being taught/learnt and to broaden their individual knowledge and understanding of the subject.

Assessment strategy

Knowledge and understanding are assessed through A1, A2, A3, A4, A5, A 6 and A7 is through written work.

Assessment of A3, A5, A6, A7 and A8 is through workshop exercises and tasks, and written work.

Assessment of A9 is through independent written work.

In order to pass a module students are required to have achieved a pass mark in all components of assessment.

Teaching and learning methods

Transferable skills are developed through a range of assignments.

Skill D1 is developed with students learning to manage themselves and their time to meet reading and assignment submission deadlines across a range of modules and also in the organisation of group and independent project work

Skill D2 is developed in the written work, which all modules require, and also through workshop participation.

Skill D3 is developed in workshop discussion and via preparation and delivery of presentations and student-led discussions.

D4 is developed throughout as students work on their own creative and critical writing.

Throughout, the learner is encouraged to develop transferable skills by maintaining a record of evidence and completing a personal development plan.

Assessment strategy

Transferable skills are assessed through a range of assignments.

Skill D1 is not formally assessed but it is expected that students will have to demonstrate this skill in order to pass through the programme and meet module deadlines. Work submitted after the module deadline may be penalised.

Skills D2 and D4 are developed in the written work, which all modules require. For coursework, students are assessed not only on their knowledge and understanding but also on their ability to communicate their ideas effectively, to engage with different viewpoints, to reference appropriately and to present work using recognised genre and scholarly conventions.

Skills D3 is developed in all individual modules and in a number of different ways e.g. presentations, student led-discussion, and workshop contribution.

Skill D4 is assessed via written work.

# D. Programme Structures, Features, Levels, Modules, and Credits

The programme is offered in Full-Time (normally 3 years), Sandwich (normally 4 years) and Part-Time (normally 5 years) modes and leads to the award of a BA Degree with Honours with the appropriate title from those listed in Section 1.

Intake is normally Semester A (September).

Entry is normally at Level 4 (with suitable A level or equivalent qualifications) but is possible at Level 5 and Level 6 with suitable accredited prior learning.



At Level 4 students may choose to study 30 credits of a foreign language which replaces 30 credits of noncore compulsory modules from their main programmes. They may continue this pathway at levels 5 and 6. This study mode will not be reflected in their final degree title.

# Professional and Statutory Regulatory Bodies

#### Work-Based Learning, including Sandwich Programmes

A sandwich award requires the successful completion of at least **30** weeks full-time equivalent placement activity from a maximum of two separate approved placements, neither of which will be normally less than **12** weeks in duration, in order for the award to be made. This is in addition to the period of academic study required for the full-time award. This optional placement year is undertaken after Level 5 and before Level 6 and meets the SEEC criteria for Level 6. This optional placement year is undertaken after Level 5 and before Level 6 and meets the SEEC criteria for Level 6. This will usually be completed within the United Kingdom but, with prior approval, may be completed within other countries. Progress of the student's training and development is monitored through visits from University academic staff and/or through reports from the student. Students will be required to document this period of work in accordance with the guidelines produced by the School. Students on this study mode will be registered on The Humanities Placement Year module (6HUM1123).

Placements are advertised through the Career and Employment Office and have included areas such as marketing, journalism, PR, management and Policy Units. Students may also source their own placement, but it must be subsequently approved by the School in terms of health and safety, equality legislation and supervisory guidelines before a student can take it up.

All students are eligible to proceed to a placement year provided they have achieved 120 credits at Level 4 and at least 90 credits at Level 5 and have completed the appropriate placement induction and documentation. Success in the placement will be recognised in the title of the award but does not carry additional credit towards the Honours programme.

Students who have not achieved the minimum progression requirements at the end of Level 5 may be prevented from undertaking a sandwich placement. Students who are on the sandwich programme but have a 'Failed' grade in any Level 4 or Level 5 module will not normally be allowed to register to repeat this module until they return from placement.

Students may choose to combine completing a full Year Abroad followed by a sandwich placement, over 2 years, leading to the award of "with a Year Abroad (Sandwich)". Students on this study mode will be registered on the Study Abroad module (6HUM1049) followed by module The Humanities Placement Year (6HUM1123).

# Student Exchange programme Incoming Exchange

Exchange students are permitted to study modules at all levels.

#### Study Abroad

All students on the course are eligible to complete a study abroad option, usually between levels five and six. Study abroad is normally one full year, but students can opt to complete one semester of study abroad and one semester of work experience, with the permission of the school.

## Study Abroad (for a full year)

#### Combined Placement and Study Abroad Year

Students who are eligible for the Year Abroad or Placement Year will also be eligible for the combined Placement and Study Abroad Year. This will involve a semester spent in a partner university abroad that is willing to provide a study abroad semester, combined with an appropriate placement of a minimum of 12 weeks which can be taken either abroad or in the UK.

Placement with Study Abroad (for a full year)

Students choosing to undertake Sandwich, Year Abroad, Study Abroad will need to decide in advance of the following eligible academic year and discuss this with the Programme Leader and Student Record Administrator first.

Students normally progress to the next level of study in the academic year following any of the above.

A designated Year Abroad programme leads to a University award in Study Abroad mode and the words "with a Year Abroad" appear on the award certificate. The Year Abroad will provide students with the opportunity to expand, develop and apply the knowledge and skills gained at the start of their course in the School of Creative Arts (UH), within a different organisational and cultural environment in a partner academic institution. The host institution will appoint a Programme Co-ordinator who will oversee the student's programme during the Year Abroad and will liaise with the appointed UH Supervisor.

Students undertaking a full Year Abroad may undertake a period of study at an approved partner institution as an additional year between Levels 5 and 6 (students must have passed 240 credits).

The year abroad comprises an agreed programme of study in the third year of a partner institution in Europe (other than the UK), North or South America, Australia or Singapore with which the University of Hertfordshire has an institutional agreement.

A student's programme of study will be negotiated and approved by the Dean of School (or nominee) in consultation with appropriate others and the host University. The programme provided by the host institution may comprise taught modules, a research project, field studies, or a mixture of these components. The programme of study will require a minimum of 25% of studies to be undertaken in aspects of culture of the placement country. Prior to the commencement of the year abroad, the student and Study Abroad Tutors from UH and the host institution will agree a learning contract. The learning contract will specify the assessment requirements to be met for successful completion of the programme of study. A Module Board of Examiners will consider the results for the year abroad during the first semester of the following academic year. All assessments must be completed by the end of the year abroad, and no subsequent referrals will be permitted. Students who have varied their programme of study without agreement from UH or have failed to meet the requirements of the learning contract will not have their year abroad studies included in the degree title.

A student must confirm the intention to study abroad during the first ten weeks of study at Level 5. This will enable a place to be negotiated at a host institution and the Study Programme and learning contract to be arranged and agreed. Only a limited number of places exist. These will be awarded on the basis of the suitability of students and guided by choice on the most appropriate programme and host institution.

To be eligible to proceed to a year abroad, a student must, by the time of the Semester B Module Boards of Examiners, have achieved at least 210 credits overall, including at least 90 credits at Level 5. Success in the year abroad will be recognised in the title of the award but does not carry additional credit towards the Honours programme.

For the year abroad in Europe where study will be undertaken in a foreign language students must meet the host University's language requirements.

Alternatively, in exceptional cases where the curriculum provided at an approved franchise partner is aligned with that of their home programme and where this has been formally agreed by the Programme Leader,



students may undertake this study period in place of Level 5 (Year 2) at the School of Creative Arts (UH). In this case, successful students will receive credit for 120 credits at Level 5 and their final degree classification will be calculated in line with those for a direct Level 6 entrant (i.e. Level 5 achievement/grades will not be taken into account).

#### **Programme Structure**

Creative Writing is offered as a minor and as a joint subject on the English Language, English Literature, History, Philosophy and Mass Communications Programmes. As a minor it comprises one quarter of an Honours student's Programme and as a joint it comprises half of an Honours student's Programme.

The programme structure and progression information below (Table 1a and 1b) is provided for the Honours award. Any interim awards are identified in Table 1b. The Programme Learning Outcomes detailed above are developed and assessed through the constituent modules. Table 2 identifies where each learning outcome is assessed.

In addition, students study credits of other subjects to a total of 120 credits, as set out in the Mass Communications Programme Specification.

The award of a BA Honours degree requires 360 credits passed with a minimum of at least 120 credits at Level 6.

#### Mode of study Part-time

Students on a part-time mode of study are allowed to take up to five 15 credit modules per year and most normally choose to study between 2 and 5 modules per year, with modules being taken in each semester. Varying rates of study are possible: students can increase or decrease their rate of study year by year or semester by semester in response to their changing circumstances. Students are entitled to take a break from study for a semester or even a year if their circumstances require it.
