A. Programme Rationale

The BSc Social Work Programme at the University of Hertfordshire aims to help students develop into social workers who are socially aware and critically engaged in debates concerning the quality, effectiveness and suitability of interventions with some of society's most vulnerable members.

The relationship between society, state and social work is central to the role of social work. During their time with us, students will assimilate the knowledge, practise the skills and interrogate the values which form the foundation of social justice and social work practice, synthesising learning to develop as evidence-based, reflexive practitioners and active global citizens.

Social Work is an occupational practice and an academic subject, which responds to changing social, political and economic contexts, the demands of contemporary society and the full range of practice settings. The programme team is committed to providing a challenging programme which ensures that graduates are competent, conscientious, compassionate and curious. Graduating students will hold both professional expertise and an awareness of the role and purpose of social work in diverse communities, nationally and internationally.

The impact of personal and social history and the influence of global forces are threaded through our teaching. Within the classroom, difference is viewed as a strength and multiple perspectives on theory, practice and society are valued and encouraged. The programme team is committed to facilitating a classroom culture of trust, underpinned by social work values and a commitment to anti-oppressive and anti-discriminatory practice, where students are able to challenge and be challenged.

Learning takes place in the classroom and online, in the full range of practice settings and in collaboration with employers, experts by experience and peers who will ultimately become colleagues. It lays the foundation for learning and development which spans the whole career. (BASW, 2017). The programme is aligned to Social Work England Professional Standards and the



award of the BSc(Hons) Social Work leads to eligibility to apply to the SWE Register and practice as a social worker.

B. Educational Aims of the Programme

Diversity and Inclusion

Our programmes are purposefully designed to enable all students to engage meaningfully with the curriculum by being accessible and representative. We will support students to shape their learning experience, removing barriers and enabling them to succeed. The curriculum explicitly includes multiple and representative perspectives, valuing collective identities and individual diversity. Learning, teaching and assessment activities help students to understand how they can enhance outcomes both for themselves and for others. All students belong to a learning community, and during their studies we really want to hear their voices, encourage them to listen to others, and express themselves.

The programme has been devised in accordance with the University's graduate attributes of programmes of study as set out in <u>UPR TL03</u>.

- enable students to be independent, research-minded, critical thinkers with transferable skills in the application of values, knowledge and skills to social situations and to their own practice, responding creatively to the intellectual stimulus of learning and research with a view to making a personal contribution to the study and development of social work theory and practice.
- develop a thorough understanding of, and ability to engage in critical debates about the significance of inequality and discrimination for social work policy and practice and reflect on their own values as citizens and workers.

C. Intended Learning Outcomes

The programme provides opportunities for students to develop and demonstrate knowledge and understanding, skills and other attributes in the following areas. The programme outcomes are referenced to the QAA benchmark statements for social work and the Frameworks for Higher Education Qualifications of UK Degree-Awarding Bodies (2014) and relate to the typical student. Additionally, the SEEC Credit Level Descriptors for Further and Higher Education (2021) have been used as a guiding framework for curriculum design.

- A1- Demonstrate an understanding of social work services and its impact on service users. This includes the social processes that lead to marginalisation, isolation and exclusion
- A2- Recognising service delivery including the historical and comparative perspective
- A3- The ethical and legal issues that have implications for social work practice
- A4- A broad understanding of social work theory and its application in practice
- A5- Explain the nature of social work practice across the range of settings
- A6- Understanding the role of research that informs practice and a critical understanding of research methods
- A7 Has a detailed knowledge of values

Teaching and learning methods

Acquisition of knowledge and understanding is through a combination of tutorials, lectures, small group work (A1-A5), 170 day practice placements, simulation using video camera, role play. There are also 30 days skills; 20 in year 1 and 10 in year 2 to develop further students' skills (A1,A3,A5).

Throughout, the learner is encouraged to undertake independent study both to supplement and consolidate what is being taught/learnt and to broaden their individual knowledge and understanding of the subject.

The overall curriculum has been devised in accordance with the Professional Capabilities Framework, the Knowledge and Skills Statement for Social Workers, and the Standards of Proficiency.

A combination of tutorials, lectures, small group work, 170 day practice placements, simulation using video camera, role play. There are also 30 days skills; 20 in year 1 and 10 in year 2 to develop further students' skills.

Assessment strategy

Knowledge and understanding are assessed through a combination of both formative and summative assessment processes utilized within the programme of study. All students are expected to complete both formative and summative assessment components through both coursework and practical types of assessment.

Assessments are marked and moderated by university tutors and may include feedback from employer partners, experts by experience and peer assessment. This process ensures that knowledge is contextualized and relates to contemporary practice.

At specified points in each Semester, relevant feedback will be provided to students on all aspects of performance. Students will also submit a portfolio of their learning throughout the Programme which will then be assessed. This, combined with self-

The programme makes use of a 'flipped' classroom model in relation to teaching and learning. Students are expected to access resources before each class in order to develop initial baseline knowledge of the topic under discussion. This and other problem-based approaches means that classroom time is employed to engage students in discussion with the teaching team and with fellow students, thus developing an enquirybased approach to knowledge acquisition.

Additional support is provided by study skills modules, Learning Resource Centre and StudyNet. Classroom sessions are supported by module drop ins which take place regularly for clarification and enriched

information, assessment, analysing and evaluating intervention, planning, decision making, meeting deadlines, monitoring and reviewing.

debate, small group and plenary discussion, case study and scenarios, active evaluation of research evidence (including the use of evaluative frameworks). From here a spiral progression of intellectual development is envisaged. Researchinformed teaching supports the growth of intellectual skills throughout the programme. Academic modules use enquiry-based techniques to support students in learning the skills required to become research-informed practitioners and can apply these to their learning. Research-informed teaching is embedded progressively from the Level 4 Enquiring Practitioner module through the Level 5 and 6 Practice Contexts modules and finally with the Research Informed Practice module which places a strong emphasis on research processes and problems.

Throughout, the learner is encouraged to develop intellectual skills further by independent study.

research to practice is developed incrementally through the programme. As can be seen from the **Enquiring Practitioner and** Research Informed Practice modules. For example, the Enquiring practitioner delivered in level 4 introduces the student to academic writing skills, referencing and sourcing relevant literature. This in turn supports the requirements for the Research Informed Proposal in level 6.

modules will allow students to use the video suite to develop self- awareness and interpersonal skills. 30 days skills sessions are linked to the module which students are required to attend. These sessions are delivered by the team, practitioners/employers and Service Users. Practical skills will be further developed in the 70 days Practice Learning Placement in year 2. A block 2 weeks after the 70 day placement (10 days) will be given over to skills days to enhance the students' skills sets. There is further 100 days practice learning in year 3 which equip students with the necessary capabilities to progress into the newly qualified Social Work framework.

D. Programme Structures, Features, Levels, Modules, and Credits

The programme is offered in a full-time (3 years) and part-time (6 years) mode and leads to the award of a BSc (Hons) Social Work. Intake is normally in September of semester A. All applicants will be interviewed for admission to the Programme. They will also need to provide an academic/professional reference. Before making the offer of a place, the Admissions Tutor will be expected to satisfy himself/herself that the entry requirements have been met.

Entry is normally at Level 4 (with A-level or equivalent qualifications/experience). Appropriate Accredited Prior Learning (APCL) or Accredited Prior Experiential Learning (APEL) is possible and is viewed on a case by case basis.

Professional and Statutory Regulatory Bodies

On successful completion of the Programme, students are eligible to apply to register with Social Work England.

Student Exchange programme Incoming Exchange

The programme accepts incoming exchange students who are permitted to study modules at level 4,5 and 6.

Study Abroad

The course has outgoing exchange students who are permitted to study at level 6.

Programme Structure

Progression to level 5 normally requires a minimum of 120 credits and passes in all modules. Progression to level 6 normally requires a minimum of 240 credits and passes in all modules.

The award of a BSc (Hons) Social Work requires 360 credit points passed with a minimum of at least 120 at level 6 including the successful completion of a 70-day placement in Year 2 and a 100-day placement in Year 3. In addition, students must successfully complete the compulsory 30-days skills sessions on a pass/fail basis.

The programme complies with the University's academic regulations (in particular, <u>UPR AS11</u>, <u>UPR AS12/UPR AS13</u> and <u>UPR AS14</u>) with the exception of those listed below, which have been approved by the University:

 As specified by the external validating body, final compensatory credit (exemption from UPR AS14 section D4.4) and inter-modular compensation is not permissible within the programme.

Further programme-specific regulations (requiring School-level approval) are given below:

- Students awarded (FREN) for 4HSK0065 Skills for Practice 1 would normally be withdrawn from the programme.
- Students are required to attend 30-days skills sessions. Failure to do so may result in the student being withdrawn from the Programme. The skills days are assessed in 4HSK0065 Skills for Practice 1 (20 days) and 5HSK0101 Skills for Practice 2 (10 days).
- Students will be expected to fulfil the requirements for practice as per programme policy (including undertaking an enhanced disclosure and barring checks, attending occupational health screening when referred and (where applicable) completing a statutory declaration.
 Failure to complete will normally lead to the student being withdrawn from the programme.



- Students are required to pass both practice placements in order to progress and gain the BSc (Hons) Social Work award.
- Students may in exceptional circumstances be permitted to retrieve up to 30 credits following
 the award of a FREN, at the discretion of the Board of Examiners, based on the student's
 academic and practice profile. Students will be expected to sign a declaration indicating that
 they understand the implications and possible impact of retrieving a module while continuing
 their studies.
- In securing practice learning experiences, students will be offered up to three interview opportunities. Students who fail to obtain a placement opportunity for either the 70 or 100day practice learning experiences following three interviews will normally be withdrawn from the programme
- Students are not permitted to refuse placements. If a student does so, then they may not be allowed to progress on the programme.
- Students should not unilaterally terminate a placement without first convening an extraordinary meeting. Students who leave placement without discussion or against the University's advice will normally be deemed to have failed the placement
- The Practice Educator is responsible for making a decision concerning the pass or fail of a student on placement. The PE must adduce sufficient evidence to support such a decision. If the Practice Assessment Panel (PAP), together with an external examiner is of the opinion that the evidence for pass or fail is not sufficient it may request further information. If that information is not provided, or remains insufficient, the portfolio will be reviewed by an independent Practice Assessor (a qualified PE). On the recommendation of that assessor the PAP and external examiner may recommend to the board that the decision of the PE be overturned.
- Students should note that they are not permitted to find their own placements; nor are they permitted to refuse placements that are offered. They should also note that many placements, especially those offered during the final year of study, may require students to be able to drive and have access to their own vehicle. In the event that students are unable to drive or are without access to a vehicle, this may lead to placement opportunities being restricted and could result in a delayed start to their placements.
- The University has regulations of the length of time and rate that somebody must study. In order to maintain currency of the qualification the BSc programme would normally discontinue a student after six years of study.

- Professional Lead for Social Work who is responsible for the professional element of all Social Work Programmes and Line Manager to the social work teaching staff.
- Programme Leader who is responsible for the day-to-day management of the qualifying Social Work Programme.
- An Admissions Tutor with specific responsibility for interview days and selection processes.
- Academic/Personal Tutors who have responsibility for the overview of the student's progress.
- Placement Tutors to assist with the procurement of placements.
- A designated programme administration team...
- Module Leaders who are responsible for individual modules.

In particular, UPR SA07 'Regulations and Advice for Students' Particular Attention - Index' provides information on the UPRs that contain the academic regulations of particular relevance for undergraduate and taught postgraduate students.

In accordance with section 4(5) of the Higher Education and Research Act 2017 (HERA), the UK Office for Students (OfS) has registered the University of Hertfordshire in the register of English higher education providers. The Register can be viewed at:

G. Entry requirements



The normal entry requirements for the programme are:

- Applicants must be aged 18 years at the commencement of the course.
- All applicants must have English GCSE Level C or equivalent and Maths Grade D or equivalent.
- All applicants are required to have 120 tariff points.
- Applicants with Access qualifications are required to have 60 points, 45 of which must be at Level 3, of which 12 must be at Distinction and 12 must be at Merit.

At the current interview stage, all candidates participate in a written test, an individual interview and a group exercise. If candidates do not meet the standards of all three elements they will not be accepted onto the programme.

Within the interview process, 'prospective students/candidates should demonstrate awareness of social context for social work practice, awareness of self, ability to develop rapport and potential to develop relevant knowledge, skills and values through professional training'. This in in line with the Professional Capabilities Framework (BASW).

All candidates are required to disclose any criminal convictions/cautions prior to entry. An Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check is required on each student for the purpose of suitability for the Programme and practice. Students are required to inform the Programme Leader if they have been cautioned or convicted of a civil or criminal offence during the course of their studies. In addition, students must disclose to the Programme Leader whether they have been subject to any workplace disciplinary proceedings and whether they have been placed on registers held by local authorities. Students must disclose whether they have previously studied on other Social Work qualifying degree programmes

All applicants who are offered a place on the Programme will be required to undergo Occupational Health (OH) screening. Students are further required to inform the Programme Leader if any health concerns that might impact on their professional role become evident during the course of their studies.

International students are required to demonstrate an English Language capability with an overall average of IELTS 7.0, with no less than 6.5 in any band. Where appropriate, English language qualifications that are recognised by the University as equivalent to the specified IELTS bands may also be considered.

The programme is subject to the University's Principles, Policies and Regulations for the Admission of Students to Undergraduate and Taught Postgraduate Programmes (in <u>UPR SA03</u>), along with associated procedures. These will take account of University policy and guidelines for assessing accredited prior certificated learning (APCL) and accredited prior experiential learning (APEL).
