A. Programme Rationale

The programme is designed to provide a postgraduate education in Molecular Biotechnology for graduates in the Biosciences or Biological Chemistry. A strong practical foundation is provided in the first semester with the study of modules that concentrate on the basic principles and techniques used in modern molecular biology investigations, and on aspects of cellular molecular biology, immunology and development. In the second semester there is a progression to problem-based learning (PBL) to develop an in-depth understanding and high-level critical analysis skills of molecular biological approaches to the application of genome technology and production of industrial and medicinal proteins, the characterisation of selected diseases and the design of new biological drugs for their treatment. During the final semester, the research project carried out in the state-of-the-art multimillion science facility may include aspects of molecular biology, bioinformatics, vaccine, general cellular molecular biology, plant and animal biotechnology. This course will provide students with the skills they need to have for future opportunities in the fast-growing biotechnology industry. The MSc Molecular Biotechnology (Sandwich) pathway provides students with the opportunity to gain practical experience in a UK professional workplace and strengthens their employability skills. The MSc Molecular Biotechnology with Advanced Research provides an opportunity to work in a research rich environment, including the completion of an internship with a member of the research staff and an extended research project.

All options will provide students with the skills they need to have for future opportunities in the fast-growing biotechnology industry and academia.

The use of problem-based learning approaches is a key feature of the programme and will promote development of investigative skills, the ability to work in a group and confidence in the investigation of new research areas. Another key feature of the programme is the research project which provides training in research methods and hands-on experience of laboratory and bioinformatics techniques including next generation sequencing. Throughout the programme the students will be provided with academic and personal support by their personal tutors, programme leader and academic support unit. Where required, students will be further supported to improve their skills in academic English writing through English language classes.

B. Educational Aims of the Programme

Diversity and Inclusion

Our programmes are purposefully designed to enable all students to engage meaningfully with the curriculum by being accessible and representative. We will support students to shape their learning experience, removing



barriers and enabling them to succeed. The curriculum explicitly includes multiple and representative perspectives, valuing collective identities and individual diversity. - develop an ability to apply the techniques described above and an understanding of how the results may be used to inform judgements, and develop and advance ideas;
- provide opportunities for the continuing development of transferable skills including communication, mathematical analysis, use of information technology, problem solving both as part of a team and as an individual.

The Sandwich award requires the successful completion of a minimum of 30 weeks full-time equivalent placement activity in addition to the period of academic study required.

The work placement comprises an agreed period of a minimum of 30 weeks full-time equivalent (including employers' and statutory holidays) of work-based learning at an organisation or company which has agreed to those terms and conditions regarded as essential by the University of Hertfordshire. Students will be supervised according to University regulations. The learning experience will be assessed in the 'Work Placement Assessment' module, to enable students to demonstrate both their knowledge of the industry, their skills development and their professional attributes.

Placements are advertised through the Careers and Employment Office. Students may also source their own placement, but it must be subsequently approved by the School in terms of health and safety, equality legislation and supervisory guidelines before a student can take it up. The placement will need to take place in the UK.

Depending on the nature of placement, a successful enhanced Disclosure and Barring check or equivalent, immunisation and occupational health check may be required.

All students on the pathway leading to the award MSc Molecular Biotechnology (Sandwich) are eligible to proceed to a placement year provided they have achieved 60 credits by the end of semester A and a further 60 credits by the end of semester B, and they have completed the appropriate placement documentation. Success in the placement will be recognised in the title of the award.

Programme Structure

The Programme Learning Outcomes detailed above are developed and assessed through the constituent modules. Table 2 identifies where each learning outcome is assessed.

- For the award of Postgraduate Certificate and Postgraduate Diploma in Molecular Biotechnology, the 60 or 120 credit points, respectively, must include either 7LMS0269 Genetics and Protein Biology (30 credit points) or 7LMS0273 Applied Biotechnology (30 credit points).
- To gain the 'Advanced Research' award, students must successfully complete the 240 taught credits,
 The award calculation for the MSc Cancer Immunotherapy with Advanced Research is based on the
 average of the best 150 credits; these will include the 75-credit point Extended Research Project
 module. Students who do not successfully complete the Research Internship in Biosciences module will



- be offered the interim award MSc Molecular Biotechnology Studies, on successful completion of the Research Methods and the Extended Research Project modules.
- To gain the 'Sandwich' award, students must successfully complete the 240 taught credits, successfully complete a 30-week full-time equivalent placement and pass the Work Placement Assessment module. Students who do not successfully complete the placement and associated module assessments will be offered the interim award MSc Molecular Biotechnology Studies on successful completion of the Research Methods and Research Project for Sandwich Route modules.
- Students are responsible for securing their own placement. Students are usually required to secure their placement by the end of April in order to process the necessary paperwork to embark on the placement in sufficient time to complete the 30 weeks full-time equivalent of work required. Students who do not secure a placement within this timescale will be transferred from the 'Sandwich' award to the two-year 'with Advanced Research' award. In exceptional circumstances and only with agreement from the Programme Leader students may be able to transfer to the one-year route to complete their studies.
- Students are expected to attend all classes including lectures, workshops and practical and attendance will be monitored for each module.

G. Entry requirements

The normal entry requirements for the programme are:

MSc Biotechnology (one year full-time and two years part-time):

- a first or second class Honours Degree in Biomedical and related sciences with a background in molecular biology, genetics and immunology with a final classification grade of a minimum 60% with evidence of having completed a research project and practical experience in a range of laboratory techniques relevant to the course; OR
- ii. a professional qualification accepted as equivalent to the above; OR
- iii. a qualification in veterinary science, medicine or dentistry; OR
- iv. a first or second class Honours Degree in disciplines other than those described above with a final classification grade of a minimum 60% but where the applicant, in the opinion of the Programme Leader, would benefit from, and succeed on, the programme
- v. In addition, all international students are required to demonstrate an English Language capability of IELTS 6.5 (with no less than 6.0 in any band) or equivalent qualification.

MSc Molecular Biotechnology (Sandwich) and MSc Molecular Biotechnology with Advanced Research (two years full-time):

- Average grade of 60% or above in an undergraduate degree in the Biological Sciences
- Students will be selected through interview

In addition, all international students on these pathways are required to demonstrate an English Language capability of IELTS 6.5 (with no less than 6.0 in any band) or equivalent qualification.

Applicants will be interviewed in order to establish their suitability based upon the following criteria:

The applicant will be rated on a 5-point scale for their ability to demonstrate:

 advanced knowledge in the field of Molecular Biology and Biotechnology and how this has been developed.



- ii. critical awareness of current issues in Molecular Biology and Biotechnology, in particular the impact of these on recent developments in the discipline.
- iii. practical experience in a range of laboratory techniques relevant to the biosciences.

If more students meet the above criteria than there are places available on the programme, students will be ranked and selected according to their interview performance and undergraduate degree grade average.

Non-Standard Entry

Applicants not within the categories described above, but who can demonstrate by other means, as specified below, that they can succeed on the programme will be considered on an individual basis.

i. The equivalent of at least 5 years' experience of working full-time in the biotechnology or pharmaceutical industry.
