"How to be an outstanding leader of SEND"

Points from the WSCC July 16 Conference.

The WSCC "How to be an outstanding leader of SEND" conference took place in July for SENCOs and Leaders of SEND. The focus was on Inclusion and Gareth Morewood, Director of Curriculum Support & Specialist Leader of Education, Priestnall School, Stockport led the day raising questions such as:

How do you as a leader influence culture and ethos for effective inclusion? How can you increase influence and facilitate change?

Gareth talked about his work and the practical strategies he uses to ensure children and young people with a wide range of SEND are fully included in their mainstream setting. Gareth has an excellent website which holds a bank of resources, many of which are free.

Inclusion: A useful definition "Inclusive education is the process of increasing the participation of all pupils in the curricula, cultures and communities of neighbourhood mainstream schools which value diversity in such ways that they learn effectively in a safe and happy environment". Booth 1998

Did you know?

15% of Young Disabled people 16 year olds are not in education, employment or training (NEET) compared with 7% of non-disabled people.

At 19 years of age, this difference increases further: 27% of young disabled people are NEET, compared with 9% of non-disabled young people.


Did you know?

- 36% of young disabled people are not doing a subject of their choice because of poor access to the curriculum, disabling environment and attitudes.
- Students with ASC are 8 times more likely to be permanently excluded from school than students without SEND.
- Difficulties in social interaction and communication can increase the risk of exposure to bullying and social isolation.

"No amount of intervention can make up for poor quality first inclusive teaching"

Autism and Social Communication Difficulties

- Use Visual Supports as much as possible
- Reduce uncertainty in your Lessons
- Supporting Emotional Regulation is key

Attachment can be supported through

- Nurture: Soothing supportive, non-verbal, positive calm routines
- **Challenge**: learning new skills / small steps with support and consistency.
- **Structure**: Clear and consistent routines, boundaries, task completion, rituals, calming behaviours.
- **Engagement:** positive non-verbal praise, using child's name
- **Personalisation**: remember to be adaptable, innovative, empathetic and open-minded.



Dyslexia: - some suggestions to help

- Use handouts avoid large amount of dictation or board copying.
- Use visual supports as much as possible.
- Make sure handwriting on white boards is clear and large enough to see from the back of the room.
- Finish sentences with red full stops to draw attention to the need for punctuation.
- Leave space between each line.
- Try alternating colours for difference sentences.
- Check with the students if they mind reading aloud in class, if it is necessary give them the text before so they can prepare.
- Let students volunteer to answer questions to encourage full participation, tell some students the questions in advance so they have time to prepare an answer.

For handouts:

- To reduce glare and eyestrain try: off white / cream paper and / or grey or blue ink.
- Arial or Comic Sans in font size 14 can help
- Avoid busy worksheets or books keep things simple in a logical progression.
- Use colour (where possible) or teach students effective ways of using highlighters.
